

GAINS BY RUSSIANS FROM THE BALTIC TO ROUMANIAN LINE

Violent Artillery Actions at Many Points Are Reported by Petrograd.

GRAND DUKE SWEEPS ON

Russian Vanguard Is Now Only 35 Miles From Trebizond on the Black Sea.

PETROGRAD, Feb. 23.—Russian vanguards are within a few miles of Rizeh, thirty-five miles east of Trebizond, and the capture of Trebizond itself is now but a few days distant, according to Tiflis despatches to-day.

Armenian refugees, fleeing from the Christian quarter at Trebizond, outside the walls, have arrived within the Russian lines. They reported that the Turks have been emptying the city of all its valuable stores since the fall of Erzerum, evidently planning no serious resistance.

"We are continuing the pursuit of the remnants of the Turkish army," said an official statement from the War Office to-day.

Announcement of fresh successes in the Caucasus, which brought enthusiastic demonstrations at the opening of the Duma, was followed by the official statement to-day that the Slavs have won skirmishes with the Austro-Germans on nearly every sector of the front from the Baltic to Roumania.

"Along the Riga and Dvina fronts German aviators dropped bombs," said the official statement. "Violent artillery actions occurred along the Dvina and also on the Jacobstadt sector and around Orta, near Hlukat."

"Northwest of Lado, seventeen miles of our front made a successful reconnaissance, annihilating the occupants of a German trench, 150 men and two officers. Our forces repulsed a counter attack by enemy reserves and returned to their own lines, taking many prisoners. In the Smorgon district we penetrated enemy entanglements, bayoneting some of the trench occupants and forcing others to flee."

Jekyll-Hyde a Psychological Piker;

Here's a Girl With Five Personalities

President of "Clinic for Sick Souls" Reports Strange Case of Girl Possessed of Multiple Characters Restored to Normal Condition and to a Single Identity, Her Real Self.

The most astonishing case of multiple personality in the annals of abnormal psychology was made known to me yesterday by the Reverend Dr. Walter Franklin Prince, who has just taken charge of the Healing Chapel, a clinic for sick souls, established in connection with the Church of St. Mark's-in-the-Bowery, of which Dr. William Norman Guthrie is the pastor.

In this church, No. 234 East Eleventh Street, between the hours of 2 and 3 every day, Dr. Prince will give expert advice to the spiritually ailing. He has been for years a student of psychology and from the pastorate in Pittsburgh, which he gave up to come to St. Mark's, he brought with him an astounding story of a girl, now twenty-six years old, who possessed when he undertook her treatment nearly four years ago, five separate and distinct personalities. Before proceeding to Dr. Prince's remarkable story of this case I think it best, in the interest of clarity, to print a cast of characters of the five girls and women who, taken altogether, composed the young woman, then twenty-two years old, whom Dr. Prince calls Doris Fischer.

Cast of Characters

COMPOSING DORIS FISCHER. Margaret. (This personality never grew beyond the mentality of a girl of ten years.) Sleeping Margaret, eldest and wisest of all the personalities. (A philosopher whose advice in the conduct of the case and upon the treatment of the other personalities was invaluable, Dr. Prince says.) Sick Doris. This personality came when Doris was seventeen and resulted from shock at seeing a sheet drawn over the features of her dead mother. Sick Doris had no sense of humor, no perception of the abstract. (Under Dr. Prince's treatment Sick Doris died, gradually growing younger and younger in mind. Before her decease she became a psychical infant and talked baby talk.) Real Doris, the sole surviving personality to-day.

Sleeping Real Doris. SCIENTISTS SURE FIVE PERSONALITIES EXISTED.

These five personalities of Doris Fischer have been studied by physicians and men of science. Dr. Prince told me, and are conceded by them to have existed.

"No trained psychologist doubts multiple personality to-day, anyhow," said the clergyman. "Dr. Doris Sidis of Harvard and Dr. Morton Prince of Boston have studied and reported on similar cases, but in all only thirty cases of multiple personality are known, and of these only six have been adequately studied. Prof. W. K. Walker, M. D., of the University of Pittsburgh has seen Doris Fischer at least twenty times, for periods extending sometimes to two hours. Dr. Walker met all the personalities except Sleeping Real Doris, who came late at night. Dr. Walker's certificate of the facts in this strange case and of his cure are embodied by me in the book which I have written about Doris Fischer, now in the hands of a publisher. In a few weeks an abstract of the case will appear in a scientific journal. Meantime I am giving to you the A B C of this extraordinary story—the first time I have ever told it for publication.

