taken enough drugs to cause death?  
A. No.  
Q. Did he ask you to get anything

for him? Ask you to provide him with some means of doing away with himself? A. He did.  
**SAYS DR. WAITE ADMITTED ROBBER EMPLOYERS IN AFRICA.**  
On cross-examination Assistant District Attorney Brothers attacked Dr. Waite's character, after getting an admission from the witness that he had told Dr. Connelly at Bellevue there was "no epilepsy, mental deficiency or criminality" in the Waite family history.  
Q. Did your brother tell you he was dismissed by his South African employers for stealing? A. No. He didn't say he was dismissed; he said he took money.  
Q. Did he say he stole as much as his salary every month? A. Yes.  
Clyde E. Waite, next called, who is four years older than Dr. Waite, described his brother as a willful, sly, lying, thieving, easy boy and youth.  
Q. Did you go to school with your brother? Was he quarrelsome?  
A. Yes, always.  
Q. After he was nine years old did his quarrels continue?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Was he cruel? How did he show it?  
A. We had to take the horse away from him, he was so rough with it.  
Q. Was he cruel in other ways?  
A. Yes, with animals, always.  
Q. How did he show it?  
A. He drowned a pot kitten.  
Q. Was your brother a steady student?  
A. No. He refused to study; he said he could fool the teachers.  
Q. Did he commit thefts at high school?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Did he continue to lie all through his life?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Did his quarrelsome disposition persist?  
A. Yes.  
Q. Did you talk with him about it?  
A. Yes, but it didn't do any good.

era, cross-examining Clyde Waite, began a savage attack on his credibility.  
Q. Did you write your brother Arthur March 1, this year, that you were in trouble over money? A. Not exactly.  
Q. But you were in trouble? A. Some.  
Q. As a matter of fact, you were dismissed by your employers for stealing? A. No, I wasn't dismissed.  
Q. But you were short in your accounts? A. I shouldn't call it that.  
Q. You had to make restitution?  
A. I paid back about \$200, about which there was a dispute.  
Q. You appealed to your brother for help? A. I did not; I settled the matter with my own money.  
The witness then explained he quarreled with his employers over a disputed account, paid the amount of the difference and resigned. He said he had returned every cent of \$10.00 Dr. Waite sent him to Miss Katharine Peck as soon as he heard there was the slightest cloud on Dr. Waite's right to it.  
Warren W. Waite, fifty-nine years old, a weather-worn, gray-haired, grim-featured man, father of the defendant, was questioned regarding the family history. Mr. Waite left his farm, near Grand Rapids, sixteen years ago to become a salesman and jobber in fruits, butter and eggs in Grand Rapids.  
The witness said his own father, Miles Waite, left home ten miles from Cleveland to make his way on foot to Michigan to find work and was never heard from again. The witness' mother, Laura Dutton Waite, had nieces and nephews who were sent to insane asylums. One or more died in asylums and one is still in an asylum at Kalamazoo. The witness was not allowed to tell of other members of the family he thought were "queer."  
Mr. Waite said his son had always refused to work, was disobedient, sly, and in contrast to Clyde and Franklin who were "very trusty," was a liar from babyhood and unreliable.  
"I had to pay about \$100 to make up money he took from schoolmates one time," he said.

**DEPOSITIONS TELL OF INSANITY IN WAITE FAMILY.**

Cross examination by Mr. Brothers:  
Q. Do you remember talking with Mr. Gus Roeder, a newspaper reporter who came with you from Albany to New York on your first trip here in March?  
A. Yes, I remember the gentleman.  
Q. Do you remember telling him there was no insanity in your family?  
A. I said there was none in my immediate family. I wasn't talking about ancestry.  
Q. You didn't think your son, Arthur, was insane then?  
A. I don't know what you mean by insane; he was always queer and indifferent—perhaps he is.  
A deposition was introduced, taken by Attorney Crater and Assistant District Attorney Marcus, from Dr. Herman Ostrander, Superintendent of the Kalamazoo insane asylum where L. Jackson, a cousin of Dr. Waite, died in 1912, and where her brother Burt is now in custody. Dr. Ostrander described both as victims of dementia praecox and Bert as a victim of paranoid delusions.  
A long deposition from Dr. William Nash, a fellow student with Dr. Waite at the University of Michigan, described Dr. Waite as moody, er-

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
