

TRAPPED "BANKER" IN HIS FLAT WITH \$50,000 IN DRUGS

Police Discover "Charles Baldwin" Is an Old Friend, "Yogi" Samri Ellis.

NEIGHBORS GAVE TIP.

Prisoner Paid \$15,000 in Pittsburgh for Stock to Sell Here.

Charles Baldwin was a respectable retired banker when he was arrested last night, but he boasted that he was Samri Ellis, a noted "Yogi" when he was lined up with the other prisoners at Police Headquarters today. He threw out his chest and marched up and down before the detectives and smiled patronizingly as he said, "Yes, I am the Yogi, Samri Ellis."

He had been occupying a fine apartment for the last two weeks at No. 171 West One Hundred and Fourth Street. Some one wrote to Acting Captain Cooper of the West One Hundred and Fourth Street police that the man was selling cocaine, morphine, etc., to grown people in the neighborhood and that he dealt in tags for little children, the tags being hollow and loaded with drugs.

When Detectives Finan and Riley followed him into his apartment, the "banker," as he was described by his neighbors, was indignant for a while, but when the officers hailed him as an old friend he grinned and admitted that they were right.

In four trunks which Baldwin had brought from Philadelphia the detective found trays with false bottoms packed with drugs. Among the contents were \$6,000 morphine tablets, 220 bottles of cocaine, ten bottles of white fluid, supposed to be "knock-out drugs," dozens of tops loaded with drugs, surgical instruments and a big memorandum book full of entries in a secret code giving the histories of wealthy New Yorkers.

"Baldwin" seemed to be proud of himself when he was put in the lineup at Police Headquarters today. He stroked his brown Van Dyke beard and smiled complacently at his captors.

"That stuff of mine," he said, "cost me \$10,000 in Pittsburgh, and I could have sold it for \$20,000 here. I'm sorry you called."

"Baldwin's" finger prints corresponded exactly with those of Samri Ellis, the fake "Yogi" on record at Headquarters as No. 24,231 in the Rogues Gallery. Ellis was arrested in June, 1910, after the body of Paul Hamburger, his secretary, was found in his office, No. 9 West Forty-fifth Street. Hamburger had willed his inheritance of \$50,000 and had threatened suicide. Ellis was held a while, charged with murder, but was set free.

Ellis was sent to the workhouse in December, 1910, for telling fortunes. The same offense cost him sixty days in prison in Philadelphia a few months later. A man calling himself Charles Baldwin was sent to Sing Sing from New York in 1911 for the Blue Ridge mining swindle. An Eastern Yogi, Baldwin read the stars and said they commanded Charles Poppe, a worthy Jersey butcher, to buy Blue Ridge. Poppe went in for \$1,500. The adventure cost Baldwin two years and six months.

The prisoner was sent to the West Side Court, where Special Agent Eatebrook of the Federal Department of Justice claimed him. The department has complaints against him for selling drugs in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh. The list of names of wealthy persons found in Baldwin's trunk is supposed to be the groundwork for a fine blackmailing scheme. The police say the Yogi read the palms of servants, told them flattering fortunes and incidentally got a mass of information about their employers that could be used in blackmailing operations.

\$480 IN HER HAIR 'RAT' SHE STOLE, MUNDE SAYS

Woman Companion of Alleged Pick-pocket Carried Twenty Bottles of Diluted Morphine.

Two women in the lineup at Police Headquarters this morning were charged with being pickpockets. They were May Miller, twenty-four, of No. 157 West Sixty-sixth Street, and Frances Stewart, twenty-four, of No. 204 West Forty-sixth Street. Frank Munde of No. 217 St. Nicholas Avenue, Brooklyn, said that May Miller last night snatched him and asked for directions to the Grand Central Station. While he was directing her the other woman was standing back of him and walked away. Munde noticed a curious lightness in a back pocket of his trousers and he found he was minus \$480.

Munde started after the women and they lifted their skirts and stiffly shouting "Stop thief!" he chased them through Thirty-fourth Street to Broadway, where they turned north and ran through the crowds coming out of theatres. Detectives Daly and Kaufman, of the Second Branch, heard the cries and captured the women.

In the West Thirtieth Street Police station a mother searched the women. A suspicious looking "rat" in May Miller's hair disclosed just \$480 in a bundle carried by Frances Stewart, twenty bottles of diluted morphine were found and an additional charge of violating the Anti-Drug Law was made against her.

HIBBEN HITS AT PACIFISTS.

He Takes Stand for "Preparedness Against War."

LAKE MOHONK, N. Y., May 19.—Dr. John Otis Hibben, President of Princeton University, stirred the Lake Mohonk Conference on International Arbitration today by taking issue with pacifists who favor disarmament and by advocating "a wise preparedness of our military forces in the United States."

"I do not advocate preparedness for war," he said, "but a preparedness against war—a preparedness which in the event of the catastrophe of war itself will prevent the enormous total sacrifice of human lives which has characterized every war in which the United States has been engaged throughout our past history. No one," he declared, "can be so blind regarding the significance of present conditions as to take the position that a grave national emergency is not at least a possibility."

William Chalmers, a fireman attached to Engine Company No. 5, at No. 100 Duane Street, fractured his left ankle and suffered contusions of both legs early this morning when he fell through the pole pit from the second floor to the ground in the engine quarters when going for a drink of water.


