SLAYER DECLARES WOMAN HE KILLED BEGGED FOR DEATH

Rejected Suitor Slays School Teacher in Sight of Many of Her Pupils.

Scores of her sorrowing pupils took flowers to-day to the home of Miss Susan Lewis, a teacher in Public School No. 24, the Bronx, who was mortally shot in sight of many of the children on her way home from classes yesterday by Frank Berchman, a rejected suitor who had been in love with her since they were in school together.

She was twenty-one and the eldest of several children of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Lewis of No. 1938 Clinton Avenue, Berchman, twenty-two years old, is a son of Horace V. Berchman, a contractor, of No. 1547 Fulton Avenue, the Bronx, and a brother of Henri Berchman, a violinist, sometimes called the "fiddler-politician."

Berchman, who after the shooting handed his revolver to Policeman Charles Goff with the remark that he "didn't intend to run," declared that Miss Lewis had asked him to shoot her, which she denied before she died in Fordham Hospital. When the police tried to get a detailed statement from him as to why she wanted him to shoot her, he was hazy and made unsatisfactory replies.

His Lewis was in One Hundred and Seventy-Ninth Street, between Third and Monterey Avenues, on her way home to join a sewing class of teachers yesterday afternoon at 4:15 when Berchman stopped her, as he had often done before. According to information given by Frank Flinn by the young woman before she died, Berchman had begun courting her while she was in Normal School and he was in City College.

WALL STREET

Stock market at opening was quiet with slightly easier tendency. Improvement developed almost immediately in some of the low priced industrial issues. American Can gained 1 1/2, to 21 1/2, and Westinghouse 1-4, to 71 1/4; U. S. Steel 1-2, to 50 1/4, and Bethlehem Steel, at 52 1/4, was 1 1/4 points higher in the first hour's trading. This latter price is a new high record. General market continued fairly strong during second hour with a large part of business concentrated in industrial specialties.

In the afternoon stocks were neglected for the wheat market. Consolidated Gas gained 1 1/2 points, and the general list showed small interest and narrow fluctuations with few exceptions. American Can preferred sold up to 94 and the common to 29. Western Maryland recovered 1 1/4 points to 11 1/4.

Toward the close the market became active and strong. Advances were made, although the list closed at the top.

DREAM OF \$2 WHEAT ALMOST A REALITY

Room in Chicago Market Lifts Durum Grade for Delivery to 1.99 1/2—May Reaches 1.38 1/2.

CHICAGO, Jan. 7.—Two dollars a bushel for wheat, the dream that only enthusiasts ever expected to come over, was within a half cent of being a reality to-day on one grade of wheat, if the cost of delivery to Europe might be counted as part of the price. It is a fact that a carload of the kind known as durum was sold to-day to go to Italy on a basis that figured, delivered at destination, \$1.99 1/2 a bushel. Such a price breaks all records for durum wheat. The supply of that variety, in the United States is said to be virtually exhausted for this season.

Rapid returns were witnessed in the speculative market after a period of wavering during the early hours and prices reached levels that before had not been equaled since the celebrated attempt at a worldwide squeeze by Joseph Leiter. May wheat, the chief speculative delivery, went to \$1.35 1/2 against \$1.36 at the finish last night.

Wheat prices opened 1/2 cent lower, but recovered to about yesterday's closing level by midday. On rumors of war prices shot up about 2 cents in early afternoon, but reacted one cent a bushel on absence of confirmation of reported outbreak between Italy and Turkey. But advanced to new high toward the close, as cash wheat fails to come out, and it may be necessary to advance prices in order to bring out any considerable quantity. It is reported that the Rockefeller Foundation has purchased several million bushels of Belgian wheat—closed at top prices.

HELD AS A MURDERER, HE PAYS BOARD IN CELL

Ship Engineer, a Prisoner, Also Has to Pay Fare Here From Indies and Immigrant Tax. Benjamin Johnson of Providence, R. I., engineer on the steam schooner Republic, lying in the harbor of Guadeloupe, French West Indies, was attacked by a sailor, whom he killed in self-defense, he says.

The French authorities put Johnson in jail, where he paid \$1 a day board. After twelve days they decided to send him to the United States, to be tried for homicide committed under the American flag. He had to pay his fare up here. He was taken to Ellis Island from the steamship Parings to-day, and he had to pay \$4 head tax as an immigrant, because he was born at Rada, Danish West Indies. The immigration authorities are debating where to send him.

"Will I have to pay my board here, I wonder?" Johnson asked the reporter. "Will they make me pay my way to Thompson, Wis., the Hungarian home port? If I lose my case, will I have to pay for cell room and board, or the hire of the chair, or whatever they see?"


