

TEN-CENT SOCKS AND \$10 BILLS IS LIKE FLIM-FLAM

So Bronx Storekeeper Yelled Police and Two Customers Fled. GETS ONE AFTER CHASE.

Excited Wife Adds to Uproar, but All Miller Lost Was His Breath.

Into Louis Miller's dry goods emporium at No. 145 St. Ann's place, the Bronx, walks a customer. "I want a pair of 10-cent socks," he says. Miller gets the socks. For the money they are wonders. The customer inspects them critically and hands out a \$10 bill. "Give me the change," he says, like that. You have heard of these rolls that would choke elephants? Such a roll Miller brings from a capacious trousers pocket, and with care counts out \$9.50.

While this financial transaction is proceeding, enter a second customer. "I want a pair of baby's socks," he says, "for 10 cents." Again Miller produces the desired articles from his selected stock, and the second customer lays down a \$5 bill. "What will I do for change?" asks Miller.

"Here," suggested the first customer. "I want some bigger bills. I'll pay for this gentleman's socks, and you give me a ten for these two five's" producing them. At the psychological moment a great fear broke in Miller's heart. He did not analyze it; he acted.

"Rachael!" he yelled, "bring me my police whistle!" Mrs. Miller came running. The first customer looked blank; the second gazed curiously, turning the baby's socks.

"Thief!" screamed Miller. Out of the door dashed the first customer and on to the running board of a passing automobile. "He gets away!" screamed Miller. "Thief!"

The chauffeur halted his car. Off jumped the customer and ran into Charlotte Street. Miller followed. The second customer came out to see the chase. To Boston Road the first man fled and into a trolley car, while around the corner panted Miller.

"Thief!" he yelled again, and the policeman stopped the car as the pursued purchaser of socks jumped from the front platform into the arms of Policeman Everett.

At the 145th Avenue Station the despairing customer said he was Irving Mann, a moving picture operator, of No. 151 Hoe Avenue, the Bronx. He was charged with attempted petty larceny.

"What for?" he demanded. "I haven't done anything. I wanted some socks and I got 'em. I never knew that other man before." In the meantime Mrs. Miller became panic-stricken.

"Louis is gone!" she wept. "A hundred and ten dollars he had in his pants too!" and, things getting worse every minute, she called the police and brought a party of detectives to the store.

"Right there he stood," explained Mrs. Miller, "and now he has met with foul play!" Then Miller walked in. Yes; the money was all perfectly good money. No, nobody knows anything about the second customer. Right, they are holding Mann for further examination to-day in the West Farms Court.

"And to think," says Mann, "that I have made pictures of a man getting chased through the streets and thought they were funny!"

Woman Dies from Burns. Mrs. Elizabeth Day, thirty-five years old, of 605 West One Hundred and Eighty-first Street, died in Washington Heights Hospital today of burns received in her home yesterday when her clothes accidentally caught fire.

Mrs. Day stepped on a match in her kitchen. The spark ignited her dress and her clothes were almost burned from her back.

BOY MAY LOSE SIGHT.—Brothers Play With Pistol and Powder Enters Eyes of One.

In a struggle for the possession of a small revolver loaded with blank cartridges, Donald J. Ryan, four years old, was shot between the eyes to-day by his brother Dennis, fourteen years old, in their home, No. 1724 Forty-sixth Street, Borough Park, Brooklyn. The injured boy was taken to the Eye and Ear Infirmary, where the doctors said he would lose the sight of one eye, and perhaps of both, owing to the penetration of the lead and powder grains.

GEORGIANA WARD BACK.

Young Girl Missing Since Wednesday Is at Home Now, Says Mother.

Georgiana Ward, the fourteen-year-old daughter of Mrs. Alma Ward of No. 309 Central Park West, who was reported as missing since last Wednesday, is at her home today, according to her mother.

"My daughter is now in this house," said Mrs. Ward this morning, and she added that the girl had been found at the home of a relative. Nothing could be learned as to where Georgiana had passed the time since her disappearance.

FREE LAST MAN ACCUSED IN APPELBAUM MURDER

All in Room Arrested When Crime Occurred, but None Are Tried.

The last man accused of the murder of Moritz Appelbaum was discharged from the Tombs by order of Judge Malone of the General Sessions. Appelbaum was killed early in the morning of October 13, 1914. A girl called him out of the back room of a saloon at No. 751 Seventh Avenue, and as he reached the street three men opened fire from a taxi-cab. He lived long enough to say he could not guess who did it.

The police arrested all the people in the saloon back room, but could not get any evidence. Charles Thomas, alias "Skush," was arrested in San Francisco last February and put in the Tombs. He was discharged a week ago.

Assistant District Attorney Edwards moved the discharge of Thomas Barrett this morning because he had no evidence. Judge Malone let him go, but kept the indictment for murder alive.

DEAD OF AUTO HURTS.

Harry Dunn, Victim of Bronx Crash. Expires in Hospital.

Harry Dunn, fifty years old, a printer, living at No. 835 Falls Street, Bronx, died early to-day in Lincoln Hospital from injuries received last Tuesday morning in the automobile accident at One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street and Union Avenue. The theatre usher described as Rose Miller, but later identified as Mrs. Charles Blum, a widow, of No. 237 West One Hundred and Twenty-sixth Street, is said to be dying.

Frank Demarest, twenty-four, son of a wealthy man of No. 1002 Garrison Avenue, was driving his car containing four women and two other men when it hit a curb and turned over. Mrs. Blum, with a fractured skull and internal injuries, was reported fatally hurt at the time, but it was believed Dunn would recover.

Fell 25 Feet and Will Die. Antonio Gianola of No. 2253 First Avenue slipped on the wet planking of a scaffold on the reconstruction work of the Victoria Theatre, Forty-second Street and Seventh Avenue, this morning and fell twenty-five feet, striking a beam. His skull was fractured and he was taken to Bellevue Hospital dying.
