THOUGHT MOTHER WOULD DIE; KILLED HERSELF

Grace Smith Leaves a Note Praising Stepfather for Kindness to Her

Fearing her mother, who has been ill in a hospital several months, would never get well, Miss Grace Smith, twenty-one years old, of No. 610 West One Hundred and Thirty-ninth Street, killed herself by turning on two burners of a kitchen range.

Her stepfather, F. G. Menzel, had hoped to bring the girl's mother home Sunday, and Grace had prepared what her father called "a veritable banquet" in honor of the mother's return. But when Mr. Menzel got back from the hospital he was alone. The

doctor had told him Mrs. Menzel would not be missed.

Yesterday when the stepfather started for his office at No. 11 Battery Place he saw Grace was crying. He asked the reason and she told him it was because of her mother. When he reached home in the evening she was dead. The suicide already had been discovered. Grace left a note expressing gratitude for her stepfather's kindness.

She was a daughter of David Smith, a printing operator, from whom her mother was divorced and who is said to be living here at Hempden, Cal.

Killed to Please From Window

John McDonald, twenty-six years old, a waiter at the Hotel Imperial, who lived on the third floor east of No. 204 East Forty-second Street, was found dead under his window early today. He had been near the window and the police decided he became ill during the night, opened the window for air and fell.

DETECTIVES CATCH MEN ACCUSED OF STEALING AUTOS

Two Under Indictment for Taking Cars Have Been Arrested in Kentucky.

Detectives Owens and Fitzpatrick telegraphed to Police Headquarters today from Middleboro, Ky., that they had arrested there Adolph Bonna-wart and George Jouchelm, chauffeurs, of No. 719 Forest Avenue, the Bronx, who were indicted last Friday by the grand jury of larceny in the first degree. These arrests, Inspector Faurot says, will lead to the apprehension of all the members of a gang of automobile thieves which has stolen sixty cars on the streets of this city in the last five months.

Bonna-wart and Jouchelm, according to the dispatch received from the detectives, have waived extradition and will start for New York in custody today. The detectives who have been working on the automobile thefts believe they will involve in their stories the son of a Washington Heights physician who has been missing since last July, when he tried to sell two cars to George Tighe, an automobile dealer of Princeton, N. J.

A policeman named Bovain of the Adams Street Station in Brooklyn bought a used Saxon car cheap last June, only to find when he set out to trace the ownership that it had been stolen. He reported the matter to Headquarters and it was found that Saxons, Fords and Overland cars were being stolen at the rate of three a week. The thieves took them from in front of apartment houses in Manhattan and from country garages on Long Island.

Sombody in the gang knew all about the secret identification marks and was able to remove or revise these marks. The police finally found that the stolen cars were being sold to men engaged in the operation of "jitney" lines in the Middle West. They have recovered forty cars.

Bonna-wart and Jouchelm were under suspicion. On Sept. 29 they disappeared. Detectives Owens and Fitzpatrick learned that they had stored cars at No. 770 East One Hundred and Fifty-eighth Street, the Bronx. From there the men were traced to Middleboro, to which place they had ridden in an automobile which was stolen from Dr. M. L. Ogan of No. 613 West One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street.

The detectives report that Bonna-wart and Jouchelm were about to start a "jitney" bus line in Middleboro. Besides Dr. Ogan's car in which they had travelled to Kentucky they had two cars which had been shipped to them by rail.

KILLS THREE CHILDREN AND SELF WITH GAS

Destitute Woman Takes Care to Spare Lives of Two Little Strangers She Had in Her Care.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 12.—After shutting the windows and doors of her bedroom and cramping the cracks with newspaper Mrs. Katherine Hager killed herself and her three small children to-day by turning on the gas. The other children, placed under her charge by the Children's Aid Society, were put in another room out of reach of the deadly fumes.

Mrs. Hager's husband died a short time ago, leaving her destitute.

YOUNG RYAN DENIES HE ATTACKED BOY

Christopher J. Ryan, son of Thomas F. Ryan, was charged in a complaint before Magistrate Levy in Yorkville court today with assault in the fourth

degree this morning upon Stephen Anton, a thirteen-year-old boy at the Plaza Hotel. Ryan, who lives at the Plaza Hotel, did not appear in court, but was represented by John Quinn, who had the case put over until Saturday for a hearing in Fordham court.

According to Anton Ryan appeared at the courtroom door and pointed out

a hat which he said was his. The hat was found for the check Ryan reached into the room and took the hat. The boy followed to the street and laid his hand on the arm and Ryan turned, as the boy says, and knocked him down with two flat blows. The hat taken by Ryan belonged to J. E. Youlton, a broker. Ryan's hat, according to Anton, is still in the Plaza Hotel check room. Anton's face is cut under the left eye and the left side of his head

is bruised.

Mr. Ryan, at the Plaza, said he did not want to talk about the case. "My lawyer will be there. I would not intentionally hurt anybody. I did not hit the boy. I may have pushed him a bit."

Ryan, who was arrested after the affair, was held out by Judge Duane at the Plaza as a boy after the arrest.
