

KILLS SELF AT DOOR OF HIS SWEETHEART

"If You Ever Throw Me Down I'll Use It," Morio Had Told Her, Showing Her Revolver.

The suicide of Ernest Morio, her sweetheart, is a mystery to Miss Jennie Lantz of No. 184 Winant Street, Elm Park, Staten Island, she told the Coroner to-day. The girl is seventeen years old. Morio was twenty-two and lived at No. 196 Morningstar Road, Elm Park.

Last night Morio met her as she was returning home from a store. He took a revolver from his pocket and showed it to her. She told him he ought to get rid of it.

"If you ever throw me down," he replied, "I'll use it on myself." They laughed and joked all the way to her door, she said, and she told him to wait until she had carried her purchases into the house. Soon after she went in she heard a revolver shot and her father, who is employed in the power house of a Stapleton gas company, found Morio dead from a bullet wound in his right temple. In his pocket was a verse of sentimental poetry. Miss Lantz declared they had had no quarrel.

Morio was employed by the Standard Varnish Works.

GIVES HIMSELF UP, SAYS EASTER MUSIC AWOKE CONSCIENCE

Bernard O'Hara Surrenders to Police as Wanted for Embezzlement in West.

Easter music and flowers along with the story of the resurrection stirred the conscience of Bernard O'Hara, who walked into the West One Hundred and Fifty-second Street Station early to-day and said he was a fugitive wanted by the police of

Peoria, Ill., from whom he fled three years ago. O'Hara, who is twenty-seven years old, gave his present address as No. 83 Columbus Avenue. He is held as a fugitive pending inquiry. Unkempt, unshaven, unwashed and, as it developed later, unbed, he dragged himself into the station and told Lieut. Tighe: "I wish to give myself up. I got into trouble three years ago and have not had any peace since. I want to make good. I've learned there is a conscience. I want to give myself up." When Detective Birmingham arrived from the Fourth Branch Bureau O'Hara said he had been employed as a salesman by Henry Ullman & Son, brewers, of No. 120 South Washington Street, Peoria, Ill., and for several months before his flight had led a merry life, forsaking his wife

and three children and aged mother. According to the detective he said that to "pay his debts" he "borrowed" from the collections he made for the firm. When his embezzlement totalled \$3,000, O'Hara said, he became frightened and dropped from sight, coming to New York, where he has worked at odd jobs, principally in lunchrooms as cook and helper. He did not write home, and he did not prosper. He decided to go to church at Easter for the first time in many months. He sobbed as he told of the sermon, the vision of his mother and his family from whom he had not heard since his flight, and his decision to surrender.

REVOLT IN GUATEMALA DIRECTED BY GERMANS

Uprising Against President Making Headway, Mexico City Hears—Japanese Supplying Arms.

MEXICO CITY, April 26.—Many German officers are directing the Guatemalan revolution, seeking the overthrow of President Estrada Cabrera, it was learned here to-day, and Japanese agents are supplying arms and ammunition. Three columns of revolutionaries are in the field. They are under the leadership of Gen. Isidoro Valdez and Gen. Ignacio Toledo and have made considerable progress. The Liberal and Conservative leaders have united in the revolutionary movement. Their platform contains a demand for labor and land reforms and improved educational facilities.

The May Manton Fashions



THE guimpe dress is always a becoming one to the younger girls and here is a very attractive model. It is quite simple and easy to make, while at the same time it gives new and smart features. The guimpe, with its wide cape collar, is essentially of the season for the wide collars and all the cape effects are in the height of style. The skirt is made with a box plait at each seam and these box plaits are extended up over the suspenders, in a quite novel and attractive manner. Here, the skirt is made of plaid linen sponge and the blouse or guimpe is made of white cotton voile, but you could copy the dress in many different materials. Plaid tulle over the white tulle or even Georgette crepe would make a very dressy costume. The linen sponge over plain linen or any simple cotton material would make a useful one. Challs would be pretty for the skirt with muslin of some sort for the blouse. Pique and linen would be in every way appropriate for the skirt and are very pretty worn with a blouse either of fine lawn or batiste, or of cotton voile, or of cotton crepe. The new cotton material that is known as pikella and which shows very narrow stripes, alternating white with color, is handsome and eminently well suited to this skirt with the suspenders. Altogether there is a very wide variety from which to choose. For the 12 year size the blouse will require 3/4 yards of material 17 inches wide, 2 1/2 yards 36 or 1 1/2 yards 41, and for the skirt 3 1/2 yards 22, or 36, or 2 1/2 yards 41 inches wide. The pattern of the blouse, No. 9041, and the skirt, No. 9042, both are cut in sizes for girls from 10 to 14 years.
