BARNEY CORN'S PAL TELLS IN SLANG OF 'STICK-UP' MURDER

Gunman Wavers When Cross Examined—Admits He May Have Fired Fatal Shots.

Corn, and with much more of the underworld, Joseph Bourret, who pleaded guilty to a charge of manslaughter for his part in killing Charles Miller, night clerk at the Hotel Atlas, on West Thirty-fourth Street, on March 14 last, today told Judge Malone and a jury in the Court of General Sessions of the murder. His testimony may send his one-time pal, Barney Corn, known as "Jew Barney," to the electric chair, for he is being tried on a charge of murder in the first degree.

"I was in a saloon at Thirty-sixth Street and Seventh Avenue and I was broke when Barney came in and asked me if I was game," Bourret said on the stand. "I told him I'd done a bit in Elmira and was as game as he was. Then he said he was broke and he thought we ought to stick up a crap joint or some other place. Then he thought of the Atlas and he asked me if I had a 'rot'."

"What is a 'rot'?" asked Judge Malone.

"A gun, a revolver, of course," Bourret explained, "and when I said I did not have a gun he told me to take his, because I had an overcoat, and that would hide it in my pocket. Near the hotel we saw two cops and I said we ought to wait, but he said to 'hell with the cops,' and we kept on. He went into the hotel and looked around and when he came out he said there were too many around and we decided to wait a while. We went to a restaurant next door while waiting.

"Pretty soon we started into the hotel and Barney says to me: 'Take the rot and stick this guy up.' I walked into the hotel and when I saw Miller I came behind him and put the revolver between his shoulders. He swung around and knocked me for a goal."

"Explain what you mean," Judge Malone again interrupted.

"Why, I mean he knocked me out. He put me cold. I dropped the revolver, and when I fell I heard some shots. Next thing I knew Barney picked me up and pushed me out. Miller was on the floor. 'Brace up; everything is all right,' Barney said to me, and we beat it out and went back to the saloon. I went up to where I was living, at No. 316 West One Hundred and Seventeenth Street, but I got scared and beat it to New England."

Under cross-examination by Abraham Levy, who is representing Corn, the alibi witness lost some of his calmness. "Taking up his statement that he fell when Miller swung around and then heard the shots, Lawyer Levy asked:

"Did you see Corn fire the shots?"

"No," Bourret answered.

POLICE WARNING SENT SCHOOLS TO LESSEN STREET ACCIDENTS

Commissioner Woods Plans to Have Police Lecture Pupils on Safety First.

In an effort to minimize accidents to school children on the streets, Police Commissioner Woods has sent the following letter to Thomas W. Churchill, President of the Board of Education:

"I know we can rely upon your cooperation in trying to impress upon the minds of school children the need of exercising caution in the street in order to avoid accidents.

"Last month in New York 98 children were killed or injured by crossing the streets at other places than crossings; 91 were hurt by running into or in front of vehicles; 55 while skating or playing ball in the streets, and 65 while playing other games in the streets. Fifty-four children were injured while stealing rides.

"Between 8 and 10 A. M. children of school age constituted 28 per cent. of the total injured; between 11 A. M. and 1 P. M. they constituted 31 per

cent, and between 4 and 6 P. M. 34 per cent. of all those injured were children of school age.

"There seems to be just as many accidents now, when school is in session as there were during the summer when the children were out all day. The only difference being that few accidents are concentrated into a few hours, instead of being spread over most of the day."

"Owing to your cordial co-operation, we are now preparing to have police-men address the children in the schools this fall on the subject mentioned. However, I think it would be desirable if these figures could be used to the principle of schools. And if the teachers could try to educate the children in very of the accidents that are actually happening, so that they should exercise more caution as they go about their streets, which would be most of the accidents."
