

JOHN H. ELDERT DEAD.

Was Long Prominent in the Affairs of Queens Borough.

John H. Eldert, one of the leading citizens of Queens Borough, and a member of the firm of Tomblay & Eldert, road builders, of Jamaica, died at his home at Lefferts and Stewart Avenues, Richmond Hill, this morning of a complication of diseases.

Mr. Eldert was one of the moving spirits of the Volunteer Firemen's Association of the borough. He was the organizer and chief engineer of the Richmond Hill volunteer firemen, to which he gave its first hook and ladder, and later a fire alarm bell, which was placed on the town hall.

Mr. Eldert was born in New Lots, East New York, Feb. 1, 1853. He was the organizer and director of the First National Bank of Jamaica.

Worker Burned by Third Rail.

Water Parsons, an ironworker, of No. 343 East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth Street, Manhattan, was seriously shocked and burned when the electric trolley he was riding on the remodeled elevated structure on Fulton Street, near Union Avenue, Brooklyn, to-day touched the third rail. WALL STREET.

Stock market opened quiet, with business almost entirely confined to industrials, in some of which good-sized advances were shown. Dealings were professional, as customers in commission houses seemed determined to await publication of note to Germany. Westinghouse opened with 3,500 shares from 109 1/2 to 108, compared with violent advance at the close of yesterday to 110 1/2 and last price of 109 1/2.

There was selling pressure on Canadian Pacific and price declined to 123, the lowest since 1907. A large volume of selling was met on opening advance and prices reacted a little.

Except in a few industrial issues there was no trading to speak of in early afternoon. Baldwin Locomotive stock's rise to 747 1/2, a new high level, brought out a lot of stock and prices reacted. Bethlehem declined and stocks in general sagged off.

Westinghouse was active between 109 1/2 and 107 1/4. American Coal Products was lively, advancing to 145 1/2, a gain of 14 points, but reacted later to 138. Cuban-American Sugar rose to 113 7/8, up 12 points.

ITEMS FOR INVESTORS.

Electric Boat stock advanced 23 points to 255 soon after the opening and reacted to 240 around noon. Standard Motors stock advanced 3 1/2 points to 12 1/2.

Wabash Railroad Company sold for \$18,000,000. Reorganization plan calls for assessment of \$10 a share on the stock.

American Brass Company quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent and an extra 1 per cent was declared.

Republic Iron and Steel Company at meeting next month is expected to declare dividends of 1 1/2 per cent quarterly on the preferred stock, as company is well prepared to resume dividends. Unpaid dividends on preferred stock amount to 13 1/2 per cent.

Eastman Kodak Company declared extra dividend of 5 per cent on common stock, payable Sept. 1 to stock of record Aug. 7.
