


# Obesity Reducing Exercises for Women Presented in a Series of Handy Charts

## PITTSBURGH TIED UP BY TROLLEY STRIKE

All Lines in City at Standstill and People Travel in Autos and Wagons.

PITTSBURGH, May 1.—Thousands of persons were compelled either to walk or ride in automobiles or big

trucks to work to-day as a result of the strike of street car men, which began shortly after midnight. Operations were completely suspended on all lines of the Pittsburgh Railway Company in Pittsburgh and vicinity and the Washington and Charlot Interurban lines, as well as on the Beaver Valley and Washington local lines. President J. D. Callery announced that no attempt to operate cars would be made to-day.

The Pennsylvania, Baltimore and Ohio and the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroads put on extra local trains in order to handle the increased crowds, while all the downtown department stores and other business houses sent automobile delivery trucks to various sections of the city to gather up their employees.

## WOMEN'S ARMY CAMP OPENS WITH FORCE OF 200 AT WASHINGTON

President Wilson and Other Notables See Society Girls Begin Course for War Work.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—With many national figures present, the feminine "Plattsburgh camp" was opened just outside Washington to-day. President Wilson was to give an address of welcome late this afternoon to two hundred women students, among them many society girls from Eastern cities.

In a two weeks' course they will learn nursing, bandage making and other occupations of women in war time. A few have enrolled for signal training, and one or two for training as ambulance chauffeurs.

## GETTY HOUSE CLOSED.

Famous Old Hostelry in Yonkers Being Made Over.

For the first time since it was opened in 1852, the Getty House, the widely known hostelry which stands on Getty Square, Yonkers, has closed its doors to patrons. The lease held by George Malling expired to-day and he surrendered his occupancy because of the jump in rents in the Getty Square section.

Every one who has had occasion to stop at Yonkers knows the Getty House. Alfred Guyenne Vanderbilt used to make it a stopping place on his coaching trips between New York and Ardsley, and while the horses were being refueled in the stable Mr. Vanderbilt's fashionable guests signed their own refreshments on the piazza of the old hotel. It was built by Robert P. Getty seventy-four years ago, and its sixty-four rooms have been open to travelers continuously ever since.
