BILLARD SETTLES NEW HAVEN SUIT; PAYS \$1,250,000

Road Sued Him and Others for \$2,700,000 Profits Accruing From Stock Deal.

The New Haven Railroad's suit against John L. Billard, former director, for \$2,700,000, and others, has been settled and the suit withdrawn upon Billard's payment of \$1,250,000. It was announced by the New Haven to-day. The railroad demanded the money as profits accruing from Boston and Maine stock taken over by the New Haven through Billard. Billard contended he acted as an individual and therefore was entitled to the profits. The suit was the result of exposures made by The World showing how the New Haven's funds were diverted from their proper uses.

Billard, a coal dealer, purchased from the New Haven in 1908, during the administration of Charles S. Mellen as President of the road, 119,000 shares of Boston and Maine stock at \$125 and sold it back a year later at \$150. It was alleged that Billard was acting in the interests of the New Haven and that the deal was a fictitious transaction.

The New Haven at that time was forbidden by the Massachusetts laws to own the Boston and Maine, and it was charged that Billard assumed title to the stock to enable the New Haven to inform the Massachusetts authorities that they did not own control of the Boston and Maine.

Later the New Haven was authorized by an act of the Massachusetts Legislature to acquire the Boston and Maine, and the holdings of Billard were sold back to the road.

Billard's ostensible profit in the deal was about \$2,750,000 but this was reduced by other transactions which transpired between the New Haven and the John L. Billard Company. According to testimony in the recent criminal action brought by the Government under the Sherman anti-trust law against former directors of the New Haven, Billard personally did not get but \$50,000. During the trial of the case it was contended by the defendants that the Billard transaction was bona fide. It was brought out by the Government that Billard was, however, financed in the deal by the New Haven and never put up a cent of his own money.

Other defendants in the Billard suit who share in the payment are Charles F. Linsley of Meriden, former President Charles S. Mellen of the New Haven, Samuel Hemingway, Edward D. Robbins, Samuel C. Morehouse and Henry V. Whipple, all of New Haven, directors of the John L. Billard Company, which was alleged to have been interested in the Boston and Maine transactions.

MERIDEN, Conn., March 1.—John L. Billard declined here to-day to make any comment on the announcement of the settlement of the suit of the New York New Haven & Hartford Railroad against him and others in connection with the Boston & Maine transaction. Homer S. Cummings, of Stamford, Counsel for Mr. Billard and others in the suit, made the following comment at Bridgeport to-day: "The statement has given out by the railroad company accurately expresses the situation. I do not care to make any further comment."

STOCKBRIDGE, Mass., March 1.—

Charles H. Mellen, former president of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, in commenting to-day on the settlement of the suit against himself and other New Haven directors, said: "Not one five-cent piece came from me nor was contributed for me, so far as I know." Further than this, Mr. Mellen declared he had nothing to say.
