**DR. LYMAN'S TRIAL  
FOR FRAUD BEGINS;  
DEFENDS HIMSELF**

Objects to "Scandalous Language of Indictment," at Which Judge Smiles.

A jury was empaneled before Judge Wolverson in the United States District Court this afternoon for the trial of Dr. John Grant Lyman, alias John H. Putnam, for alleged use of the United States mails to defraud. The case was opened last Monday morning and it was nearly 1 o'clock to-day before the twelfth juror was accepted.

Assistant United States Attorney Edwin M. Stanton made the opening address for the Government, starting in by reading the indictment. Dr. Lyman was on his feet in a minute. The doctor is his own lawyer, having refused to hire counsel on the ground that he was too poor to pay one. Since Monday he has been adding a knowledge of law to his many other accomplishments. He objected to the "scandalous language" of the indictment. This, perhaps, was the first time in the history of the court that such an objection had been made. Judge Wolverson, usually very stern, smiled.

Lyman kept interrupting Mr. Stanton in his address to the jury until the Court forbade further interference. The Court told the promoter-lawyer that he had been given an opportunity to have a lawyer, and that he must abide by his own decision.

Lyman throughout the examination of the last two jurors to complete the jury followed the same general trend of questions as started by him when addressing prospective jurors on Monday. Such phrases as "soldiers of fortune," "on the square" and "laying my cards on the table" figured in the questions.

Lyman outlined in his questions his defense for his aliases. He asked the jurors if they appreciated the difficulties encountered by a man going into business after he had been convicted. In those circumstances, he wanted to know if it would prejudice his case because he had gone into business under a name other than his own.

**MUNITION INSPECTOR  
BEATEN BY STRANGERS**

Found Unconscious To-day From Injuries Received Sunday at Canarsie.

John Brush, an ammunition inspector in the E. W. Bliss Company factory in Brooklyn, was found unconscious in his home at No. 25 Williams Avenue, East New York, this morning by his wife. He was taken to the Kings County Hospital, where it was said he was suffering from internal injuries and concussion of the brain and might die.

Brush became conscious for a few moments at the hospital and said that four men met him in Canarsie on

Sunday night and asked him if he was still inspector of ammunition at the Bliss plant. When he replied that he was they set upon him.

He said he remained unconscious in the roadway for some time before he recovered enough to get home. He said nothing of the assault when he went to work on Monday. He stayed home yesterday. When his wife went to arouse him this morning she discovered his condition.

**GAS EXPLOSION HURTS 3.**

Tank in Williamsburg Plant of Standard Oil Set Off by Hammer Spark.

Sparks from a workman's hammer on a gas tank in the Standard Oil plant at Kingsland and Meserole Avenues, Williamsburg, at 1 o'clock this afternoon set fire to the leaking gas and caused an explosion in which three men were injured. A torch of gas five feet long burned for several minutes. Patrick Scagrave, sixty-five years old,

of No. 674 Humboldt Street, the engineer; Fred Arne of No. 212 Morgan Avenue, and George O'Grady of No. 105 Eckford Street, were all severely burned about the head and upper part of the body. They were taken to the Greenpoint Hospital.
