His home lay across the Potomac, at Warren, Va., but he was often seen in Washington, his white hair and strong Roman features making him a picturesque figure on the streets or lecture platform.

21 CARS START IN AUTO CLASSIC AT INDIANAPOLIS

Rockenbacher Sets Ninety-Mile Pace in First Lap of 300-Mile Race.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 30.—Twenty-one motor cars, representing the United States, England and France, were sent away in the 300-mile International Sweepstakes race at the Indianapolis Speedway at 1:20 o'clock this afternoon by Starter George Dickson.

The first lap was paced by Frank S. Smith, a local automobile man, and did not count in the race. Rockenbacher's Maxwell completed the first lap in 1:39.42, an average of ninety miles an hour. He was closely followed by Aitken's Peugeot, Resta's Peugeot, Anderson's Premier and Rooney's Premier in the order named.

Not one of to-day's starters has won the Speedway classic. Dario Resta, who lined up his Peugeot with the first four, came closest to this distinction when he ran second to Ralph de Palma last year. Resta was one of the favorites among the betters.

The Belgian, Christianens, was another favorite. His Sunbeam will finish well up, according to railbirds. A collected list of the drivers, tabulated in the order of their start, follows: Aitken, Rockenbacher, Anderson, Resta, Olanite, Wilcox, Rooney, Monza, Henderson, D'Alene, Chevrolet, Chevrolet, De Vigne, Haibe, Christianens, Chandler, Franchi, Johnson, Lewis, Alley and Mulford.

The money prize alone offered sufficient incentive to the drivers to step on their cars this afternoon. The Speedway offered \$29,500. Various prizes totaling about \$10,000. The A. A. A. added to the list by offering 500 points to the winner as his score in the National Speedway Championship. This is the largest number of points offered for any race. The New York Speedway offers six hundred.

An electric timing device, originated here, was prepared to catch the speed to the one-hundredth of a second.

SHIP TORPEDOED WITHOUT WARNING, BERLIN CHARGES

Captain and Five Others on the German Steamer Kolga Lost in Baltic.

BERLIN, May 30 (by wireless to Bayville).—Six men were lost in the attack by a submarine on the German steamer Kolga, sunk in the Baltic on May 17, according to a despatch to the Overseas News Agency today from Lubeck, where the survivors of the steamer have arrived. The despatch declares that the Kolga was shelled after she had stopped at a distance of 400 metres from the steamer, says the despatch. "The submarine firing a shot which went wide, upon which the steamer immediately stopped. Notwithstanding this, one minute later a second shot was fired which destroyed the bridge. The crew, only half clad, rushed for the lifeboats, while the captain ran into the cabin in an effort to rescue the ship's papers."

The submarine fired two more shots, both of which struck the steamer. One sailor was wounded. Immediately afterward came a torpedo, although it could be clearly observed from the submarine that the crew was about to launch the lifeboats. The torpedo caused the steamer to sink immediately, the captain, both the helmsmen, the cook and two sailors perishing.

CUTTER MOHAWK OFF REEF. With Officials Aboard She Is Stranded for Ten Hours.

NEW LONDON, May 30.—The United States revenue cutter Mohawk, after an unexpected delay of about ten hours on its way from New York, arrived here at 7:30 o'clock this evening. In time to send a few naval guests ashore to attend the Coast Guard banquet in the Mohican Hotel to-night.

The Mohawk grounded a short distance from the shore this morning and her engines were unable to budge her. A heavy fog prevailed and wireless calls brought several of the naval vessels in port to her relief. Nothing could be done, however, to aid the cutter until high water, when the cutter Andreucovich got a hawser aboard and hauled the stranded craft into deep water.
