**Man Who Bought \$15,000,000 in Steel Denies He Was a \$5 a Week Office Boy; It Was Only \$3.60 a Week He Started On**

**J. Leonard Replogle, "With the Accent on the Jay," Just "Plugged Along" Until He Attained His Present Position in the World of Finance.**

**He Won the Amateur Cham—No, He Just Plays a Little Golf and He Roots for the Giants and for Literature.**

Just twenty-five years ago J. Leonard Replogle, twelve years old, started to work as an office boy for the Cambria Steel Company, at Johnstown, Pa., his home town.

Yesterday, a new power in the world of steel, he covered behind his desk in the tower of the Equitable Building—covered because of his first interview. (But if he did not want to be interviewed he should not have bid \$15,000,000 for 240,000 shares of Cambria Steel and so qualified as the hero of this story.)

"The papers are wrong in saying that I started to work as a water boy and that I got \$5 a week," Mr. Replogle told me after much persuasion. "My first job was as an office boy and I got 60 cents a day, just \$3.60 a week.

"Did you live on it?" I asked.

"I tried to. I always tried to live on what I made." And then suddenly that staid business office on the twenty-eighth floor of the Equitable became suffused, irradiated with what I took at first to be the rays of the late afternoon sun setting over Staten Island. But it was not the sun. It was J. Leonard Replogle blushing because he had been lured into saying forty whole words about himself.

"Look here, now," Mr. Replogle began, "I'm afraid of you. This isn't fair. I'm not anybody. I haven't done anything. I WON'T have you make a big man out of me. I WON'T sit here and tell how I did it and give advice to young men. I'd hate to see any young fellow do all the things I've done. Make all the mistakes I've made. I had to go to work when I was twelve years old. I've always worked. That's one advantage I had over fellows that don't have to do anything. I got a job and just plugged along to the next one."

**ONE MINUTE TO TELL IT, 25 YEARS TO DO IT.**

From his first job as an office boy at 60 cents a day, Mr. Replogle plugged along to clerk, shipper, assistant superintendent of the forge and axle departments, then assistant to the general manager, general superintendent

**MAN SHOTS HIMSELF AT THE GRAND CENTRAL**

Elderly Victim Carries Photo of Young Woman in His Pocket.

An elderly man in whose pocket was a picture of a young woman taken in Worcester, Mass., with a pencil inscription, "George Capper, Leicester, Mass.," beneath it, and whose gold watch chain and hat bore the initials "G. C.," shot and killed himself this morning in the lower level lavatory of the Grand Central Terminal.

The shot was heard by William Hubler of No. 505 East One Hundred and Forty-second Street, an attendant. Policemen Harbeck and Scherb forced the door and the body was removed to the East Fifty-first Street Station.

No letters or papers were found in the dead man's pockets to give a reason for his deed. He had a small sum of money. He wore brown clothes, a brown soft hat and a black overcoat.

**BIGGEST ZOO BUFFALO SHOT TO DEATH JUST BECAUSE OF OLD AGE**

Park Needed Younger Animal and There Was No Room for "Black Diamond."

"Black Diamond," the biggest American buffalo in captivity and for twenty years one of the sights of the animal collection in Central Park, was executed to-day in the abattoir of Joseph Stern & Son Company, at the foot of West Fortieth Street. Tens of thousands of New York children sympathize with Jim Crowley, "Black Diamond's" keeper, who sat in tears at the Zoo this afternoon recalling incidents of his pet's public career.

"There was no charge against "Black Diamond" except that he was growing old and it was necessary to replace him in the Central Park herd with a younger bull. To have introduced a new bull and keep "Black Diamond" would have meant succession of battles in which either or both might have been killed. So the big beast was ordered included in the surplus live stock auction last June. He was bought by A. Silz, the "Turkey King" and was left at the park subject to his call. The price paid was \$300.

Eight keepers, including Crowley, huddled "Black Diamond" with ropes to-day and persuaded him into a big close butcher's van. He was heavy and stubborn, even against Crowley, out of whose hand he has nibbled hay for years. He was led yard and the truck in the abattoir yard and a butcher with a .38 calibre rifle shot him in the forehead in the presence of a crowd of 400 persons. The big bull never blinked, but stared inquiringly at the would-be executioner. By direction of Superintendent Meyer a workman ran up with a sledge and crashed a blow into "Black Diamond's" skull which ended his life and sent him plunging to the ground.

Mr. Silz ordered the head turned over to Fred Sauter, the taxidermist and big game hunter. The skin will be used as a robe and Mr. Silz will dispose of the meat.

Thus ended the career of the beast which was the model for the buffalo head on the new nickel and for the engraving on the \$10 treasury note. Isaac Seligman, the banker, tried to buy "Black Diamond" from Silz and have him remain in captivity confinement at the zoo until he died a natural death, but the butcher would not sell. The offering of "Black Diamond" was furnished the means, by the change and sale, for many good additions to the zoo during his life there.
