

**SAM PINCUS, BROKE IN FIGHT WITH TRUST, ENDS LIFE WITH GAS**

East Side Politician and Poultry Dealer Kept Threat When His Money Went.

When the Poultry Trust had got Sam Pincus's last dollar—when he found that he could not get credit to buy chickens for the approaching Jewish holidays—he bought a gas tube and ended his life. This happened in the flat at No. 434 East Ninth Street early today.

Pincus was sixty-four years old and prided himself on being a gambler above everything else. He had lost and won thousands at the race track years ago. He was the intimate of old turf celebrities like Dave Gideon and Pittsburgh Phil. He was one of the wealthy Jews whose influence was always secured by Tammany Hall at election time. He regarded Pat Keenan, David Lazarus, Judge Newburger, Sam Koenig and Judge Hoffman as his personal friends. He had helped them all on occasion. He was a member of the Jefferson Club and the Federal Club, and while his money was plentiful he was active in both.

In the days of his affluence Pincus lived at No. 243 Seventh Street, a few doors away from Judge Hoffman. This was but a few years ago.

He was then reputed to be worth several hundred thousand dollars. He had some disastrous ventures through which he lost much money and about this time the Poultry Trust began to make its influence felt. Pincus fought it while his money lasted and when he had but a few thousands left he moved from his comfortable home into the Ninth Street flat.

He took with him much of his expensive furniture. He hung on the walls of the cheap apartment paintings which he was loath to part with. His dining room chairs were costly articles. These he refused to sell even when he needed money. He feared poverty and he frequently said:

"When they get all I have except my home I shall take a carbonic cocktail."

He was induced to put some money into a moving picture venture which failed and this loss helped make him penniless. He borrowed enough to give him poultry stock for a week and the trust shut down on him. He was found dead in the bathroom by his wife, and the room was filled with gas.

Mrs. Pincus, his widow, who is a woman of good presence and used to the good things in this life was completely bent with grief to-day. She is his only surviving relative. Pincus will be buried from his late home to-morrow, the interment being at the Bayview Cemetery. Coroner Hellenstein who was a personal friend viewed the body and gave a burial permit.

An Evening World reporter made inquiry among the poultry dealers regarding the pressure exerted to-day by the trust. He found that the price charged dealers was twenty cents a pound for live chickens. The retail price was twenty-two cents. The price charged for killing chickens is one cent each, giving the dealer a profit of one cent a pound. "How can we pay for help and light to say nothing of rent?" was the query.

**ELOPED AS FATHER PRAYED.**


Mother Helped Match Opposed by Head of Family.


