Janet Sudder carried her banner, "Suffrage Want Votes," and Marjorie Benton Cook proclaimed on hers that "Authors Want Votes." Some of the identification banners for the occupational groups were also on view; a pretty pink one with a hat on it for the milliners, a purple one embellished with a cash-slip for the retail clerks. A round banner reading "The whole world is woman's sphere" was generally appreciated.

**A LEAGUE TO MEET THE ATTACKS OF MALE ANTIS.**

James Lees Laidlaw has asked Judge Charles L. Guy, Judge William H. Wadhams, Charles C. Burlington, Albert Roe and several other legal lights to form a league "for the purpose of defending the women of New York against the scurrilous attacks of the Man Suffrage Association Opposed to Political Suffrage for Women."

"The association seems to have forgotten the fact that there is still chivalry in this country," declares Mr. Laidlaw—himself apparently forgetting that the Antis are the professional defenders of chivalry! He adds, "It is a pity that our opponents, perhaps because they feel that their cause is lost, have descended to obloquy."

Mrs. Howard Mansfield, Chairman of the Music Committee for the parade, has devised a finish for it which will make one of the most spectacular bits of out of door pageantry ever seen in New York City. There are to be thirty bands in the parade. As the marchers round into the Plaza, band by band will assemble in line, until the thirty groups of musicians are in massed formation in the open square. Meantime all the symbolical figures in the parade, Victory, Equality, Justice, Uncle Sam, Miss Columbia, the twelve Suffrage States and Alaska will be grouped on the steps of the fountain in a picturesque tableau.

At a given signal the hundreds of musical instruments will play the "Star Spangled Banner." As the first notes burst forth, the women grouped at the fountain will raise "Old Glory" on high John George Frank will conduct the thirty bands in this ensemble number. Mr. Pennoyer will be musical marshal to get the bands into their places at the Plaza.

A change of programme has been arranged for some of the figures in the Banner Parade. Miss Marian Parkhurst of Plattsburg, who was to have been Miss Columbia, will take

the role of New York State, and Mrs. Florence Fleming Noyes will impersonate Miss Columbia.

Among the women who will personally carry the twelve enfranchised States will be Maudie Van Dresser and Kathleen Howard, as well as those previously reported.
