That wife may be a most efficient home manager; an economical purchaser of household supplies; a wise disciplinarian; a social diplomat. But no amount of competence excuses her depriving her husband of his share of domestic responsibilities. It is his right to be an active agent in planning the home finances, bringing up the children and arranging the social life of the family.

Only in homes where husband and wife co-operate in settling these and other important questions does there bloom that fine flower of perfect comradeship whose fragrance makes endurable the longest, grayest road.

SPECIALIZATION THE BANE OF THE AMERICAN HOME.

The American passion for specialization is the trouble with many an American home. The husband concentrates on making money and the wife concentrates on keeping house. Then it sometimes occurs to them to wonder why there is so little to talk about when no guests have been invited to dinner. If the wife earned a little money, so that the husband needn't earn such a lot; if he used business sense in simplifying the household, so that she needn't spend so much time on it, the two would be allies instead of maintaining a relation of armed neutrality. Stock Exchange Member Is Suspended.

Announcement was made this morning on the Stock Exchange that George W. Eberhardt, a member of the Exchange and Board representative of the George W. Eberhardt Company of Pittsburgh, had been suspended for one year by the governors.

Eberhardt was charged with violating a resolution prohibiting any business transactions between a member of the Exchange and bucket-shops.

Under such conditions I cannot conceive how or why there can be any disruption or disagreeable circumstances in the home, provided, of course, there is a mutual feeling of fondness and of attachment to each other, for without love, domestic tranquility and happiness are almost an impossibility."
