Carl Morris, the original white hope, is big enough to give Willard a hard fight for the honors he holds. But he doesn't compare with Willard as a boxer. Morris is only an inch shorter, and his weight is about the same as Willard's.


WILLARD needed only to learn how to box to become a champion. He had a number of fights, and learned in every one of them. It was a long time ago that Gunboat Smith won a decision over him on points.

After a few rounds he realized that he was up against it. From that time on it was a desperate Johnny who tried by every trick and artifice to find just one opening for one furious blow that might turn a losing fight into a victory.

THE big champion has too many of the qualities of a great boxer to be beaten until some man even more favored by nature than himself comes along—unless, of course, something robs him of his advantages—unless he loses his health or becomes too fat to fight.

Moran won't beat him. He had his chance. Moran's great asset is a righthand punch. He sets himself and drives through when he finds an opening. That formidable right of his has scared many fighters.
