World Wants Work Wonders.

ARE THE PEOPLE WILLING TO PAY? ASKS WHITMAN

Proposed Improvements, He Says, All Are Questions of Finance.

Special to The Evening World: ALBANY, N. Y., March 17.—Discussing the many demands for increases and improvements in State government, Gov. Whitman said to-

day to The Evening World expressed his opinion.
"There are many things that the people want the Government to do. There are many things that should be done, but they must have a question of finance."
"Is the public willing to pay the bill? My experience has been that there is popular demand for something; everybody says we must have it, but when it comes to paying the cost there is loud protest. Now, for example, there has been presented the proposition for a State police force. I am for it. I think we should have such an organization, but the question is whether the State can afford it and whether the people are willing to pay the bill."
"There is popular clamor for increasing the efficiency of the National

Government and getting in line with the new policy of progressiveness. That is something that should be done. But how is the public going to view the increased expenses with the bill raised?"
"Demands are being made or put upon us on all sides that tend to increase the cost of State government. If the people want these things they must be content to pay the bills. Even as it is I fear that there will be levied a direct State tax again next year. I don't see any other way out."
Asked about what the New York City Public Service Commission intended doing now that all its new members had been confirmed, the Governor replied:
"I do not think this any time for speech-making. The Commissioners themselves will give answer by their own work. They will get down to business, and I think the public will have every reason to be satisfied with them."

WIFE'S EPITHETS NOT CRUELTY, IS COURT'S RULING

"Sticks and Stones" Maxim Holds, Finds Judge Denying Dreyfus Separation.

Words abuse from one's wife, no matter how badly it may upset the husband's temper, is not cause for separation in this State. So Supreme Court Justice Cobalan decided today in the separation suit brought by Armand Dreyfus, wealthy importer of Basle, Switzerland, now a guest at the Biltmore, against Marie V. Dreyfus, his bride of less than a year.

The importer alleged his wife called him a "blackguard," "indefatigable mutt," "bar," "dog," "coward" and a "dirty bound" and kept up her alleged abusive conduct from April 25, 1915—five days after their marriage—until they separated, five months ago. Counsel for Dreyfus told Justice Cobalan the calling of such names was extreme cruelty.

The Court, however, holds that when family differences occur, particularly between newly-wedded couples, the old maxim, "Sticks and stones may break your bones, but words will never hurt you," applies.

In the case of Mrs. Dreyfus, there was more than usual justification for irritability, Justice Cobalan finds, because, according to her affidavit, she is about to become a mother. Justice Cobalan tried hard to effect a reconciliation, but neither Mr. nor Mrs. Dreyfus would listen to the proposal, and the Court dismissed the husband's complaint, as well as a counter claim filed by Mrs. Dreyfus, in which she alleged her husband threatened many times to shoot her.

"This is no cause for separation," Justice Cobalan decides, referring to the charge of Dreyfus that he was called harsh names. "Mr. Dreyfus has not shown it is unsafe for him to reside with his wife. That she has been guilty of words abuse is insufficient in law to warrant the granting of a decree of separation in his favor."
"Mrs. Dreyfus is an excitable and imaginative woman. She may have been ill tempered, argumentative, petulant and at times difficult to control and in that way was provocative of ill tempered acts on the part of her husband. She tells of two incidents concerning a revolver, wherein she declares threats were made by her husband. However, her testimony showed she had no fear of the plaintiff and that he had never in any way committed physical violence upon her."

It was testified the plaintiff was a kind and indulgent husband and that, the Court holds, showed he has not been "cruel or inhuman" in his treatment of his wife.
Five days after the marriage of the couple in Havana, Cuba, the first serious trouble arose. They were seated in the Mira Mar Cafe, one of Havana's exclusive dining places, when, according to Dreyfus, his wife unjustly accused him of flirting with other women in the cafe.

At the Biltmore here and later in Winsted, Conn., where Mrs. Dreyfus's wealthy parents reside, more trouble occurred, the husband alleges. He says Mrs. Dreyfus nagged him after he retired and he had to sleep on the floor.

ATTEMPTS TO SEARCH CHORUS GIRL BEFORE BIG CROWD IN STREET

Wealthy Southerner's Party Ends With Police Assistance and Theft Charge.

A regular chorus girl party with all the trimmings of taxicabs, cabarets and a wine breakfast came to an end in the chill of early morning at Eighty-second Street and Columbus Avenue shortly after 7 o'clock today. There ensued for the ladies of the chorus a ride in a police automobile, a visit to Police Headquarters and a sojourn in a cell.
The screams of women in a taxicab interrupted the party and brought Patrolman Morrison on the run. He found a man who said he was William A. Green, a wealthy oil man of Houston, Tex., now at the Waldorf, holding Margaret Randolph, an actress, of No. 64 West Seventy-seventh Street. Battling to free Margaret were Muriel Haines and Helen Brooks of No. 48 Riverside Drive. They said they were in the Zigfield chorus.
The principals in the fight were in the street when the policeman arrived. The wraps of the chorus ladies had slipped off and they were almost completely exposed to the cold. Green told Morrison Miss Randolph had taken \$46 from him. She denied it.
"I'll search her. I know where she has the money," Green shouted. Then he started "to do like he said." Miss Randolph objected on the ground that a woman's bank is not public. Morrison desisted. The crowd groaned.
The extreme evening dress of the three women gave the West side Court a headliner when they were arraigned there this morning on a charge of acting in concert to commit grand larceny.
The plaintiff asked Magistrate Levy if he could withdraw the charge. The Magistrate agreed and the girls were discharged with a lecture.
