MAN FOUND SLAIN, WITH A DYNAMITE BOMB LYING NEAR

Police Suspect Black Hand of Murder in Brooklyn Yard.

George Pirrone, thirty-five, left his home, No. 321 Carroll Street, Brooklyn, at 4 A. M. to-day. His wife says he went out to look for work as a laborer...

Frederick Cook, Superintendent of the Marine Crick Co., manufacturer of heavy machinery, found the body of Pirrone at 8.30 o'clock, stretched in the snow of that company's yard, in Sixth Street, between Second and Third Avenues, Brooklyn.

Dr. Fauberg of the Holy Family Hospital said the man had been dead a few hours. There were deep athlete wounds in his right eye, abdomen, right thigh, left thigh and right hand.

The police think that Pirrone went to the machinery yard, which is in a lonely place, to keep an appointment and that he was murdered before he had a chance to fight or cry out.

Detectives Meall and Pucciano are looking for Black Handers as the possible assassins. A more thorough search of the machinery yard revealed a neatly made bomb under a boiler within five feet of the dead man.

The detectives believe that Pirrone was enticed to the region with the prospect of getting money from some one, and that he was stabbed on the sidewalk, then carried into the yard. They say now that they found the stiletto on the sidewalk.

Safe Robber Who Beat Woman Gets Ten Years.

Judge Dike, in the County Court in Brooklyn to-day, sentenced William Bertolini to Sing Sing Prison for not less than ten or more than twenty years. Bertolini was convicted a week ago of being one of four men who went to the home of John Rossi in a taxicab, beat and bound Mrs. Rossi and carried off a safe containing about \$10,000.

BARRETT WOULD CURB LEGISLATIVE POWER

Favors Depriving Lawmakers of the Privilege of Originating Appropriations.

ALBANY, April 5.—William Barrett, Republican leader, speaking to the Albany Chamber of Commerce to-day on the Constitutional Convention which meets to-morrow said: "I favor greater limitation upon the legislative power than exists at the present time. The Legislature should be deprived of the power of originating appropriations, but it should grant or reduce a budget made by a State Board of Finance."

WHITMAN PUTS OFF P. S. BOARD ACTION

Notifies McCall and Others Not to Appear Before Him To-Morrow.—No Decision on Charges.

ALBANY, April 5.—Gov. Whitman to-day notified Chairman McCall and Commissioners Cram, Williams and Wood of the down-State Public Service Commission that he would not expect them to appear before him to-morrow. The date to which the hearing on charges of inefficiency and misconduct in office against them was adjourned. Coincidentally he announced he would not determine tomorrow his decision on the charges.

MAYO PAYS GIRL \$5,000 TO SETTLE HER SUIT

Susan Wahlers Had Charged Manufacturer With Being Her Child's Father.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 5.—Virgil J. Mayo, the millionaire radiator manufacturer, to-day settled the suit of Susan M. Wahlers, who charged him with being the father of her two-year-old daughter, by paying approximately \$5,000.

A check for almost that sum was given by Mayo's lawyer to the girl's attorney and her suit will be dropped.

STOCKS IN A WHIRL ON MOST ACTIVE DAY SINCE WAR STARTED.

Skyrocket Boom Followed by Violent Fluctuations.—Amer. Loco. and Beth. Steel Zigzag.

The Stock Exchange to-day had its busiest session since the war began. Between 10 and 1 o'clock \$20,000 shares of stock were sold, more than the average for an entire day during the past year.

It started off with a skyrocket boom in many volatile securities, notably American Locomotive, Bethlehem Steel, Maxwell Motors and Erie. Various standard issues were strong and higher.

Violent fluctuations followed in highly speculative stocks. American Locomotive went up six points, then down three. Bethlehem Steel rose to 51 and fell back to 52. Iron-ore fractional traders were scotched in the rapid rise and fall of so many stocks. On the whole the tendency was upward from the level of last week, based on growing confidence in good times ahead.

EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY CUTS OFF MANY TOWNS

District of Avellino, Scene of Ruin Disaster, Strongly Shaken and Effect Not Known.

ROME, April 5.—Strong earthquake shocks were felt to-day all over the district extending from Avellino to Benevento, and within fifty miles of Rome, according to dispatches received here. Avellino, which was the scene of the recent disaster, is fifty miles east of Rome and lies forty miles to the northwest. Communication with both cities and with several other towns in the region shaken has been interrupted since early to-day.

Rome experienced a slight shock at 7:20 A. M., and while there was much alarm in the city no damage was done.

The shock was also felt at Cassino, sixty miles north of Florence, where a panic resulted, although no loss of life or property is reported.

A huge rock was loosened in the mountains overlooking the village of Petrelli and, it is feared, will crash down and destroy the place. The residents have fled.

FINE OF \$200,000 FOR NEW JERSEY CENTRAL

Railroad Convicted of Rebating to Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company.

TRENTON, N. J., April 5.—The Central Railroad of New Jersey was to-day fined \$200,000 in the United States District Court by Judge Hellstadius for having been convicted of rebating to the Lehigh Coal and Navigation Company.

The road was fined \$8,000 on twenty-five on the 185 counts against it.

MRS. LESLIE'S NURSE SUES FOR \$25,000

Caring for Publisher's Widow in Her Last Days Brought Apoplexy Upon Miss Frey, She Alleges.

For rendering extraordinary services to the late Mrs. Frank Leslie during her last days and at the time of her death in September last year, Miss Frey today brought suit for \$25,000 in the Supreme Court against Louis H. Cramer and William Nassau Crowwell, administrators of Mrs. Leslie's estate.

Mrs. Leslie's estate, valued at more than \$1,000,000, was left to the care of women's suffrage. She inherited it from her husband, the famous publisher. Two nephews of her husband are contesting the will.

Miss Frey asks for a large sum, it is stated, because of Mrs. Leslie's frailty and peculiar mental condition during her illness. As a result of her close association with the publisher's widow, Miss Frey alleges, she suffered a stroke of apoplexy shortly after her patient's death.

"My experience has permanently incapacitated my usefulness and my life has been shortened," says Miss Frey. "My duties to Mrs. Leslie were performed under exacting and humiliating circumstances on account of Mrs. Leslie's abnormal mental condition."
