

BARNES GETS A SURPRISE WHEN WHITMAN LETTER IS READ

(Continued from First Page)

Mr. Barnes, on the other hand, expressed to friends that he did not so take it. He was inclined to the belief that Mr. Whitman meant Tompkins as the party in control, because the Democrats were then in the saddle at Albany, and responsible for the alleged corruption in State government. There will be no ill-feeling between Mr. Barnes and Gov. Whitman because of this letter, under present conditions.

ROOSEVELT SAID IT REFERRED TO BARNES. Mr. Roosevelt was pleased to interpret it as referring directly to Mr. Barnes and the Republican machine. He said so on the witness stand in answer to the single question asked concerning it.

Mr. Roosevelt was asked: "Did you see this in the spring of 1914?" A. Yes. Q. How did you happen to see it? A. Mr. Charles H. Duell gave it to me upon my return from South America, May, 1914.

ASKED TO MAKE ANOTHER CHANGE IN TESTIMONY. The Colonel had testified the other day under cross-examination that he had not, as President, instituted legal proceedings against certain named corporations who had been among his campaign contributors. He now wished to change his testimony, and under questioning by Mr. Bowen, he said his memory had been refreshed.

Q. What did you do in the case of the New Haven Railroad? A. After investigation I directed legal proceedings taken against it. Q. About the Harvester company? A. I had an investigation made by the Bureau of Corporations, which reported that its conduct was entirely proper.

Q. And the Dupont Powder Company? A. Proceedings were undertaken by my order in 1907. Q. Now as to the United States Steel Corporation? A. An investigation was started but was not finished until after I left the Presidency.

ATTENDANTS COULDN'T STOP THE APPLAUSE. Col. Roosevelt entered a few minutes before proceedings began. His appearance was the signal for a hysterical outbreak of applause by the women. They clapped their gloved hands, beamed on him with smiles

and laughter of approval. Some rose from their seats and gave him the Chattanooga salute. Court attendants rushed for order, but the women would not stop.

PEEVED WHEN IVINS MAKES AN OBJECTION. At this point Mr. Ivins interrupted, saying: "If this is to go on I shall insist on going fully into the subject and introducing the report of the Standard Investigating Committee showing that when the action took place the panic was over."

ADVISES LIME for Tuberculosis. According to the Journal of the American Medical Association (July 27, 1912, Page 203), Dr. C. F. HE ACCEPTED TO GRATIFY PRESIDENT M'KINLEY. Later he said: "I accepted to gratify President McKinley."

I notified the Attorney General to come around and meet the two, but he was in Baltimore and could not get back in time. I then asked Ellihu Root to come.

MESSRS. FRICK AND GARY REPORTED TO ME THAT IF THE STEEL CORPORATION— THAT IS, IF THE J. P. MORGAN COMPANY— TOOK POSSESSION THAT MORNING AT ONCE OF THE TENNESSEE COAL AND IRON COM-
