CONSTITUTION IS BURIED BY 400,000; HALF MILLION MEN VOTED FOR WOMEN

HINDENBURG DRIVEN BACK BY FOUR RUSSIAN ATTACKS, BERLIN WAR OFFICE ADMITS

German Northern Wing Is Forced In Between the Swenton and Ilsen Lakes.

RUSSIANS TAKE A TOWN.

Berlin Claims Gains for the German Troops on Southern End of Line.

BERLIN, Nov. 3 (via London).—The war office announced to-day that Field Marshal Von Hindenburg had been forced to withdraw his lines between Swenton and Ilsen lakes, on the northern end of the Russian front.

Following is the text of the War Office report:

"Army of Field Marshal von Hindenburg: The Russians continued their attacks before Dvinsk. At Iloulak and Garbuonka they were repulsed. They stormed our positions in this region four times with extraordinarily heavy losses. Between the Swenton and Ilsen Lakes we were forced to withdraw our lines. The Russians succeeded in occupying the village of Mikulachki.

"Army group of Prince Leopold. The situation is unchanged.

"Army group of Gen. von Linsingen: On the Ogninski Canal the enemy advanced against the locks at Osarjehi, but he was repulsed. On both sides of the Lisowoc-Zatoryak highroad the Russians again were forced to retreat. Five officers and 400 men were made prisoners and three machine guns were captured.

"The troops of Gen. von Bothmer still are fighting for the northern part of Sienkowoc."

The retirement of Field Marshal von Hindenburg's forces from the line running between Lakes Swenton and Ilsen apparently means that the German commander is abandoning his attacks from the west and southwest of the Russian stronghold of Dvinsk, which town he has been making a determined effort to capture in the operations of the last few weeks. NO PEACE UNTIL VICTORY, BRIAND TELLS FRANCE

Nation Groups Every Force to Win War, New Premier Warns Deputies.

PARIS, Nov. 3 (United Press).—Peace suggestions were waved aside by Aristide Briand, new Premier of France, in the Chamber of Deputies to-day.

It was his first speech to the lawmakers since assuming the Cabinet leadership. Briefly and pungently he told them that the only peace the French will accept is a peace won by the enemy's decisive defeat.

"You do not expect a long declaration," he began, rising to outline his Ministry's policy.

"The French army was never more worthy to win. It will fight to a victorious end.

"The Nation, Parliament, the Administration are united to drive the enemy out of the French territory he has invaded.

"France is not concerned with talk of peace. Premeditated aggression forced war upon her. She will not stop fighting until the enemy is vanquished and lasting peace is guaranteed.

"We are in full accord with England concerning the conduct of the war.

"Serbia will receive all necessary aid.

"Germany's Balkan campaign attests her failure in the other theatres of war. It was undertaken solely because her offensives on both the French and Russian fronts had been completely broken.

Ilsen lies ten miles west of Dvinsk, while Lake Swenton is situated twelve miles to the south of Lake Ilsen. The Germans evidently are now withdrawing to positions along a line to the west of Novo Alexandrovsk.

BERLIN'S MAYOR TELLS OF CITY'S MEATLESS DAYS

Two Days' Abstinence Now Programme That Is Working Well.

IT BEGAN YESTERDAY.

No Shortage Claim—Capital Is Now Run on Socialistic Plan.

BERLIN (via Amsterdam, Nov. 3.—United Press).—"Germany will be using meat and butter cards before the end of the winter and maximum prices will be placed on practically all food necessities to prevent extortionate demands by retailers," Mayor von Wermuth of Greater Berlin declared to-day.

Yesterday was the first meatless day in Berlin, in accordance with the Government's new food regulation, requiring abstinence from meat two days each week. Meat could not be bought anywhere, in the restaurants or the shops. The hotels served vegetables, cheese and eggs as substitutes.

Friday Berliners will go without meat again. Monday will be the first "fatless" day, when butter and other fats will be unobtainable.

The Government is in earnest about its new food regulations and intends to enforce them strictly. A big Cologne packer was sentenced to four months and another packer to fifteen months imprisonment for violating the provisions.

Piles of food in the shop windows indicate that there is no lack of supplies, but it was officially pointed out to-day that some regulative steps are necessary to insure reasonable food prices throughout the winter.

"It is not a question of food shortage at all," said Mayor von Wermuth. "It is a question of price. The prevailing high prices have caused an unequal distribution. We are not worried over any prospect, that the food supply might not last because we know exactly what we need, and we have it. But it is our duty to see that every one gets what they need and the Government intends to do just that."

Beginning Monday the price of butter will be reduced four cents. Next week the Mayor expects to regulate the price of pork, he said to-day. Just now pork is very high and only the wealthiest classes are buying it.

By extending the zone of government regulation, Germany is thus developing into a socialistic state. The Government now controls the supplies of grain and potatoes and has begun regulation of other food supplies. The railways and 40 per cent. of the factories are under Government control. The Government provides employment for the unemployed and sets food prices.

Mayor von Wermuth said he visited several meat lines one night to see what poor women were going to obtain meat, before the Government regulations were adopted. He found long rows of women standing in line throughout the entire night, suffering great hardships, in order to obtain frozen meats.

Some anxiety regarding the meat supply has been relieved by receipt of a telegram from The Hague, the Mayor said. The Dutch Government has decided to permit the exportation to Germany of three million tons of pork because of an over-supply in Holland. The last potato harvest in Germany yielded 55,000,000 tons, the authorities state, sufficient for the nation's demands.

