

The black-and-white Domino Room at Jacques Bustanoby's, No. 1845 Broadway, still smells of burnt grease, and all because at 3:10 o'clock this morning a chef was too temperamental in flirting the French fried potatoes. In the kitchen was a splatter, a flare of flame, and out from the roof, through the pipe from the range canopy, gushed a red geyser.

In the Domino Room seventy-five couples, engaged in trotting, began to sniff. M. Bustanoby, himself in a corner, frowned.

Outside, Jack Williams, a chauffeur, saw the geyser. Up the steps he ran, slid across the dancing floor and told Lloyd Scott Williams he strongly surmised Bustanoby's was on fire.

Guests departed rapidly. Downstairs they met rubber coated firemen. The coatroom boys almost wept because certain amenities were overlooked. Up to the roof went M. Bustanoby, his manager and others, and there was the geyser still spouting, while alarmed tenants of the Pasadena Apartments, twelve stories, and next door, began to raise windows and ask questions.

Then the grease burned itself out and quit. The firemen went away and nearly all the guests came back. The gentlemen who had ordered French fried potatoes took something else and the excitement was over.

he was present when Mrs. Mohr was brought to headquarters to be confronted by Brown and Spellman.

Q. By Mr. Fitzgerald, Mrs. Mohr's attorney—When the postal card received by George Rooks threatening Miss Emily Burger was brought forward at that time didn't Mrs. Mohr say that she didn't mean anything by the card except that she wanted to keep that woman away from her husband? A. I did not hear her say that.

Q. Wasn't it on your recommendation that Mrs. Mohr was held? A. No, the police knew their business.

Q. What induced you to remain at police headquarters from 11 o'clock on the night of Sept. 1 till 8 o'clock the following morning? A. Nothing in the world but curiosity. And I have no apologies to offer for it either.

Mr. Lewis asked Mr. Moulton about the questioning of the two negroes at Police Headquarters, saying: "Didn't each of you take turns giving them the third degree?"

"I don't know what the third degree is," the Police Commissioner replied, and Mr. Lewis smiled at the jury.

### NEGROES ENACTED CRIME FOR POLICE CHIEF.

Thomas E. Robbins, Chief of Police of Harrington, described his visit to the scene of the shooting with the two negro prisoners. He took them there in his motor car, which he placed over the blood stains in the road. Then, he said, he made the prisoners get out and directed them to show him where they had gone after shooting Dr. Mohr and Miss Burger.

Then they went toward the lake drive and through a place where the barbed wire fence had been cut. When they had gone up the lake drive a little way they showed me where the motor cycle had been hidden."

### WHITMAN NAMES J. J. WEISS.

Indicted for Shooting Chief. Lewis Cohen, a former Tenement

House Department employee, was indicted yesterday by the Kings County Grand Jury for assault in the first degree and carrying a revolver. He is accused of shooting William H. Jones, chief of the Bureau of Records, in the office of the Tenement House Department, Brooklyn. Cohen pleaded not guilty and was held for trial.
