ANCONA CARRIED MANY WOMEN AND CHILDREN.

The office of the agents of the Ancona, No. 1 State Street, were crowded with Italian people...

From estimates based upon the passenger lists of other sailings, it must be presumed that the greatest loss of life on the Ancona was among women and children.

"We have expected trouble with our vessel, but we thought it would come on an east-bound passage, not in the case of a ship bound for this country."

It was also thought that the Austrian submarine reported to have sent the Ancona to the bottom was in all probability lying in wait for her at or near the entrance to the Malta Channel.

At the office of the Italian Consul General, G. Fara Forni, it was said that no official word of the sinking of the Ancona had been received.

The Ancona, which was launched at Belfast in 1907, was a twin screw steamer of 14,000 tons.

FRIENDS SEEK NEWS OF THOSE WHO MAY BE ON THE ANCONA.

At the local offices of the Italian Line to-day inquiries were made for

several Americans who were believed to have been aboard the Ancona.

APPEARS CERTAIN THAT AMERICANS WERE ON ANCONA.

The afternoon inquiries were received from L. Decker of No. 515 Bayard Avenue, The Bronx, as to the results and what Mr. and Mrs. E. Geiger, who he said were on the Ancona, Geiger received word from his wife that he and Mrs. Geiger would sail on the Ancona.

A despatch from Baltimore came to the office of the Italian Line asking about Adriatic, Maffei and Filiberto Mazzarilli, Italian-Americans, whose names were in Baltimore and who are said to have been on the Ancona.

THREE BIG LINERS SAILING FROM HERE IN DANGER ZONE TO-DAY.

Three large steamships which sailed from American ports with well-filled cabins are to-day in the danger zone of the Mediterranean in which German and Austrian submarines have been frequently reported to be.

The Europa, of La Yvelon Line, is one of them. She sailed from New York on Oct. 28 for Naples with 1,125 passengers. She is due to arrive at Naples to-day.

Another is the Caserta, of the Lloyd-Italiano Line, which left here on Nov. 1, with 1,200 passengers aboard. She is due at Genoa on Saturday next.

The third is the Cretic, of the White Star Line, from Boston, on Oct. 20 for Mediterranean ports, with 1,084 passengers in her cabins. She is due at Gibraltar to-day.

DOUBT IN CHICAGO AS TO LOSS OF SINGER OR HAROLD F. MCCORMICK

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Reports that Titta Ruffo, the famous baritone, was a passenger on the Ancona, were discredited to-day by his brother, Ettore Ruffo, a teacher at the Chicago Conservatory of Music, who said the singer had not expected to sail for America before Dec. 1.

Reports that Harold F. McCormick of the International Harvester Company was a passenger on the steamship Ancona, which was sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine, were discredited by officials of the company to-day.

"We do not believe Mr. McCormick has left Europe," one official said, "because he has invariably on former trips proceeded immediately with a message advising us of the fact and the exact location of the ship and the date of its arrival. No such word has come."

DEFEAT OF ALLIES IN SERBIA CLAIMED IN BERLIN REPORT; FRENCH RECAPTURE VELES

Marked Successes Claimed by Both Sides Within Comparatively Few Miles.

ADVANCE BY BRITISH. Lieut. Gen. Sir Charles Monro Goes to Serbia to Command English Troops.

Reports from German and French sources indicate that the heaviest fighting is now taking place in Southern Serbia, where French, British and Serb forces are combating with Bulgarian armies.

Berlin to-day reports a Bulgarian defeat of the allies with heavy loss between Priepel and Krivopaluk. Paris claims the capture by the French of the town of Veles on the Nish-Belonica railroad, fifty-five miles from the Greek-Serbian frontier.

A report from Salonica via Paris admits an advance by the Bulgars in the Priepel-Krivopaluk region. It mentions the occupation by the French of points protecting the Babuna Pass.

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According to this information the battle occurred between Krivopaluk and Priepel. The allies made a violent attack upon defensive positions of the Bulgarians.

In addition to heavy losses in killed or wounded of the allies, it is reported a large number of their troops were captured.

Further advances of the Austrians and Germans are reported to-day by the War Office, which says the pursuit of the Serbians is continuing vigorously.

The amount of war booty captured at Krusevac is now given as 103 cannon, most of them modern, in addition to large amounts of ammunition.

RECAPTURE OF VELES BY THE FRENCH ARMY IF CLAIMED BY PARIS.

ATHENS, Nov. 10.—The French recaptured the Southern Serbian town of Veles from the Bulgarians to-day, reports stated here to-day.

It was to the vicinity of Veles that the Franco-British forces drove the Bulgars after the latter's defeat at Babuna Par in the Priepel region. It has been the scene of hard fighting for several days.

An official statement issued by the Franco-British staff at Salonica yesterday and transmitted to the Havas Agency says: "British troops, reinforced by a new division, occupy solidly the region

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LONDON, Nov. 10.—The British steamship Clan MacAlister has been sunk by a German submarine.

Other British steamers reported sunk to-day are the Californian and Moorina.

The Clan MacAlister, 4,325 tons gross, was owned in Glasgow. She was built in 1903 and was last reported at London on Sept. 13.