The readers of The Evening World are meeting therefore (their first appearance on any stage) the five personalities of Doris Fischer. These personalities varied greatly in mental powers, but luckily for us they were all highly moral beings. Otherwise I might have to censor the young lady, maybe cut out one of Doris's personalities altogether, which would be embarrassing, to say the least.

"There is no Jekyll-Hyde about this story," Dr. Prince replied to my anxious inquiries on this point. "The five personalities had separate and distinct wills and physical and aesthetic tastes. They had different expressions and voices. There was a certain lunaticism in the ten-year-old girl Margaret, and she believed certain things—for instance, that babies were found on river banks and brought to families in doctor's hats, which, of course, the real Doris knew not to be true. The wisest personality, Sleeping Margaret knew and advised the other girls, but for twenty years they knew nothing of her. An interesting fact is that while Sleeping Margaret was the most intelligent, Sick Doris was

the most accomplished. She could embroider beautifully. Mrs. Prince has in her possession a piece of work done by Sick Doris which is a masterpiece. Yet not even the primary personality, Real Doris, had ever been taught to do a stitch of the work. Real Doris, however, could embroider fairly well; Margaret, the ten-year-old child of that age, Mrs. Prince has a table cover worked by these three personalities—the child Margaret, Real Doris and Sick Doris, the phenomenal embroiderer, which shows the three different grades of work.

"The primary personality was of course Real Doris," Dr. Prince continued.

"Margaret and Sleeping Margaret came at the age of three when the baby Real Doris was dropped to the floor and received great shock. Sick Doris came upon her mother's death."

ONLY ONE DORIS SURVIVES. AND SHE IS THE REAL ONE. And to-day only Real Doris survives," I asked.

"Only Real Doris survives—a happy, normal woman of twenty-six, who has been adopted into a private family and who at this moment resides in a Westchester State, where she has voted" (only once, let us hope, although really, should not a quintuple personality have five votes?) "I say yes, if she is for Woodrow Wilson." Real Doris takes a great interest in poultry. She is quite intelligent, but not literary.

"How did the other four personalities die?" I asked Dr. Prince.

"They were extinguished by treatment I gave daily for a period of three and a half years. In the case of Sick Doris, who, I have told you, became a psychotic in her infancy, the treatment consisted in withholding from her the things in which she was interested—her embroidery, for instance, and her interest in poultry. Real Doris was interested in her personality die."

"And when personality conflicts with public policy?" I asked.

"That is a question which I don't want to have what interests it in order to survive, must it do it what it wants in a consistent and unflinching way. There are dangerous possibilities in your theory, you know."

"I know," the clergyman replied smilingly. "But in such cases that is pure cussedness, and I don't want to talk about human cussedness just now. It would lead us too far from Doris Fischer's Doris changed personalities sometimes fifty-one times a day. That was the maximum; the minimum was two changes. As the personalities approached extinction the changes grew less."

"By the way, when the personality called Margaret was dying she became constantly with the personality of Margaret was not the girl she in her personality was blind, and unless her eyes were shaded from light they screamed constantly. Changes of personality were accompanied by alternations of pulse. The pulse was quickest when Margaret the child personality was dominant. Sick Doris's pulse was much slower than that of Real Doris. Whenever the girl felt a personality bouncing out her eyes would close and in that condition she could read words which were not spoken, but merely formed by the lips."

"You believe absolutely all these things?" I asked. "You do not think that I am faked any of her personalities?"

"I KNOW," Dr. Prince answered. "Changes of pulse cannot be counterfeited. It is utterly impossible to make the eyes stream to order. Many physicians have studied this case and do not doubt it. Only the ignorant doubt multiple personality, anyhow."

JAPANESE CRUISERS AND MANY AIRSHIPS IN MEDITERRANEAN

Fleets Are Sent to Protect Shipping From Attacks by U-Raiders.

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The Admiralty to-day would not comment on German reports, transmitted through Copenhagen, that a Japanese fleet, accompanied by a large number of aircraft, has arrived in the Mediterranean to co-operate with the alien.

The Times, in publishing the German report, which is said to have come from Italian sources, recalled the fact that it was rumored more than a month ago that Japanese warships would leave for the Mediterranean to protect Japanese shipping against Austro-German submarines.

It was stated at that time that three armored cruisers—the Tokiwa, the Chitose and the Kasuga—all small vessels, would be sent to the Mediterranean. The Tokiwa and Chitose are veterans of the Russo-Japanese War.

DREAMLAND PIER WILL COST \$10,800 MORE

Lease Extended for Five Years—Anglers Must Pay for Privilege of Fishing There.

