

New Ocean Line, China to New York
WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—A new steamship line between China, American gulf ports and New York is about to be started by Chinese financiers. American Minister Reisch at Peking reports by cable. The line will be operated by a joint stock company of Chinese and American capital, and dividends will be guaranteed by the Chinese Government in return for advantageous freight rates on select classes of certain products.



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GOVERNOR MAY CALL TROOPS TO STOP STRIKE KILLINGS

that Sheriff Houghton left the selection of the Deputy Sheriffs to Jerry O'Brien's detective agency in Newark, and that none of the men who engaged in yesterday's assault on the strikers had been regularly sworn in by the Sheriff himself. Gill has heard that when forty deputies arrived by train from Newark on Monday they had guns and blackjacks in their hands before they detrained at Carteret.

The contract O'Brien is said to have with the chemical plants calls for the payment of \$7 a day to each of the so-called deputies. O'Brien himself gets a bonus of \$3,000 if the strike is settled within a month; \$2,000 if it takes two months to bring the strike to a finish, and \$1,000 in case it is concluded in three months.

One of those who fell under the deputies' volley yesterday, Carman Patty of Chrome, is now at death's door in the Alexian Brothers' Hospital at Elizabeth and cannot live out the day, the doctors say. A bullet through the abdomen is expected to prove fatal. The striker's left arm was shattered by another bullet. It is said that three others are still in a critical condition.

STRIKERS GATHER TO WATCH INCOMING TRAINS.

Early in the morning about 100 of the 900 men on strike assembled without arms and in an orderly manner at the Jersey Central Railroad Station to meet incoming trains which, it was reported, would bring reinforcements to the 150 strike-breakers imported by the Liebig plant yesterday. Detectives of the

railroad were assembled at the station to protect railroad property, but there was no demonstration of a deputies' force such as that which precipitated yesterday's fatal affray.

When trains came in with no strikebreakers aboard them the strikers went to their homes quietly. It is now pretty definitely established that during the night the beleaguered chemical companies executed a hasty flank movement to protect the men responsible for yesterday's unprovoked volleying. During the dark hours all of the forty-odd "specials" hired to guard the Williams & Clark and Liebig & Co.'s plants, who had charged upon the strikers and shot them down with rifle ball and buckshot, were quietly ferried across the Arthur Kill to the Staten Island shore and there put on the train for St. George and New York.

Other deputies, the strikers believe, were brought across in small boats from the Staten Island shore to take the place of the men who were smuggled out of the State. The exact force which the two companies have within their gates now is unknown. Strikers say they have 100.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY STILL PURSUING INQUIRY.

W. Edwin Florence, Prosecutor of Middlesex County, who began an investigation yesterday as soon as he could arrive on the scene of the shooting, continued it to-day. With the evidence of more than 100 of the strikers already in his possession, he planned to go to Elizabeth to-day and question those of the wounded men in hospitals there who were not too weak to answer his queries.

The Prosecutor announced to-day that he would not order arrests of any one until he had completed his examination and laid the facts before the Grand Jury. The Prosecutor takes issue with Police Chief Harrington, who characterized yesterday's outbreak as "cold blooded murder." Florence said he had been told by some of the deputies that they did not shoot until the strikers tried to wreck

the train on the Jersey Central line by piling ties across the track. Prosecutor Stein of Union County, in which Elizabeth is situated, is cooperating with the Middlesex law officer in obtaining the statements of the ten wounded men in Elizabeth hospitals.

State Senator Charles M. Egan of Jersey City, in announcing his intention to call for a legislative investigation of the strike trouble, made the following statement to The Evening World to-day:

WILL ASK SENATE TO MAKE AN INQUIRY.

"The tragic account of the frightful slaughter by hired gunmen at Roosevelt, N. J., is horrifying. It is mighty near time the authorities awoke to a sense of the responsibility which rests upon them to protect the people of New Jersey from the murderous attacks of imported assassins. The laws are sufficiently specific and direct and the authorities who are sworn and bound to enforce them, but for reasons best known to themselves, neglected to perform their duties, should immediately be brought

to justice for what clearly appears to be malfeasance.

"There is no condoning such willful neglect. I shall advocate a full and complete legislative investigation and I shall insist that those who are responsible for this blot upon the fair name of New Jersey shall suffer.

"If private corporations can do what no citizen of this State can do, employ gunmen and thugs to enforce their arbitrary rulings against their employees, it is about time their privilege is curtailed.

NAVY SHORT 10,000 MEN.

Admiral Fletcher Doubles His Estimate of War Footing Needs.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—Rear Admiral Fletcher, commanding the Atlantic Fleet, has written a letter to Chairman Faggett of the House Naval Affairs Committee stating that the fleet would have a shortage of approximately 10,000 men if the navy were put on a war footing.

Admiral Fletcher said that after going over reports of his Captains he had found that there would be a shortage of approximately 1,000 men in the first line battleships, which, with the shortage for the vessels now in reserve, would make about double the number he had estimated in his recent testimony before the committee.
