CORD MURDER CASE MAY BE CLEARED UP BY AN AUTO PLATE

Found Near Scene, It Is Expected to Help Trace Car That Carried Body.

WOMAN IN THE CASE

Many Autoists Saw "Green Car Without a Number Plate" on Lonely Road.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—The finding of an automobile number plate at Merchantville, near Delair, is expected to-day to lead straight to the murderer of Samuel Cord, the wealthy real estate operator of Laurel Springs. The plate is believed to have been lost from the green automobile in which the bullet-riddled body was carried to a lonely spot in the River Road, near Camden. Eight automobilists who passed the murder car and were ordered away by a man standing guard over a body agree that the car bore no number plate. Prosecutor Kraft expects through the plate to find the woman in the case. Mr. Kraft learned to-day that Olaf Peterson of Hiverton, who is held as a "material witness against John Doe, the murderer of Samuel Cord," has sought to obtain his release by habeas corpus proceedings. The Prosecutor announced he would combat any move made by Peterson in the courts on the ground that Peterson was withholding information that might lead to the discovery of the murderer of Samuel S. EXTRA WARSHIP GUARD FOR HARBOR DURING THICK FOG

Three Destroyers Go Through Haze to Keep Interned Ships From Escaping.

BIG FLEET OF VESSELS

Incoming and Departing Ships Have Busy Time Dodging Collisions in Mist.

It is the first thick fog of the autumn that brooded the harbor this morning there was unusual activity on the part of the navy destroyers that guard the Narrows to prevent interned ships slipping out. Ordinarily two destroyers lie at anchor off Quarantine station, but to-day there were three on duty, darting about through the gray haze that lay like a broom on the rippling water. A fleet of craft from wide world ports lay at anchor or crept cautiously in both Upper and Lower Bays. Some were trying to get into port and others wriggled their way out. A liner from Greece, crowded to the guards with immigrants, halted at the upper end of Ambrose Channel, and an Italian carrier had crawled up to the Narrows and was held there in mid-channel, blind and helpless, by a combination of fog, quarantine doctors and customs officials. The destroyers ran down all the craft and circled around them in the mist to make out their identity. One of the navy sentinels appeared in a new disguise, different from any of the concealing war paint color schemes that have been tried before. It was an improvement over the recent black and lead colored ripple effect of alternate lines running lengthwise along the long low side of the craft. The latest is the stone scheme of alternating sectional blocks. The bow is painted a shining silver gray, to imitate the curling of a wave with its back of this comes a segment of duller lead color and next a block of black. The lead and the black then alternate to the stern. Seldom has the harbor been so filled with merchant ships as to-day. They lie in triple lines at anchor on both sides of the channel in the Upper Bay and some down below the Narrows. Gravesend Bay is no longer popular for anchorage of allied ships, because the interned German ship Magdeburg, loaded with dynamite, still lies in the middle of the sweep. Until she is moved up Long Island Sound the deep sea craft that come to New York for cargoes of food stuffs and munitions of war give her a wide berth.

SENATOR LEWIS GOES TO FREE AMERICANS

Will Make Personal Appeal for Those in German Detention Camps.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Senator James Hamilton Lewis of Illinois will sail for Europe on the Ryndam of the Holland-America Line on Sept. 14. He has special letters to American representatives in Holland, Germany, France and Great Britain. The purpose of his visit is to make personal efforts to have released from German detention camps a number of his constituents. It is said Germany has detained scores of persons from Chicago and Western Illinois, and Senator Lewis thinks he can secure their release. He has passports to Holland, Germany, France and Great Britain. He will return to this country before Congress meets.

CROWDED AUTO RAMS A TREE

Eight Occupants Get Bad Shakeup—Driver Held on Two Charges.

Eight persons in a five-passenger motor car were well shaken up, and one of them, Mrs. Annie Kehoe of No. 174 East Eighty-fifth Street, was slightly injured about the head, when the car struck a tree early to-day on the Ocean Parkway. The car was driven by the Projector Company, which has a New York office at No. 60 Wall Street, and the chauffeur, Andrew Carullo, was arrested in the Flatbush Police Court, charged with driving the car out without the owner's permission. James Kehoe, husband of Mrs. Annie Kehoe, John Ertel and two other men and two more women were in the car at the time, but no one else was hurt. The front of the car was badly wrecked.
