THE NEW PLAYS

Grace George Converts Shaw's "Captain Brassbound."

WOMEN make fools of us all. It was this conviction, I take it, that led Grace George to play Lady Cecily Weynflete in "Captain Brassbound's Conversion," which she produced last night as the final play of her highly successful season at the Playhouse. Accordingly, Miss George made short work of Bernard Shaw. In other words, she took him quite into her own hands and made him the seeming victim of a clever, pretty woman. It's all very well to say that this play was written for Ellen Terry, simply because she found it suited to her purposes at a time in life when she had outlived her earlier roles. I recall a night in London, at the Court Theatre, when the most gracious lady of the English stage brought the performance to a momentary halt by forgetting her lines. A few years later she appeared at our own Empiro Theatre and "mothered" a more or less uncertain performance. Not long ago Gertrude Kingston came over from England and made a business-like job of the part at the Neighborhood Playhouse.

As the strangely effective creature who takes men by her own sweet means, Miss George last night, gave a performance that was essentially individual. She stood on her own feet. Ellen Terry was pined, Miss Kingston practical. Miss George took the middle ground and appeared as a Lady Cecily Weynflete with the slenderness of youth and the charm of a pretty woman. Now, all this may not have been according to Shaw, but it was attractive. A clever actress makes her own laws. It must be said, however, that a certain sharpness characterized Miss George's performance. It had more spirit than softness, it missed the bigness of a gentle, motherly soul. But there was always the sense of intelligence as well as comedy, and Miss George did a delightfully human bit of work as she attacked away at Brassbound's coat and talked industriously. This was her best scene.

Robert Warwick was by far the finest Brassbound I have seen. Built for the part, he played it splendidly until he reached the final scene. Here he was lacking, not so much in pathos as in variety of expression. The best character in the play, to my mind, is that of the rat Drinkwater, who really serves as the mouthpiece of Shaw in expressing opinions that put hypocrisy into a hole. Edmund Gwenn made Drinkwater the real joy of the original production. Last night Lewis Edgard seemed a bit too old for the part, but otherwise he carried it off very well. With his unflinching sense of character and remarkable skill in the art of "make-up," Ernest Lawford brought both dignity and intelligence to the role of Sir Howard Hallam. As the Scotch missionary, Hubert Drake was excellent, and although we have seen the smaller parts better played, the performance as a whole was decidedly interesting.

This production of "Captain Brassbound's Conversion" may safely be counted upon to put a new feather in Grace George's Easter hat.
