
**BABY BORN** in Georgia cemetery and buried alive by mother rescued eleven hours later and is doing fine.


**WHEN TOWN AUTHORITIES** objected to poster of Wisconsin theatre, owners put real overalls on the billboard figures.

**RECTOR QUITS CHURCH  
RATHER THAN "LET UP"  
ON THE RICH SINNERS**

Pressure to Make Dr. Johnson Tone Down Sermons Finally Forces Resignation.

Holy Trinity Church, the most aristocratic church of Newark, is torn by dissension. As a result the Rev. Dr. Morcer Green Johnston, the rector, says he is going to resign. Dr. Johnston came to the parish about three years ago. He is the son of Bishop James S. Johnston of West Texas.

Yesterday morning at the regular service Dr. Johnston preached a sermon on "An Account of My Stewardship," in which he recounted some of the reasons for his determination to resign.

"My story is the story of 'The Inside of the Cup,' by Winston Churchill, all the way through," he said yesterday. "Just after I got here I felt pressure being brought on me by the vestry in a friendly way to tone down my utterances. Lately the pressure has reached the point where I received a final suggestion that it might be to the best interests of the parish for me to resign."

"In my interpretation of my duty, I feel that Jesus was in dead earnest and that He preached a practical religion to apply to personal life, family life, industrial, ecclesiastic and political."

"I showed myself interested in the disaffected elements. In the big garment workers' strike of three years ago I worked hard for a solution, and that irritated some of the members of the congregation."

A letter to a friend of Dr. Johnston at this time has in it the sentence: "I have been making the fairest trial possible in a capitalist parish in a capitalist community to find out whether it is possible for a minister of Jesus Christ in this century to preach unflinchingly the gospel with all its personal application. My attempt has failed."

**PARISH HOUSE WRANGLE  
OVER PREPAREDNESS**

Clash Follows Addresses Made in Church of Ascension by Army and Navy Officers.

Following services in the Church of the Ascension, Fifth Avenue and Tenth Street, last night, there was a heated discussion on preparedness which caused frequent hisses and boos to be mingled with cheers. The meeting lasted until early this morning, and during its course sentiments extremely personal in nature were expressed by opposing speakers.

Among those who spoke for a larger army and navy were Capt. William P. White, U. S. N., retired; Capt. Halstead Dorey, Fourth United States Infantry, and Major James M. Hutchinson, Seventy-first Regiment, N. G. N. Y. The addresses were delivered in the church, but the debate following was in the parish house.

The addresses were delivered in the church, but the debate following was in the parish house. Members of the congregation accused those who spoke for preparedness as being in league with the munitions manufacturers, who were called enemies to the country.

Many persons in the audience apparently were against preparedness for they continually applauded any remark or question antagonistic to the speakers.

Women among the speakers said the country should be made ready for defense and that they were ready for the call to arms.

**SWEDES USE OLD SHIPS.**

One Built in 1778, Another in 1780, Brought Back to Service by War. COPENHAGEN, May 15.—A remarkable example of the extraordinary straits to which shipping has been reduced for want of vessels is told in a despatch to the Ekstrabladet from Svendborg. Anything that can be floated is pressed into service.

Two sailing vessels, one the Marie of Tronee, which was built in 1778, and another, the Tyende Brodre, of Marstal, built in 1786, have been rigged up and sent out to enter the competition for the enormous freight rates which are now being offered everywhere.

**FLOWERS FOR SAILOR DEAD.**

Carrying red carnations, white roses and blue corn flowers, a miniature battleship was launched on the Hudson River off the foot of West Ninety-seventh Street yesterday afternoon. It was a tribute to the camps and women's auxiliaries of the United Spanish War Veterans at their annual memorial services for the unknown sailor dead.

The newly launched vessel had a short life. Made of cardboard, it soon sank and spread the red, white and blue flowers on the waves to be carried out to the ocean to decorate the resting place of many who have given up their lives in the service of their country.