RUNAWAY MAY BE HERE.

Disguised in Wig and Long Skirt, Missing Movie Fan, 13, May Seek Film Job.

Falling to receive encouragement in her ambition to become a movie actress, Dorothy Wallace, thirteen-year-old runaway of Delawanna, N. J., is trying to live out a scenario of her own making. So much her parents and her brother, Carlton, have learned in their search of the Delawanna woods for her. But they have not found the girl or any indication of where she now is. She may still be playing her part of "Bill Dalton, Bandit Chief of the Ozarks," in the matted thickets, or may be tramping the streets of Manhattan in a wig and long skirt looking for employment by a film company.

All yesterday the brother, who is a photo-engraver and an athlete, and two companions tramped through the woods looking for Dorothy. They quit last night because they were afraid to venture further into the wilderness, which stretches from the Nutley line to the Passaic River. Just how a thirteen-year-old girl faced the terrors of daylight there, to say nothing of darkness, since Thursday, when she left home, none of them could understand.

Carlton Wallace found the cave where his little sister had been living. She had lined it with armfuls of dry leaves, and it was snug, dry and warm. Dorothy had left there the suit of boy's clothing in which she was last seen on the edge of the woods near the Yountakah golf links yesterday. She had approached a group of caddies and asked them to get food for her and meet her to-day. They agreed to keep her secret, but went straight to the home of Mrs. Wallace. The girl may have watched them, for she did not appear to-day to keep the appointment.

In the cave, too, were the two long braids of chestnut hair which the girl had worn down her back, and a number of notes of her movie scenario, including the suggested names: "Bill Dalton, Bandit Chief of the Ozarks," "Billy Dalton," and the more formal "William John Dalton."

"Dorothy was full of the idea of acting in the movies," Mrs. Wallace said to-day, "although she went to the pictures but once a week with me or with her older sister. She neglected her studies to read exciting stories and think out movie plots. A week ago last Saturday we saw a picture of a girl being sent to a convent and I asked her if she realized I might send her to a convent if she did not attend to her studies at home. It may be that caused her to run away."

"She was always begging me to make her skirts longer so she would appear older. So was as big as a girl of seventeen and complained she felt ashamed of being in school with little girls and dressed like a little girl. I expect to find she has obtained a wig and long skirts and has gone to New York."

Dorothy was injured more than a year ago by falling from a bicycle. Soon after that she ran away and was found with another girl in a Newark boarding house. Mrs. Wallace is inclined to think the child's mind may have been affected by her hurt.

ALMOST A CLEAN SWEEP FOR THE TAMMANY TICKETS; REGAIN ALDERMEN, 53 TO 20

Woman Suffrage Loses in Three Biggest States—Republicans Retain Hold of State Legislature and Gain a Congressman.

SWANN AND SMITH ELECTED; CROSEY WINS BROOKLYN

TWO FACTS ABOUT SUFFRAGE VOTE!
Woman's Suffrage Got Double the Number of Votes Recorded for the Root Constitution.
Woman's Suffrage Got as Many Votes in the State as Did Taft in the Last Presidential Campaign.

Woman's suffrage was beaten by 89,372 votes in New York City and by approximately 200,000 in the entire State. Not all the up-State counties have reported. Massachusetts defeated suffrage by 132,602 and Pennsylvania did likewise, but by barely 50,000.

The revised Constitution for New York State has been overwhelmingly rejected. New York City gave an adverse vote of 300,793 and up-State counties are expected to add 100,000 more, making the majority against it more than 400,000 when all returns have been tabulated.

Returns from 4,009 election districts out of 5,713 in the State received this morning give 406,877 votes for suffrage and 555,476 against it. The vote in the cities was exceptionally strong against suffrage. Only five or six counties, led by Chautauqua and Nassau, gave a majority for the women, the former 2,500 and the latter 1,500. Albany County went 10,000 against the proposition. Erie 9,000, Monroe 7,000, Steuben 6,000, Rensselaer 4,000.

WOMEN TAKE COMFORT FROM THE RESULT.
Despite this defeat the women point with satisfaction that they polled approximately 500,000 votes in the Empire State on their first attempt to get the ballot.

On the revised Constitution and the separate amendments only incomplete returns have been received from the State. The count was made first on question No. 1, which embodied most of the new Constitution, and this was overwhelming in every county.

The vote on the proposition to issue \$27,000,000 for finishing the barge canal was widely favored, but whether it was successful in winning against the strong adverse tide to all Constitutional questions may not be known for several days.

COMMISSIONER REVOKES TWO THEATRE LICENSES

Says Burlesque Shows at Olympic and Garrick "Reveal Instances of Indecency Almost Unbelievable."

License Commissioner George H. Bell announced this afternoon he had ordered revoked the licenses of the Olympic Theatre in East Fourteenth Street and the Garrick Theatre, on Thirty-fifth Street east of Sixth Avenue. Both are burlesque houses.

"The evidence against the theatres in question," said Commissioner Bell, "shows the worst condition ever brought to my attention. Reports of my inspectors reveal instances of indecency that seem almost unbelievable."

The Commissioner said the shows complained of could not be modified. Asked if the licensees had a right to appeal, he replied:

"If they go into court they'll have a hard job contradicting the evidence in my possession."
