

NEW JERSEY STATE GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP OPENS AT ENGLEWOOD

Another Three-Day Tourney Is Westchester Title Meet at Wykagyl Club.

The tournament golfers will be very much on the job to-day with the starting of the New Jersey State championship at Englewood and the Westchester title meet at Wykagyl Club in New Rochelle. Both tournaments will be three-day contests.

The Jersey meet without Jerry Travers loses considerable of its attractiveness though young Max Oster, the defending title holder, Oscar Karkby, a former State champion, Maurice Risely and several other stars will be on hand and the tournament won't lack the presence of topnotchers.

To-day's play will be devoted to an 18-hole qualifying test, the first six-runners qualifying for the championship. This afternoon the field will journey across the Englewood links in the first match play round. This schedule will allow for a 36-hole final round on Saturday. Marston captured the Jersey title from Kirkby last year on the links of the Essex Country Club.

The Westchester championship has steadily grown in popularity recently though the Wykagyl Club always seems to encounter bad luck in securing dates for the county tournament because there's generally opposition on other courses.

The Westchester meet provides for a 24-hole qualification and with the field at Englewood to-morrow and Saturday. Dwight Partridge holds the Westchester title, a victory earned at the expense of Johnny Anderson in the finals last year.

Opposition Race Meetings At Belmont and Piping Rock

Clash Not Relished by Racegoers, Who Realize Locust Valley's Aid to Sport.

PIPING ROCK and Belmont Park run opposition meetings to-day. It's a sad state of affairs, but those who framed the racing calendar for the season say the clash couldn't be helped. There was a time during racing's rejuvenation that the Westchester Association ran off its programme in the morning in order to give Piping Rock a clear field for the afternoon racegoers, but that period has passed, evidently.

The Piping Rock Association has endeared itself to a certain percentage of racing enthusiasts by its efforts to preserve the sport when it seemed on its last legs. These racegoers, and they are legion, can't understand why Belmont Park should run in direct opposition to Piping Rock. It has a programme for this afternoon that doesn't suffer in the least by comparison with that of Belmont Park. On the contrary, the Piping Rock former place is large and attractive and savor of a sportiness that is not in evidence at the Queens County track these days. On event alone, the \$10,000 Sweepstakes, is worthy of the trip to Locust Valley. Some of the most promising two-year-olds of the season are entered, and an international flavor is lent to the race by the appearance of many of the imported youngsters who will be seen under colors for the first time in this country. The rest of the programme includes some good cross country and flat races.

Ivory Black, which won the opening race at Belmont Park yesterday in James Butler's colors, is believed to be one of the best youngsters of the year. He was a 1-to-4 shot in the race, and performed as all oral odds on choices should. He finished galloping ten lengths in front of the field. He was owned by J. M. Butler, who bought him for \$10,000. E. Madden along with seven other yearlings for a small-sized fortune. Ivory Black is by Star Shoot and Ivory Belle, the latter the dam of the celebrated Old Rosebud. He is an extraordinary good looking black colt, but a trifle lanky.

Sam McMeekin, the colt for which August Belmont and Sam Hildreth paid \$15,000 last year, has reached the \$100 selling plate's stage. In this company yesterday he just did better in front, beating Ida Clair a nose. Sam McMeekin made his first appearance in a selling race this season. He was sold for \$10,000. His next appearance among the players was at \$500 when he was beaten. He next started as a 5000 horse and won. McMeekin was bid up this time to \$10,000.