The Californian was a 6,022-ton liner owned by Leyland & Sons of Liverpool, most of whose boats are in the African trade.

The Moorina, a 3,500-ton steamer, was chartered to the British Government for the transport of troops to the East Indies.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Premier Asquith asked the House of Commons to-day for a vote of credit of £2,000,000,000 (\$2,000,000,000).

With the amount voted in the financial year of 1914-15 the sum allotted for the war, including the new vote of credit, will reach an aggregate of £1,622,000,000 (\$1,622,000,000).

PARIS, Nov. 10.—The press has received cordially Finance Minister Ribot's proposal for a new five-per cent. state loan for an unlimited amount, which will be presented to Parliament to-morrow.

The newspapers are particularly pleased with the departure from the practice of offering bonds which already have been issued to the amount of 12,000,000,000 francs (\$2,400,000,000).

M. Ribot also proposes an income tax on war profits effective Jan. 1, 1916, applicable not only to firms supplying the Government but to all business. The measure is intended as a substitute for the income tax, which should take effect on that date, but which, it is generally believed, cannot be applied effectively while the war is in progress.

BERLIN, Nov. 10 (by wire-tele to Sayville, N. Y.).—Subscriptions to the third war loan in Austria have reached a total of 4,015,000,000 crowns (\$805,000,000), the Overseas News Agency announced to-day.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—The resignation of another member of the Russian Cabinet is reported by Reuters' correspondent at Petrograd. His despatch said S. V. Rukhshin, Minister of Communications, has retired, and that the Emperor has conferred on him the Order of Alexander Nevsky.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—A German attack near the Forest of Givenchy was easily repulsed by French troops, according to an announcement made this afternoon by the French War Office, while at the same time French batteries in the Champagne district, near Tahure, responded with energy to a German artillery attack.

The text of the communication follows: "In the Artois district the Germans yesterday made an attack over a limited area against the French positions along the western boundary of the Forest of Givenchy. This movement was easily checked by the French 'curtain of fire.'"

"In the Champagne district French batteries yesterday repulsed effectively to a fresh and violent bombardment directed against our positions to the northeast of Tahure."

"To the east of the Argonne, at Vouguois and in the Forest of Malancourt, last night saw the continuance of lively fighting with bombs and hand grenades."

TALK OF PEACE IRRITATES FRANCE, BRIAND INSISTS

New Premier Declares Compromise Now Would Be Betrayal of Patriots at Front.

PARIS, Nov. 10.—Aristide Briand, Chief of the new War Ministry of France, received the American newspaper correspondents in a body to-day, inviting them to ask questions or make requests relative to their work.

The reception was held by the Premier more for personal reasons than with the intention of granting an interview.

"I have made a declaration for my colleagues and myself to Parliament," said M. Briand, "and it would be fatal to repeat it to you."

Then came a bombardment of questions on a wide range of subjects relating to the war to which the head of the Government made unhesitating replies. Asked regarding peace suggestions, he said:

"What are these peace suggestions? They are heard first in one country and then another, impersonal and imponderable. They irritate at the present stage of the war. I do not wish to consider them even to the extent of a public denial and rejection. We can think of nothing but to drive forward to complete success by arms."

RUSSIANS CHECKED IN TWO DRIVES ON GERMAN POSITIONS

Berlin Reports Repulses in Riga District and Near Czartorysk.

BERLIN (via Wireless to Sayville), Nov. 10.—An offensive movement undertaken by the Russians in the Riga district is said by the War Office to-day to have failed.

An advance was attempted vainly against the German positions near Kemmern, twenty miles west of Riga. Strong Russian attacks at Jacobstadt also were repulsed, and one officer and 117 men were captured.

The Russians also took the offensive in the region of Czartorysk. They attempted to break through the German lines north of Budka, but were checked and by a counter attack were thrown back to their former positions.

The official statement says: "Army group of Field Marshal Hindenburg, west of Riga—A Russian attack against Kemmern was brought to a standstill. West of Jacobstadt strong enemy forces, which advanced to the attack, were repulsed. One officer and 117 men fell into our hands. Before Divulsk the Russians yesterday limited their efforts to lively artillery actions."

"Army group of Gen. von Linde, an attempt on the part of the Russians to break through our lines near and to the north of Budka, west of Czartorysk, was stopped by East Prussian and Hessian regiments. By a counterattack the enemy was thrown back into his former position."

GREECE REPORTED IN AN AGREEMENT WITH BULGARIA

To Keep Out of War, Is Rumor—Bulgars Not to Enter Monastir.

ATHENS, Nov. 10.—Bulgaria and Greece reached an agreement Tuesday which will keep Greece out of the war, according to the Athens press-to-day.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—A telegram from Athens to the Exchange Telegraph Company says: "The Greek Government organ Kairo to-day publishes the outline of an agreement said to have just been concluded between Bulgaria and Germany relating to the Balkans, which the newspaper alleges it has received from a diplomatic source."

"According to the agreement Bulgaria will not advance beyond the Doiran-Guevgelitsa line in Southern Serbia, nor enter Monastir, in Southwestern Serbia, in order to avoid giving offense to Greece. Bulgaria also agrees to demobilize immediately her campaign in Serbia. It is stated that if necessary the Germans will operate alone in the region of Monastir."
