

Mrs. Gavin and Miss Ramsay Won't Play for Griscom Cup

Not Known Why Former Won't Play With "Mets," but It Is Said Boston Team Member Will Soon Become a "Pro."

MANCHESTER-BY-THE-SEA, Mass., June 6.—Mrs. W. F. Gavin of the Cherry Valley Club of New York, will not be a member of the metropolitan women's team in the Griscom Cup match play at the conclusion of the championship 54-hole medal play here for the Women's Eastern Association championship.

The decision of the metropolitan woman golfer follows the action of the Boston women golfers in not making Miss Vera Ramsay a member of the Boston team in the Griscom Cup play. Miss Ramsay is another English woman, and also has been Boston champion for two consecutive years. Both Mrs. Gavin and Miss Ramsay have been in this country a long time. Their elimination from the Griscom Cup match play is unexplained, though to-day Miss Ramsay intimated that she is to turn professional at the conclusion of the tourney.
