

TEUTONS CAPTURE NEW SERBIAN CITY; BULGARS SWEEP ON

London Hears That Monastir
Is Likely to Fall Into
Enemy's Hands.

NEW ARMY TO GREECE.

French and British Said to
Have Appeared With Trans-
ports Off Kavala.

BERLIN, Nov. 2 (via London).—It is officially announced that Caçak, an important railroad junction in Serbia, about thirty miles to the southwest of Kragujevac, has been occupied by the Teutonic forces.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Fear that Monastir, Serbia, has been captured by Bulgarians is expressed in an Athens message to the Evening News. The Serbian main force's communications to the southwest have been cut off, it was stated.

[Monastir is an important Serbian town eight miles north of the Greek frontier and 75 miles from the nearest Bulgarian frontier point. It is connected by rail with Salonica, from which it is distant about 90 miles, to the northwest, in an air line. If the Bulgarians have taken it they must either have cut their way through the Serbo-Franco-British line or made their way around its left wing.]

AMSTERDAM, Nov. 2 (via London).—A new Anglo-French expedition to the Balkans is announced by the Berlin Tagblatt, which publishes a telegram from Sofia stating that British and French transport ships, with troops, have appeared off Kavala, Greece.

[Kavala is on the north coast of the Aegean, in Greece, about twenty miles west of the Bulgarian border. It is eighty miles northeast of the Greek port of Salonica, where the first detachments of British and French troops were landed for the Serbian campaign.]

[Kavala is the nearest Greek port to the Gallipoli peninsula, and might be selected as the landing place in case French and British troops were withdrawn from the peninsula for service against Bulgaria. A Berlin despatch yesterday said troops now on the Serbian front, brought in by way of Salonica, had been sent from the peninsula.]

[A few miles from Kavala is the railroad which runs from Salonica to the Bulgarian port of Dedegatch.]

SERBIANS REPORTED DEFEAT OF TEUTONS ON NORTHERN LINE

PARIS, Nov. 2.—Repulse of the Austro-German forces in the centre of the northern line with great losses is reported in an official Serbian communication received here to-day. One report was dated Oct. 29. Since that date it has been officially announced that the Germans have taken the Serbian arsenal at Kragujevac and that the Bulgars were shelling the outer forts at Nish. Following is the Serbian report:

"On Oct. 29, on the northwestern front, the enemy attacked in force on the right bank of the Peniza and with less strength on the right bank of the Morava."

"In the centre the enemy was thrown back with great losses after having approached within 500 metres of the Serbian positions. On the remainder of the front there were several engagements."

There was no important change south of the Morava. Toward First fighting is continuing, as is also the case to the west of Egnar."

The following statement from the Montenegro War Office under today's date was received here this afternoon:

"On Oct. 31 fighting continued south of Vistegrad, Bosnia. An energetic attack of the enemy was countered successfully."

"On the remainder of the front we have kept up a constant fire on the enemy's positions. At Hagura we captured 100 men, of whom one was an officer, four guns, and one rapid fire. The Austrians left about 60 dead or wounded on the ground, as well as artillery ammunition."

BRITISH AND FRENCH AT ODDS OVER SERBIA, SAYS GERMAN REPORT.

BERLIN, Nov. 2 (by wireless to Bayville).—"The Frankfurter Zeitung," says the Overseas News

Agency, "reports that Gen. Cahnem of the British army, on his return from Serbian headquarters, held a conference in Salonica with Gen. Hamilton, the British Commander, and Gen. Murray, Commander of the French troops, and described the Serbian situation as desperate."

Only immediate help on a large scale could prevent the crushing of Serbia. Nevertheless, the newspaper declares, the staffs of the British and French armies are in disagreement regarding the measures to be adopted.

"The lack of co-operation thus revealed made a bad impression upon the Greek officers in Salonica, who are convinced, the Frankfurter Zeitung declares, that Greece's place is not on the side of the Entente."

ROUMANIA DRAWS NEARER POINT OF SUPPORTING ALLIES

Public Sentiment in Greece Is
Also Reported Turning Anew
Against Central Powers.

LONDON, Nov. 2.—News coming by way of Paris lends support to the growing impression that Roumania is preparing to intervene in the war.

By royal decree new classes of Roumanian recruits are being mobilized. Vienna reports that "a grave situation" may arise between Austria and

Roumania in connection with the proposed use of the Lower Danube to transport Russian troops to Bulgaria. Little news comes direct from Bucharest as the censorship is enforced so strictly that even ordinary messages are stopped, but it is known the agitation in favor of war is spreading through the army.

Reuters' correspondent at Athens telegraphs that simultaneously with the official denial of reports of Greece's hostility toward the Entente powers came a change in tone of the Ministerial press, which is now publishing articles in favor of the allies. These articles presumably are inspired.

Notwithstanding the drift of opinion, it is maintained that the neutrality of Greece will be adhered to as long as possible. The correspondent says there are indications that an attempt to change the policy of the Government would result in the fall of the Cabinet.

Berlin Reports Desertion of French Soldiers.
BERLIN (via Bayville wireless), Nov. 2.—At Rouen alone, during Au-

gust and September, 128 French soldiers were reported to have deserted according to the inspired statements of a day-quoted standard French newspaper.
