TRICKS ON OTHER SIDE.

Kaiser's Sailors Take Iron Anchors to Holland and Come Back With Copper Ones.

A tale of a new war ruse that is enabling British cruisers to send German submarines to the bottom of the sea came into port today on the Holland-American liner, Noordam, from Rotterdam.

From Capt. Anderson of the Norwegian steamer Vitalia, an eyewitness of the sinking of a submarine by one of these disguised warships, Mr. Boulton says he got the story first hand.

Miss Amy Lowell, Sister of the President of Harvard University, One of the Few Really Free Women in the United States, Who Writes Free Verse, Declares That It Is Only Because of the Difference of Education That There Has Been No Woman Shakespeare or Woman Wagner.

She writes one long line, And one short line, And every line, Whether it be long or short, Sings with beauty and dazzles with color.

HERE'S A TRULY EMANCIPATED WOMAN.

No more in that strait jacket that rack the soul and the ear of the woman whom I consider to be one of our greatest poets and one of the few really free women in the United States today.

She is of course a Suffragist for she realizes that votes should be at least as free as verse. But so called free verse is a publisher's term and signifies practically nothing.

SAILING TO-DAY.

GIRL FORCED TO STEAL BY MOTHER, SHE SAYS; BEGS TO BE ARRESTED

Children's Society Investigating Tale by Child Who Declares She Is Made a Thief.

A little girl, who talked and acted like a woman weighted down by age and worry, sat in the rooms of the Children's Society today and while tears rolled down her cheeks she told Assistant Superintendent Vincent T. Pisarra that she wanted to be kept under arrest because her mother compelled her to steal.

"I'd rather be arrested than steal," said the girl, who is Josephine Maiorca, fourteen years old, of No. 347 Seventh Avenue. "I asked a policeman to lock me up because I did not want to steal, and now I wish you would take care of me and not send me back to mamma. If I could only find a nice home somewhere, then I would be happy and work—oh, so hard!"

"Are you sure your mother made you steal?" asked the assistant superintendent.

"Oh, yes, sir," replied Josephine. "She made me take things from department stores, and she made my sister Sadie, who is eight years old, and my brother Jimmie, who is four, take things too."

So astounding is Josephine's story that a careful investigation is being made by the Children's Society and the Harlem police.

Upon her promise to treat the child better Josephine was given back into her care. Five weeks ago the girl ran away from her home because she said her mother had taken her downtown and compelled her to steal trinkets in department stores.

With Money Gone and Health Imperilled, Cotton Expert Sees "Only Way Out."

Believing at the age of twenty-seven that he had made a failure of a life that held for him no future hopes, no allurement, despite the love of his young wife and baby girl, George F. Hartt, a cotton expert, ended his life by putting a bullet through his brain in his home on Sherman Street, Jamaica.

In a remarkable letter six pages long written to his wife Hartt told of the fight he had made for three weeks to find some ray of light in the gloomy prospects the future seemed to hold for him.

Mrs. Hartt found her husband's body in the bathroom last night after hearing a shot as she entered the house. In a bedroom she found the letter addressed to her. She read one paragraph and fainted.

After explaining that he had lost heavily playing the races, Hartt's letter told of check transactions that threatened trouble. Several checks were due to be returned today, he said, which he could not meet and this had helped impel him to end his life.

BLACK HAND PLOTS AIDED BY SEERESS LAND FOUR IN JAIL

Piccerillo, Head of Transfer Company, Saves His Money and Daughter.

As further proof of the old belief that fortunes can never tell their own fortunes, Mrs. Rosie Frank of No. 679 First Avenue finds herself arrested, along with four men, charged with being mixed up in a regular old-fashioned Black Hand scheme which included the kidnapping of pretty seventeen-year-old Catherine Piccerillo.

Pasquale Piccerillo and his family live at No. 325 East Twenty-eighth Street, and he has a transfer company office at Broadway and Twenty-ninth Street.

A woman acquaintance advised Mrs. Piccerillo to consult Mrs. Frank, said to be a wonder at her dark art, and they do say that Mrs. Frank's prophecies were gloomy and recommended that the money be paid.

Detectives went yesterday with Piccerillo to Twenty-first Street and First Avenue, where he was to deliver the money. It was fake money.

The detectives state that he was approached by Giovanni Cusumano of No. 225 East Twenty-ninth Street, a peddler, whose pushcart was on the corner, who took the decoy roll, and then, deserting his pushcart, went to Twenty-eighth Street and First Avenue.

Later Mrs. Frank and Biaggio Casassa, a barber, living in East Twenty-first Street, were arrested as being members of the Black Hand group.

They were locked in Yorkville prison.