Dock Commissioner R. A. C. Smith notified the Sinking Fund Commission to-day that because of the increase in the price of building material the cost of the new Dreamland Pier at Coney Island will be \$55,800 instead of \$45,000, the original estimate of three months ago.

The pier is to be built by the city and leased to a company of Coney Islanders, who agreed to pay a rental which in ten years will pay for the cost of the pier. Because of the \$10,800 increase in the cost of construction, five years more will be given the lessees in which to pay.

Mayor Mitchell wanted to know how the anglers who used to fish from the old pier are to be taken care of. Commissioner Smith said he understood there was provision for them. Lockers will be installed for their use, but it is understood the anglers will have to pay for the privilege of fishing from the privately rented city owned pier.

FINGERPRINTS LINK HANEL TO KILLING OF MRS. HEILNER

Her Butler, Long Sought for Flatbush Murder, Makes Denials to the Police.

Four clear fingerprints on the beer bottle which the murderer of Mrs. Julia Heilner used to beat her to death are those of Joseph Hanel, who is under arrest in Baltimore, where he was arrested after a country-wide search, according to experts at Police Headquarters. Hanel was the butler in Mrs. Heilner's home at No. 217 Albenarle Road, Brooklyn, and he was seen to leave the house five minutes before the woman's body was found, on April 23, 1915. The fingerprints and other evidence, the police say, completely disprove Hanel's statement that he was robbing the Heilner home with a confederate when the confederate murdered Mrs. Heilner.

Upon his arrest in Baltimore Hanel immediately admitted his identity and told the story of the pal who had killed Mrs. Heilner. He gave the police the name of the supposed confederate and an address in Pittsburgh, and the New York police were notified this morning that the name of the man was fictitious and that the address described by Hanel does not exist in Pittsburgh. There is not even a street in the name he used.

When Hanel is brought to this city late this afternoon he alone will be charged with the murder of Mrs. Heilner. Lieut. Funston, the fingerprint expert at Police Headquarters, says that the evidence of the fingerprints on the beer bottle will be enough to convict him.

The marks of the fingers impressed on bloodstains on the bottle corresponded exactly with prints of Hanel's fingers taken when he was arrested for a minor offence some time before in Philadelphia. This evidence is supported by the statement of Miss Helen Buck, Miss Heilner's companion, who said she saw Hanel leaving the house alone five minutes before she found the body.

Sixty thousand circulars with a picture and description of Hanel were sent broadcast through the country immediately after the murder. It was known that Hanel had friends in Baltimore and detectives went there several times. Yesterday afternoon Max Schmidt, who had known Hanel in New York, saw him in a moving picture theatre. He followed him to the street and pointed him out to two policemen. They at first did not believe Schmidt and did not want to interfere.

Schmidt then caught hold of Hanel and tried to prevent him from getting away. Hanel fought back and the police then interfered and took the two men to a police station, where Hanel admitted he was the man wanted for murder.

"My name is Joseph E. Hanel, and I am known also as Joseph Harwick and Joseph B. Pettus," his story ran, as the police repeated it. "Until April 23, 1915, I was employed as a butler in the home of Mrs. Julia Heilner in Brooklyn. Before accepting that position I had been living in a lodging house in New York known as the Seaman's Mission."

"There I met (the police would not make public the name of the alleged accomplice), who told me he had obtained a position as a butler in the home of Mrs. Heilner, but was not going to accept it. 'Here are my clothes; you take the job,' he told me. I did so, and afterward we planned the robbery of the house."

"We met several times during the week of my service there, and always discussed the plans for the robbery. Finally it was decided that on the next day the maid was off, I was to call my pal and he was to come out to see me. We were then to rob the place."

"On April 23, 1915, the maid took a day off, and left about 9 o'clock in the morning. When she had gone, I phoned my pal, and he hurried to the house. I opened the door and let him in. Then I told him to hide in the pantry, while I went upstairs on the pretense of making beds, but really to rob the house."

"We appeared on the pavement in front of the house, and met again at the corner school. There my pal told me Mrs. Heilner had come downstairs and he'd killed her. When he told me this, we decided to leave town at once. He did not tell me the details of the murder, but the next day I read them in the papers. We went to New York and from there to Philadelphia."

"The following day we pawned the jewelry in that city. I can't remember the name I used at the pawn shop. I

admit that I planned the robbery and really did it, but I had absolutely nothing to do with the murder of the woman. The first I knew of it was when my pal told me."

Detective Dowd, who went to Baltimore for Hanel, telephoned to Police Headquarters this morning that Hanel had agreed to waive extradition, and as soon as he could arraign him before a Justice there he would start for New York with him. He said Hanel was already confessing some of his previous statements, and it seemed likely he would be soon ready to make a full confession.
