

POLICE IN FIGHT WITH CRACKSMEN PROVE POOR SHOTS

Only Two Against Six, Burglars Escaped Fusillade and Wounded One Policeman.

HOTEL GUESTS AROUSED

Much Excitement at Broadway and Sixty-Sixth Street in Early Morning Hours.

Guests of the Marie Antoinette Hotel and apartment houses in the neighborhood of Sixty-sixth Street and Broadway were aroused at 2 o'clock this morning by a fusillade of pistol shots fired in a battle between six policemen and two safe-blowers. One of the policemen, William C. Morris, a rookie, was wounded once in the neck and twice in the left foot.

A woman who lives at No. 128 West Sixty-sixth Street discovered the cracksmen while they were trying to get into Grunck's furnishing goods store in the Lincoln Arcade Building, No. 195 Broadway. Fearing to telephone the police she slipped on some clothing, crept to the street and then hurried to the West Sixty-eighth Street Station.

Morris and Policeman Drescher were sent to the place. On the way they picked up Policeman Meier. The three men then went into a dark alleyway alongside No. 128 West 66th Street, which forms a "T" in the rear of the Arcade. They were in the top part of the "T" and as they reached the main stem Morris saw two men, one of them wearing a straw hat.

"Hands up, we're policemen," he cried. The reply was eight shots from automatic pistols. Wounded in the foot, Morris reeled, and as he did so a bullet struck him in the neck.

Drescher grabbed his partner just as he was falling, supported him with one arm and with the other returned the fire of the two robbers. Policemen Stewart Miller, Michael Lasky and Walter Fitzgerald and Sergeant O'Grady, attracted by the shots, ran into the alleyway.

The cracksmen, having exhausted the ammunition in their pistols, were reloading. Miller fired and brought forth another fusillade from the two at bay, who then crawled through an open window in the basement of the Arcade and were lost to sight. Morris was carried out into Sixty-

sixth Street by Drescher, who called a taxicab and took him to the Polytechnic Hospital. After his wounds had been dressed he was sent to his home at No. 80 West One Hundred and Twenty-first Street.
