

NEW YORK PRESBYTERY  
FACES EXPULSION FIGHT  
IN GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Move Aimed at Union Seminary Expected at Atlantic City Meeting.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 18.—An atmosphere of hostility prevailed here when the 900 delegates attending the Presbyterian General Assembly convened to-day. Half a dozen Presbyteries, including that of Cincinnati, are expected to initiate a movement to divorce the New York Presbytery

from the General Assembly. Although few delegates would discuss publicly the expected expulsion movement, which was precipitated by the action of the New York body in licensing three young ministers against the rules of the governing body, the matter was practically the sole topic of private discussion.

If the expulsion proceedings are instituted, it will be the first movement of its kind in the history of American Presbyterianism. Members of the New York Presbytery do not believe the action will result in expulsion. They claim the young ministers affirmed faith in the required Presbyterian doctrines when they were admitted to the church.

The action is really directed against Union Theological Seminary, of which the three ministers licensed are graduates.

If the New York body is cut off there are many who think it means that all its property will go too. This means that the Presbyterian Church will lose more than \$21,000,000. The church buildings alone are valued at \$18,250,528. The Extension Committee represents more than \$2,000,000 and the Trustees of Presbytery control more than \$1,000,000.

If this transpires the Boards of the Church will also lose benevolences of more than \$1,500,000 annually. The total benevolences last year were \$1,874,803.

The New York Presbytery was warmly defended by the Rev. J. Ross Stevenson of Princeton, Moderator, when he opened the convention.

Mr. Stevenson declared that the European war is a direct challenge to the Church that cannot be overlooked because it means either a triumphant revival of the faith or a blighting invasion of unbelief. He pleaded for a united effort to meet the challenge.

He asserted that the past twelve months had witnessed a high-water mark in benevolence, increased faithfulness and additions to the Church outstripping all previous years.

The selection of the new Moderator will take place late to-day.

WOMEN IN MANACLES  
TO MARCH FOR SUFFRAGE

Committee Maps Out Plans for Parade of 40,000 to Impress Republican Convention Delegates.

CHICAGO, May 18.—The difference between the twelve States where suffrage has been granted to women and the thirty-six others will be illustrated in the parade, June 7, when it is expected forty thousand women will march on Michigan Avenue for the purpose of inducing the Republican National Convention to incorporate a suffrage plank in the party platform.

Plans adopted by the committee to-day call for a division in the parade in which twelve young women dressed in white and bearing the names of the States where suffrage has been granted will lead a detachment of thirty-six other girls dressed in gray, with their hands manacled and a ball and chain in the shape of a toy balloon attached to their ankles by a cord, symbolizing the States where women do not have the right to vote.

PAIR IN PINK PAJAMAS  
JUMP 40 FEET TWICE,  
FLEE FROM BELLEVUE

Police Are Still Looking for Athletic Prisoners Who Made Daring Double Escape.

All records for the standing jump were shattered last night by Thomas

Brancati, twenty-three years old, and Monte Searle, forty, each of whom cleared a distance of forty feet. Notwithstanding they performed this remarkable athletic feat twice, it is unlikely the officials of the A. A. U. will recognize the performance, as the jump was made from the second-story of Bellevue Hospital.

Brancati and Searle, charged with concealing narcotics on their persons, have been in the hospital two weeks. They were to have been arraigned in Special Sessions this morning. Not wishing to add to the heavy burden of the Judges, they eluded the policemen on guard last night and removed a heavy window screen in a washroom. Undeterred

by the fact that they were in pink pajamas and barefooted, they dropped to the yard, forty feet below, on the Avenue A side of the building, and scaled a ten-foot picket fence.

They boarded a street car and took their places among the passengers. John Poscos, conductor, sees so many strange things on his line that he did not notice them until some one called his attention to their bare feet. Poscos then stopped the car and marched the two men back to the hospital.

The Wilkes will be one of the largest torpedo boat destroyers in the navy. Fleece of Memphis, Tenn., grand niece of Horatio Bridge, for whom the vessel is named, was the sponsor.
