The result of the affair was that when Fay and Scholz were captured in the New Jersey woods, Wettig was with them ostensibly to see a test of material and was arrested as a blind, but almost immediately released, his work for the police being completed...

He denied in his latest statement that he had received money from any one he met in this country. He said Bretting, Kienzle and Dasche had no connection with his work, and did not know what he was doing, only suggesting when he asked, where they might obtain explosives...

The charge made by the Government against the men under arrest is under an ancient piracy statute, which is said now to be used for the first time. The punishment for such conspiracy is in the Federal statute-book as follows: Whoever upon the high seas or any other waters within the admiralty and maritime jurisdiction of the United States by surprise or by open force maliciously attacks or seizes upon any vessel belonging to another...

Both Sides Claim Success in a Struggle on Entire Front, Which Has Lasted Five Days.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The fifth day of the great Italian offensive against the entire Austrian front, designed to relieve the pressure on the Serbs by forcing the recall of Austrian troops from the Serbian theatre of war, is progressing with frightful losses on both sides and with both Rome and Vienna claiming important victories.

Gen. Cadorna's forces, says a Turin despatch to the Chronicle, are engaging 800,000 Austrians, of whom some 25,000 are reported to have fallen on the Isonzo and Carso since the pitched field battle began. In the latter sector, following the sixty hours' fierce bombardment of the Austrians' positions, the total haul of prisoners exceeds 100 officers and 5,000 men.

OFFICIAL ITALIAN REPORT. ROME, Oct. 25.—The official statement issued by the General Headquarters of the Italian Army under date of Oct. 25 says: "In the zone situated between Lake Garda and Adige our troops descending from Monte Altissimo da Nago under a crossfire from the enemy's artillery posted on the Blansa and Riva fortifications stormed on the 24th the position of Dossocassino and Dossereit. This, with the heights conquered the 18th and 19th north of Brentonico Crossoeno, gives them complete command of the road from Riva to More by Nago. In the enemy area we found arms, munitions, bombs, field kitchens, searchlights and other war material.

The enemy made three attacks against our new positions in the upper Rienza Valley during the night of the 24th. All of them were repulsed. Our troops followed up the retreating enemy closely and were able to get up to his trenches and make large breaches in the barbed wire entanglements. Further successful raids by our columns in the Fella Valley are reported. In the Monte Nero zone the enemy twice attacked our positions above Trenti, but was repulsed, leaving twenty-one prisoners. He then directed a more violent attack from the summit of Voddi against our line, extending from below Zolotini to Mrali, which he succeeded in piercing and partly occupying. Later, however, our Alpine troops with irresistible dash reconquered the lost trenches, taking seventy prisoners, two of whom were officers. We buried 200 enemy bodies on the scene of the action.

On Santa Paula Heights our troops reached a small eminence between Hill 558 and the hummock situated immediately to the north. The Piava zone we stormed an entrenchment known as Casa Dirova yesterday. The enemy counter-attacked to retake it, but was repulsed with heavy loss, leaving eleven prisoners. On the Carso front during the whole day there was an intense action in the front of the artillery on the lower Isonzo. Our batteries on the lower Isonzo caused a serious outbreak of fire in the environs of Dulno.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN KILLED IN BOMBARDMENT. Berlin Reports Twenty-five Such Casualties in Bulgarian Port of Dedeagatch.

BERLIN (Via Sayville Wireless) Oct. 25.—The Anglo-French bombardment recently destroyed most of Dedeagatch, Bulgaria, and besides the soldiers killed, twenty-five women and children are known to have perished. It was admitted in Sofia reports today.

ASQUITH ATTENDS CABINET MEETING. LONDON, Oct. 25.—Premier Asquith was so much better today that he was able to keep his engagement to attend a Cabinet meeting.

CAVE-IN INQUEST CLOSES. Construction Company Places the Blame on Blasting Foreman. E. N. BREITUNG TO FIGHT FOR NEPHEW ACCUSED IN GERMAN BOMB PLOT. MARQUETTE, Mich., Oct. 25.—E. N. Breitung, Marquette mining man and capitalist, will go to the defense of Max Breitung, his nephew, involved in the alleged pro-German conspiracy to destroy ships carrying munition to the allies. Breitung announced today that he would "back his relative to the limit."

GERMAN SPY EXECUTED. LONDON, Oct. 25.—The following official announcement of a military execution was issued today: "On the serious charge of espionage was found guilty and sentenced to death by hanging on the gallows at the military court of Criminal Appeal on Oct. 25, 1918, a German with a forged American passport was court-martialed."

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FRANCE CHANGES RULE. Follows Britain in Declaring Ship's Nationality is a Question of Fact. The work of the navy is a question of fact. The action of France follows that of Great Britain.

SCORES KILLED BY AIR SHOCKS FROM ZEPPELIN BOMBS

Londoners Slain in Streets Even When Not Hit by Fragments of Shell.

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) LONDON, Oct. 15.—Surgeons in English hospitals who have attended victims of Zeppelin raids give remarkable facts regarding the work of bombs launched from aircraft. Apart from their explosive force, missiles dropped from a height of a mile or two gain such momentum that they do great damage by their disturbance of the air.

More persons in the London area have been killed or wounded in the streets than in buildings. Notwithstanding the warnings of the Government, the inhabitants persist in crowding into the streets, running to windows and going to the house tops when the word that Zeppelins are coming is passed around.

A prominent American resident has mounted a large telescope on the roof of his house. He was entertaining a dinner party on the evening of a recent raid. The party ascended to the roof and had a good view of the spectacle.

