## CIVIL NIGHT COURT FOR WAGE EARNERS URGED ON JUDGES

Plan Meets Approval of Many Justices and Is Likely to Be Given Trial.

NEEDED BY THE POOR.

Loss of Time and Money by Present System Causes Injustice to Many.

The matter of opening a Civil Night Court was urged before the Board of Municipal Court Justices yesterday afternoon at their monthly meeting at the Ninth District Court House, Madison Avenue and Fifty-ninth Street.

A committee representing prominent citizens presented a resolution setting forth the needs for such a court. It urged the trial of wage cases at night in order to save the loss of time and wages caused by trial in day courts.

The resolution also called for the consideration of disposals or eviction cases in the same court. The committee, all of whom spoke in favor of the proposed measure, were: Inez Milholland Holm, Mrs. William Einstein, Bernard Nolan and Sophie Irene Loeb, Chairman.

Justice Gustave Hartman, who had presented this matter before the Board at its last meeting, also spoke in its support. He furnished statistics showing its importance.

Justice Aaron J. Levy, President of the Court, after hearing various statements as to the conduct and operations of such a court, gave his views as follows:

"For a long time I have considered the advisability of a civil night court. In fact, as early as 1908, while a member of the Legislature I introduced a bill having for its object the creation of such a court.

**BELIEVES SUCH COURT SHOULD BE GIVEN A TRIAL.**

"That bill unfortunately failed of passage. It was only last September when we, for the first time, by the enactment of the new Municipal Court Code, secured a provision authorizing the establishing by rule of a night court.

"I strongly believe this is a move in the right direction and should be tried out. I favor immediate consideration of this course. We have already been working along these lines on a plan for a Court of Conciliation. This was intended to include wage cases. Such a tribunal has proved a success in the city of Cleveland. It would be even more far-reaching here in that all cases could be tried at night, if most convenient, without the disadvantages of present formalities of trial. In other words, wage earners could come before the Judge and have their cases disposed of with as little red tape and loss of time as possible.

"I believe this would tend to bring in many cases that are now otherwise abandoned because of the waste of time and labor. For example, there are many poor people who can ill afford to lose small sums of money, but who are compelled to do so rather than run the risk of losing more in wages and their jobs as well.

"I think it would be a wise plan to first establish such a court in a congested area where the working class predominate. I am confident the Rules Committee, to which this matter is now referred, will formulate a sensible and comprehensive plan of action for our guidance.

"I shall certainly do everything in my power to further this movement and urge my associates to do likewise. I look forward to a successful administration of this prospective feature of our judicial labors."

Justice Frederick Spiegelberg, Chairman of the Rules Committee, also was of the opinion that the civil night court should be given a trial, and if its efficacy be established to further develop the work of such a court throughout the boroughs.

**JUSTICE LYNN WOULD ENFORCE PROMPT PAYMENT, TOO.**

Judge Spiegelberg said: "I have an open mind toward the whole thing. It presents a considerable problem along the lines of procedure. But I feel certain that the committee will carefully consider every angle, and if there is need in the community for such a court it should have the hearty endorsement of the bench.

"I feel sure my colleagues are anxious to meet the actual requirements of the needy and I don't think



that any of them will object to holding court at night if such a step is found necessary under these circumstances.

Justice Waunpoo Lynn, who has served twenty-five years in the Municipal Court, also agreed with the plan of giving the Civil Night Court a fair trial especially in wage cases.

"I want to even go a little further than this," he asserted with emphasis. "I want to see such cases actually paid when judgment is given. I know of many cases involving amounts below \$25 that remain unpaid after judgment."

"Many a poor laborer comes into court, gets his judgment against the employer and then has difficulty in collecting the money which the Judge has awarded. Such a litigant is denied by law the right to a lien on the real estate of the employer when the judgment given is less than \$25. This is an arbitrary statutory limitation and should be repealed.

Justice David Well of the Rules Committee wished to know if there was popular sentiment behind this idea, adding if there was he would be in sympathy with it. He argued that while it was a departure from the present practice he was willing to subscribe to it so long as it proved beneficial.

President Justice Levy asked for a report from the Rules Committee at the next meeting and may call a special meeting of the board to act upon it.

### OBITUARY NOTES.

Brig. Gen. Nicholas W. Day, sixty-seven, died yesterday at East Orange. He enlisted in the Seventy-first New York at the opening of the war, later was Colonel of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Regiment and promoted for bravery.

Bartlett V. Clarke, oldest man in Rahway, died yesterday, aged ninety-eight.

Mrs. Jennie M. Snow, wife of W. G. Snow, President of the Monclair (N. J.) Water Company, is dead.

The Rev. Thomas F. McGivern, Chaplain of St. Mary of the Angels Home, Sroogin, L. L., and formerly of the Sacred Heart Church, Brooklyn, died yesterday, aged seventy-five.

James S. Gilligan, one of the last of the famous Duryea Zouaves in the Civil War, died Sunday in Brooklyn, aged seventy-three.

Miss Rachel Cadmus, life-long resident of Plainfield, N. J., is dead, aged ninety-three years.

Anthony Viehmann, one of the oldest merchants in New Brunswick, N. J., is dead, aged seventy-six.

**Suits Against Roe Dismissed.**

Supreme Court Justice Finch to-day followed up the dismissal of the \$75,000 breach of contract suit brought by Mae A. Sullivan against Arthur I. Roe by dismissing also the \$100,000 action for alleged breach of promise of marriage. Edward G. Price, attorney for Roe, moved for dismissal on the ground of failure to prosecute.

Only Eighteen of Eighty-Five City Legislators Reply.

Eighteen of the eighty-five representatives of New York City in the Legislature have replied to the Tax Reduction Committee's query whether they will support the "City Relief" Bills now pending at Albany. A complete poll had been hoped for by Friday evening, when the committee will hold vote.

A mass meeting in Carnegie Hall in support of the bills, but the committee is beginning to have its doubts. Senators Patton, Carawell, Boylan and Wagner pledged themselves to "work and vote for" all the bills, as did Assemblymen Bacher, McArdle, Kramer, Kelly, Evans and Callahan. Senators Lockwood and Mills approved some of the bills, as did Assemblymen Flammann, Marsh and Stephens. Senator Bennett and Assemblymen Blocker and O'Hare refused to say how they would vote.
