

CRUSHED BY CAR AND PILLAR.

Woman Made Hysterical by Accident in Crowd on Brooklyn Bridge. Forced against an iron pillar by the pressure of the rush hour crowd at the Manhattan end of the Brooklyn Bridge last evening, just as a Bergen Street car swung around the curve of the track No. 4 Thomas Roberts, sixty-five, a watchman of No. 417 Lincoln Road, Flatbush, was crushed between pillar and car.

Women screamed and men tore at the figure squeezed vice-like against the supports. Patrolman Smith rushed to the rescue. Motorman John Siergieman backed the car away a bit and the Roberts' body was released.

DECLARED REPORT GAS CO. OFFERED TO BE CROOKED

Attorney Suing Brooklyn Union Quotes Corporation Counsel's Office at Trial.

EXPERT DID HIS WORK.

Lawyer Claims \$30,000 Fees for Having Assessment Reduced.

Attorney Henry W. Bridges, who is suing the Brooklyn Union Gas Company for \$30,000 as his fee for having millions lopped off the franchise tax assessments of the company, told on the witness stand before Justice Newburger in the Supreme Court to-day how representatives of the Corporation Counsel's office branded a report offered them by the gas company as "crooked" and rejected it.

The report was made by an expert on gas, W. A. Baer, who was brought here from Chicago to appraise the Brooklyn Union plant after the appraisals of two other experts had been rejected because the figures were too high. The company wanted a low appraisal, said Mr. Bridges, and Baer gave it one. It was so low that the Corporation Counsel's office said Baer had taken away practically all the tangible property of the Brooklyn Union Company.

In November, 1911, said Mr. Bridges, he saw Mr. Peters of the Corporation Counsel's office in an effort to have him accept the Baer report. Peters said to him: "Baer's report is crooked. Go back and tell Baer so and let him so inform Carter." (Meaning R. A. Carter, Vice President of the Consolidated Company.)

Bridges said Peters again in December and he did not care about Baer's report, but that what he wanted was to "get together and settle." In March, 1912, Bridges saw John W. Sterling, attorney for the Consolidated Company, who was doing yeoman service in trying to straighten out the franchise tax mix-up for the Brooklyn Union Company.

"Sterling told me," said the witness, "that negotiations had reached such a stage that he wanted to see the Comptroller. He asked me to keep my hands off." Bridges "kept his hands off" the Comptroller's office, but he kept in touch with Mayor Gaynor, a personal friend, and the Corporation Counsel's office until May 11 when he wrote to Mr. Sterling: "The end you have in sight is the Comptroller's office, and I feel you can rest assured everything is all right at my end."

"By your end" what did you refer to?" asked former Judge William N. Cohen, who represents Bridges.

"The Corporation Counsel's and the Mayor's end," he replied. Sterling finally wrote to him that "some progress is being made" and finally the franchise tax assessments were settled on the basis of \$10,000,000 a year for the four years from 1906 to 1909 inclusive.

U. S. AIR SQUADRON OFF ON 450-MILE FLIGHT TO TEXAS

Six Planes on First Trip of Kind Attempted by Army Aviators—Follow War Rules.

PORT HILL, Okla., Nov. 19.—The first aero squadron, U. S. A., composed of six aeroplanes, started from the aviation field here to-day on a flight to new headquarters at San Antonio, a distance of 450 miles. Fifteen minutes after the first machine, carrying Capt. B. D. Fouloua, commanding, was in the air, the entire squadron was on its way southward.

The flight is the first of its kind attempted by army aviators and will be made under conditions as nearly like those encountered in wartime as possible. The aviators will fly close together. It is planned to complete the journey in six days.

The automobile trucks carrying the equipment for repairing any damage to the planes as well as supplies, preceded the aviators in order to pick out the most available route and prepare landing places. It was announced that the first stop of the squadron would be at Wichita Falls, where the aviators will rest until to-morrow. The flight will end next

ANCONA NOT WARNED, ITALIAN INVESTIGATORS OFFICIALLY REPORT

First Shot Wrecked Wireless House; Life Boats Pierced by Shells.

NAPLES, Nov. 19.—The official report of the investigation into the sinking of the Italian steamship Ancona by a submarine off the Tunisian coast on Nov. 1 has been delivered to Thomas Nelson Page, the American Ambassador at Rome. The investigation reached the conclusion that the submarine fired a shell against the wireless apparatus aboard the Ancona without any warning. The captain brought the vessel immediately to a halt.

The submarine having hoisted the Austrian flag, the investigators found, the Ancona was about to hoist the Italian ensign, but the flag reached only halfway up the mast, when the submarine launched a torpedo which struck the steamer amidships.

The captain of the Ancona, the official account says, ordered the lifeboats lowered, but while this was being done the submarine continued firing against the steamer's boats. Some of the boats were pierced by shots, obliging the survivors to use their clothes to stop up the holes.

In the meanwhile, it is alleged, those on board the submarine jeered at their victims.

DEATH OF MARK D. WILBER. Formerly U. S. District Attorney for Brooklyn-Long Island District. (Special to The Evening World.)

DARIEN, Conn., Nov. 19.—Hon. Mark D. Wilber, former United States District Attorney for the Brooklyn-Long Island District, died here this morning in his eighty-seventh year. Mr. Wilber was born in Pleasant Valley, N. Y., and practiced law at various periods in Poughkeepsie, Bridgeport and Brooklyn and latterly in New York as head of the firm of Wilber, DeForest & Norman and the Wilber Mercantile Agency. He was also for a time active in the affairs of Duluth, Minn., and did much to develop that city.

Mr. Wilber and the late Gen. E. L. Molineux raised a regiment together in Dutchess County, the latter becoming Colonel and the former Major. They saw much service together against Gen. Taylor in Louisiana. In politics he was a strong Cleveland Democrat. When seventy-four years old he made a journey to the West, beyond the Great Slave Lake. He retired several years ago from practice and at the time of his death was President of the Darien Trust Company. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon; burial in Poughkeepsie.