BREAK OF THE ALLIES WITH GREECE IS NEAR

Sir Edward Grey Announces That Offer of Cyprus Has Lapsed.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The allies' offer of Cyprus to Greece has lapsed because Greece had not seen its way to helping Serbia, Foreign Minister Sir Edward Grey told the House of Commons today.

A diplomatic break between Greece and the allies was hinted at by the Central News today as a possibility, if allied operations in the Balkans are interfered with by the Greeks' inter-pretation of their neutrality and by the attitude that their treaty with Serbia does not require them to come to the Serbs' aid against Bulgaria.

Another Cabinet crisis has been narrowly averted. During a debate in the Chamber of Deputies a difference of opinion developed between Stephen Dragoumis, Minister of Finance, and Eleutherios Venizelos, former Premier, and leader of the majority party. M. Venizelos reminded the Government that its control of the Chamber depended entirely on the votes of his party. The Chamber was thrown into confusion and the sitting was suspended.

FRENCH DEFEAT THE BULGARS; GERMANS CLAIM BIG SUCCESS

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The report that Turkish troops are being concentrated at Burgas, Varna and other points on the Black Sea coast of Bulgaria is reiterated in advices received here today from Athens. Reuter's correspondent says that the Turks are to oppose Russian attempts to land troops, having replaced the Bulgarians because it was feared the latter could not be counted on to resist the Russians.

A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says: "Five thousand German soldiers from Constantinople are replacing Bulgarians at points on the Black Sea littoral. Defense of the coast has been entrusted to Germany."

SOPIA (Via London), Oct. 25.—The Bulgarian War Office issues the following statement relative to military operations on Oct. 24: "Our troops have captured Negotin and Prahovo on the Danube. The booty, so far now known, is one commissariat storehouse, twenty railway carriages and war material. We captured also one officer, 270 men and found on the battlefield the bodies of 300 Serbs.

"Prince Cyrille and the commander of the army were solemnly received at Uskub." [The last official statement from Sofia before this said that the Bulgarians had captured the greater part of Uskub in Macedonia, but that the fighting there was still in progress on Oct. 23. Prince Cyrille is the second son of King Ferdinand of Bulgaria.]

BALONICA (Via Paris), Oct. 25.—A brigade of British troops leaves Salonica today for Doriania (forty miles northwest of Salonica). The object of the move, so it is stated, is to prepare an advance on Strumitza in conjunction with the French movement by the ally of the Stura valley, when the allied offensive against Bulgaria is undertaken.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Bucharest, Roumania, correspondent of the Times sends the following: "The Serbian troops have withdrawn from the neighborhood of the Danube and the Austrians have crossed the river, traversing the island of Odakale. The Austrian forces will now obtain free passage through Bulgaria from Orsova, where they are now, and lighters laden with munitions have assembled."

The Austrians, having secured mastery of the Danube, are preparing to transport heavy artillery and munitions. The allies have asked the Serbian headquarters to resist the Teutons and Bulgarians for only five days more, by which time effective aid will be forthcoming, says the Daily Telegraph's Nish correspondent under date of Sunday. The correspondent adds that Serbian troops can hold out double that time.

GERMANS CAPTURE A RUSSIAN TOWN FOR SECOND TIME

Von Hindenburg, Prince Leopold and Von Linsingen All Reported to Be Gaining.

BERLIN (Via wireless to Sayville), Oct. 25.—The following report was given out today by the War Office in connection with the war on the Eastern front: "Army of Field Marshal von Hindenburg: The Iloukats sector again has been crossed north of Iloukat. The village of Kasimirshiki, which temporarily was taken by the enemy Sunday, again is firmly held by us.

"Army of Prince Leopold of Bavaria: Russian attacks east of Baranovich and in the vicinity of our positions on the canal south of Lake Vygonovskoye were repulsed. "Army of Gen. von Linsingen: To the east of Kolk and to the west of Czartoryk the enemy positions were stormed during the night of Oct. 25. A general Russian counter-attack was unsuccessful. Further progress was made yesterday. The enemy left in our hands four officers and 1,450 men and ten machine guns.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 25 (via London).—Calls for the overthrow of Premier Bratiano of Roumania were shouted during a meeting yesterday in Bucharest presided over by former Ministers Take Jonescu and Filipescu. A resolution was passed favoring Roumania's intervention in the war to prevent a junction of the Germans, Hungarians and Bulgarians, which is threatening the existence of Roumania.

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GERMANS RETAKE LE MESNIL TRENCH, BERLIN CLAIMS

French Report Covering Fighting in Champagne Says There Was Little Change.

BERLIN, Oct. 26 (Via London).—Following is the text of today's War Office report on the fighting on the western front: "North of Soissons enemy hand grenade attacks were repulsed. "In the fighting which took place Oct. 24 at a salient angle north of Le Mesnil, in the Champagne, about 250 yards of our position fell temporarily into the hands of the enemy. The French yesterday were driven out. Five officers and more than 100 men remained in our hands. Northeast of Le Mesnil the enemy still occupies a small German trench.

"On Combaux Heights our mine explosions were successful. French mining operations in the Bois La Forey achieved no success." "Falling, Oct. 25.—Fighting has continued in the Champagne district at La Courtine with limited fluctuations, according to the announcement made by the French War Office this afternoon. The stubborn French resistance and the offensive activity of the French troops checked the counter attacks of the Germans. Following is the text of the War Office report:

"The close fighting in the Champagne district has continued in the center of the position known as La Courtine, and the fluctuations of the tide of battle have been held to a limited area. The stubborn resistance of our troops and their immediate return to the offensive were successful in breaking the counterattacks of the enemy. "A lively attack to the northeast of Massiges made us master of a German trench close to the positions recently conquered by us."

ROUMANIAN FRONTIER CLOSED TO BULGARS
