DUTCH MASSES AND CLASSES ARE SPLIT OVER WAR

Traveller Returning on Potsdam Says People Are for Allies, Aristocrats for Kaiser.

Interesting sidelights on life in the neutral countries and in Germany as it is affected by the great war were brought back by passengers aboard the Holland-America Line steamer Potsdam, in to-day from Rotterdam after swinging at anchor last night outside the Hook, for-bound.

Chief of the stories of how the little countries keep to the hard path of neutrality was that concerning Holland told by Edgar Driessen, who travels for a chemical manufactory of Pittsburgh.

"Holland is rent over the question of her sympathies," said Driessen. "The common people are strong in their sympathy for the allies, while the higher classes and aristocrats of the Court, headed by the German consort of Queen Wilhelmina, are openly espousing the German cause. When the band in the city plaza at The Hague plays "Tipperary" at the listeners cheer, but the German "Wacht am Rhein" passes almost without a handclap.

"Germany is getting her supplies via Holland, Sweden and Italy, particularly from Sweden—and that's what makes the English so 'mad.' Sweden is markedly pro-German in its sympathies and is doing all it can to smuggle into German ports cargoes of saltpeper and American copper, both of which are very much needed by the German armies."

Robert Brent Mosher, for several years American Consul at Plauen, Germany, said that in the interior of Kaiser Wilhelm's empire one would hardly know a great war was being fought.

Food prices have remained normal and no scarcity of food products has become apparent, he declared.

C. H. Morton of Baltimore said it was worth as much as one's life even to hint to a German that anything but victory would come of the war; they were supremely confident, though they believed the war would last for two more years.
 Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Van Rosten, former Brooklyn residents but for several years residents of Antwerp, were in the Belgian city during the siege and bombardment. Their house was smashed by a shell and they were forced to flee to the suburban districts.
 "I believe the Germans are gradually being forced back on Antwerp," said Van Rosten. "They are making that city absolutely impenetrable in evident anticipation of a prolonged siege."

RELIEF SHIP IN DISTRESS.

Revenue Cutters Hurry to Aid of the Cammie.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The Belgian relief ship Cammie is in distress about five hundred miles off the New England coast, in about the same position the Titanic was wrecked, according to a report to-day to the revenue cutter service.

The revenue cutter Androscoggin has left Halifax at full speed to give the vessel help.

Pleads Guilty to Forgery.

Harry Cohn, alias Levy, who, it is charged, has been operating with "Post Office Dicks" and a gang of forgers, this morning pleaded guilty to a charge of forgery in the Bronx County Court, and his day of sentence was set for Feb. 5. Cohn was brought back from Cleveland, O., by Detectives Schuening and Haddemeyer last week. On his promise to tell all he knew of the Dick gang, Cohn, who is said to come of a good family in Cleveland, was permitted to plead to forgery in the third degree. He passed forged checks for \$480 on a Bronx bank. Dick is in the county jail.

MOTHER SEEKS HER BOY.

Samuel Kraft Was Last Seen in New York Street.

Samuel Kraft, fifteen years old, has been missing from the house of his mother, No. 3520 North Dover Street, Philadelphia, Pa., since Oct. 28, 1914. About two weeks ago the boy was seen in New York. The distressed mother came here to find her child. The boy is very tall for his age, has gray eyes and light complexion. His mother is at the house of her brother.

Wedding Put Off; He Dies.

Franklin Takes Bichloride After Third Postponement.

Because his fiancée had postponed their wedding day three times, Samuel Franklin, a photographer, of No. 284 Broome street, took bichloride of mercury. He died in Gouverneur Hospital last night after Dr. Radin had operated in an attempt to get the poison out of his system.
 Franklin took the bichloride yesterday morning. Before he died he said he was engaged to Miss Rose Zuckerman of No. 210 Division Avenue, Brooklyn. They were to have been married in November, he said, but the wedding day was postponed until Washington's Birthday. Friday, Franklin said, Miss Zuckerman suggested a third postponement, and he decided to kill himself.
