

# 19 KILLED ON BUS BY ZEPPELIN BOMB IN RAID ON LONDON

Frederic R. Couderc Describes Thrilling Sight as Viewed From a Lamp Post.

## SIX BOMBS FELL NEAR

People on House Tops Cheered as Shells of Guns Burst Near Raiding Aircraft.

Passengers who arrived to-day on the Holland-America liner Rotterdam and the Cunard liner Orduna told stories of the Zeppelin raids on London on Sept. 7 and 8. Some of them said there was no excitement or panic, while others asserted the people fled to the streets or into cellars. The report was that a bus had been struck by a bomb and all the nineteen persons in it were blown out of existence.

Frederic R. Couderc described the Zeppelin raid during the night of Sept. 8.

"I was at the home of Phillip Burne-Jones," said Mr. Couderc. "When we were startled by the sound of heavy firing. I ran out into Egeon Terrace and climbed the pedestal of a street lamp; a little later I realized that entrance, incidentally, to give Austin Chamberlain a chance to have a look.

"A score of searchlights were groping through the sky. At least one of them picked out a Zeppelin, showing its whole yellow cylinder hanging, as

Miss E. B. Davis, head nurse in the hospital at Brye, Mary, who has been with the American Ambulance Hospital in Paris for five months, was among the passengers. Miss Davis was enthusiastic over the party in which she had been accompanied by American surgeons.

"I have seen men come in with their whole lower jaws shot away," she said, "and the surgeons have taken ribs and made new jaws out of them. Noses have been built out of other bones and cartilage, and some of the soldiers have entirely new faces."

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Miss A. S. Tatham of Sydney, Australia, said she was stopping at the Victoria Hotel on the Thames Embankment the night of September 8. She was awakened by the whirring of engines, and stepped out on her balcony.

"There was the Zeppelin, hanging in the sky like a great, fat sausage," she said, "with two searchlights from different parts of the city converging on it. The bursting of the shrapnel shells from the anti-aircraft guns was most spectacular. Down on the street people were streaming out of the houses in their nightclothes, running into cellars and showing every sign of fear.

"After about fifteen minutes of bombardment, one of the guns in the city seemed to find its mark and the bow of the Zeppelin began to sink. She righted herself in a few moments and rose out of sight.

The next day I saw a six-story tenement that had been placed from top to bottom by a bomb. There must have been many persons killed there. The Ophthalmic Hospital had every pane of glass in it broken and the plaster fell from the ceilings so heavily that all the blind soldiers and other patients had to be taken out into the square for the night. Two other hospitals were damaged also."

# BRITAIN USING BOYCOTT TO RULE U. S. WORLD TRADE

Raw Material Cut Off Unless Firms Agree to Sell Only by British Consent.

That the British Government is dictating to American manufacturers the terms under which they may do business with the rest of the world and enforcing its demands through the "boycott" and "blacklist" is shown by documentary and other proof published to-day in The World.

The British activities have been important, far-reaching and successful, but it is not charged they have been actually illegal or secretive. American concerns that refused to accede to Great Britain's demands, however, have been compelled to suffer for it.

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# GERMAN ARTILLERY FACES THE SERBIANS

Announcement in Berlin Bears Out Report of Drive in the Balkans.

BERLIN, via London, Sept. 20.—German artillery has joined the Austrian forces massed along the Serbian frontier, it is officially announced. This tends to confirm reports of an Austro-German drive in the Balkans.

"German artillery has engaged in a duel with Serbian positions near Semendria," said the official statement. "The enemy was driven off and his artillery silenced."

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# FRENCH BLOW UP MUNITIONS DEPOT NORTH OF PERTHES

Official Report Describes Unusually Heavy Fighting at Many Points on Line.

PARIS, Sept. 20.—The official statement given out by the French War Office this afternoon describes great activity on the part of the French artillery at various points along the battle line in France.

A depot of munitions within the enemy's line near Perthes was blown up. The text of the communication follows: "In the Argos district our artillery, last night, delivered a violent bombardment against the works of the enemy and interfered with their provision trains. The German batteries showed particular activity in the environs of Arras and on the front along the Crinchon River, where the cannonading was accompanied by a spirited rifle fire and outbursts from the machine guns.

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She and Olympic Housing British Wounded at the Dardanelles—Mauretania May Follow.

British losses in wounded in the Dardanelles campaign may be guessed at from the fact that the crack Cunard liner Aquitania, one of the largest passenger craft afloat, has been painted white, fitted with medical and surgical supplies and sent to the Dardanelles as a hospital ship. The Olympic has been equipped in the same way and sent to the same place, and the Mauretania, which has been used as a troop ship hitherto, may be needed for the same service.

This information was brought here to-day by the Orduna of the Cunard Line, which left Liverpool with 221 passengers on Sept. 11 and followed her usual course. Miss Ethel H.
