White Star Liner Carries Biggest Mail on Record.
The White Star Line received this morning a wireless from Capt. W. Finch of the steamer Arabic, bound here from Liverpool, that he would be in quarantine at 3 o'clock to-morrow morning and at the dock about 8 o'clock.
The Arabic has 200 cabin passengers and 250 in the storeroom.
She brings 5,000 sacks of mail, the largest mail ever brought to New York from the other side in one steamer trip.

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MAN CAPTURED ON WOMAN'S TIP IN MURDER MYSTERY

John Thomas Accused of Shooting "Murray Hennessey" Last October.

FOUND IN HONOLULU.

Suspect Owned Race Horse String—Pals Implicated in Holdup Here.

Betrayed into the hands of the police by a woman with whom he had quarrelled, "Scotch" Thomas, known as "Young Scotch," who has figured in many shootings and has been arrested a number of times, was brought here to-day from San Francisco, under indictment for the murder on Oct. 13, 1914, of Moritz Apfelbaum, known as "Murray Hennessey," who was called from a saloon at Seventh Avenue and Fifth Street by a woman and shot by two men.

Well dressed and appearing prosperous, Thomas admitted at Police Headquarters that while he was a fugitive from justice he was living in Honolulu, and was racing a string of horses in the States under an assumed name.

When Thomas, whose right name is said to be John Thomas, was arrested by San Francisco detectives at Los Angeles at the request of the New York Police he was accompanied by two men who were also taken into custody. When their photographs were sent here they were recognized by John Neale, cashier of the Beckett & Wilhelms Company of Greenpoint, as two of the men who attempted to hold him up on Aug. 7 last. Philip T. White, manager for John W. Masury & Son, paint manufacturers, in Brooklyn, has been indicted in connection with the attempted holdup and Kings County detectives are go-

ing to Los Angeles to bring the two men, Benjamin Hall and Charles Williams, to Brooklyn.
Both Apfelbaum and Thomas were well known in the underworld and the police say they have information that they had quarrelled over money matters a short time before Apfelbaum was called from the saloon by a woman said to have been known as Made Marshall. Lieut. Regan, who brought Thomas from the west, was standing near the corner at the time of the shooting and Apfelbaum died in his arms. Thomas Barrett was arrested on the scene and is in the Tombs awaiting trial in connection with the case. A month after the shooting Thomas was indicted and when the

police want to look for him it was found that he had disappeared.
The police have not revealed the identity of the woman who first gave the information that Thomas was in Honolulu, and for her protection it is said her name will remain a secret. Soon after she communicated with the New York Police the police of Los Angeles and San Francisco were asked to watch for him, and on Feb. 12, as he stepped from a steamer, he was taken. Lieut. Regan and Detective Daly went after him with extradition papers signed by Gov. Whitman.
The detectives said that Thomas gave them no trouble on the trip,

but was much concerned as to the success of his stable. He told them he had several horses running and was particularly jubilant when he learned that "Rica Straw" won at 1 to 1. He claimed to own the horse. He was asked about this at Police Headquarters and said:
"Do you think I'm a boob? I'm not going to tell what I own. They're not running in my name, and I don't want to be ruled off the turf."
Both Thomas and the man he is accused of having shot were well known to the police. Apfelbaum was questioned concerning the death of Meyer Moore, at "May's Landing," a saloon owned by a woman known as "May" on Catharine Street, in May, 1901.
