\$60,000,000 LOSS BY EARTHQUAKE; SAVE MANY LIVES

Victims Survive Horrors of Living Death After Being Buried—Five Days in the Ruins.

ROME, Italy, Jan. 18.—Rescue work throughout the wilderness created by the earthquake last Wednesday continues slowly and under great difficulties. Each reported excavation serves to verify earlier reports of the probable casualties, though here and there, despite the fact that five days have elapsed since the catastrophe, living victims are being released from their prisons of crumbling plaster and fallen timbers. Thousands of soldiers and civilians in great numbers, including many members of the nobility, gradually are systematizing the relief work and are getting food and shelter supplies over the obstructed roads to stricken towns and villages. The relief work now, however, overshadows the rescue efforts.

The Pope, according to the Osservatore Romano, has sent aid to all the bishops of the dioceses in the earthquake zone. A fund of 30,000,000 lire (\$4,000,000) has been received by the Pontiff thus far. About 7,500 refugees, 2,000 of them injured, have reached Rome to date.

The property loss probably involved is indicated by one estimate that it will exceed 800,000,000 lire (\$60,000,000). No official figures are as yet available.

In dozens of villages, citizens who escaped with their lives are still in fear that new shocks will tumble their buildings about their heads and are camping out to avoid further danger. Gradually, however, the seismic disturbances are lessening, and none has been reported since yesterday.

More than two thousand soldiers are at work on the ruins of Avezzano, which may be described as a wilderness extending for several square miles. Lieut. Gen. Marini is in command of the troops. Signor Giuffelli, Minister of Public Works, estimates that the number of dead in the Avezzano district will reach 20,000 and that 10,000 persons are injured.

One rescue typical of many, and made by women, is reported. The mother, it seems, had escaped and believed that her daughter must be alive under the fragments of their house. She organized a party of women and herself stimulated them to continue what seemed a hopeless excavation in nothing but a heap of irregular pieces of limestone.

The mother on Sunday heard a voice just beneath where the women were working and they finally reached the young woman, who was

roofed in and protected by two parts of walls forming an angle. One foot was held under a block of stone but otherwise the young woman was unhurt. She had been without food or drink for four days and had been nearly suffocated by the dust of the pulverized mortar which sifted down through crevices while the women were trying to reach her.

WOMAN DIES OF SHOCK AFTER RESCUE FROM FIRE

Many Others in Winsted Hotel Have to Scurry Half Clad to Escape Flames.

WINSTED, Conn., Jan. 18.—Mrs. Emily Steele, aged seventy, widow of Dr. H. B. Steele, is dead and Frank Roberts, stockholder in Strong Manufacturing Company is unconscious in the county hospital as the result of a fire of unknown origin in the Park Hotel in the east end early today. The prompt arrival of the firemen saved several lives. Mrs. Steele was an invalid. She was one of the first to be taken down a ladder by firemen and died half an hour later from the effects of the shock.

Roberts, half dressed, was found sitting in a chair in his room overcome by smoke. Several teachers in the Gilbert High School, who have rooms at the hotel, either went down ladders themselves or were carried down. All of the forty persons in the hotel were forced to flee partly dressed, including Miss Marie R. Challenor of New York, sister of Mrs. Niles, widow of Rear Admiral Kosuth Niles.


