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him with having ruined her life. Her sobs were audible as Mr. Rand proceeded and her frame shook.

Her trial for perjury was resumed this morning before Judge Wolverton and a jury in the United States District Court with a wrangle. When Attorney Walter Barney was on the stand Friday he said he had read in a paper that Rae Tanzer claimed to have been with Attorney James W. Osborne on certain dates, on which dates, he testified, Mr. Osborne was engaged with him in a trial in the Federal Court in Providence, R. I. Mr. Slade, for the defense, said on cross-examination that the first mention of the dates was made in the Safford trial in May, 1915. Mr. Barney having declared he had read of the dates and had come to New York to see Osborne in consequence before the Safford trial.

Prosecutor Rand, for the Government, this morning introduced the record in the Osborne hearing before Commissioner Houghton, at which Dora Tanzer, the defendant's sister, testified Rae had been with Osborne in the latter part of November and the early part of December, 1914. This hearing was on March 24, 1915, nearly two months before the Safford trial, and Attorney Slade objected to the record, saying nothing said by Dora Tanzer could be binding on the defendant, and furthermore that specific dates were not mentioned. Mr. Rand insisted the dates were specified and Mr. Slade's objection was overruled.

Judge Wolverton explained to the jury that the record was admitted as evidence, not as corroborative in any way, but merely to show that the dates had been mentioned before the Safford trial and that Attorney Barney might have read of them in a newspaper and then come to New York to discuss them with Osborne.

William Patrick Cross, Clerk of the United States District Court in Providence, R. I., corroborated the testimony of Attorney Barney as to Attorney Osborne's presence in court on Nov. 23, 24 and 25 and on Dec. 1, 2, 3 and 4, 1914.

Attorney Slade held the reading of the Safford record was unnecessary. The indictment against Miss Tanzer, he said, charged her with having sworn she was with Osborne Dec. 1, 2 and 3. He declared she never testified to anything of the kind. On advice of her counsel, he declared, she declined to testify to anything at all concerning Mr. Osborne, except to identify him in court.

Attorney Rand took the stand to read the testimony in the Safford case which he declared applicable to this case. It comprised for the most part letters of Rae Tanzer and Oliver Osborne. Attorney Slade declared that Mr. Rand's appearance on the stand was not becoming and that his remarks and his reflections on what he read were prejudicial to the defendant, since Mr. Rand was impressing his own viewpoint on the jury. He asked that a mistrial be declared.

Judge Wolverton said that he did not think Mr. Rand's conduct was unprofessional. Mr. Slade hastened to say that he had not sought to convey that impression, but the Court said that it was the same thing and refused to grant a mistrial. Mr. Rand went on reading, Miss Tanzer covering her eyes with her hand during the reading of her love letters.

Suddenly at 12:30 o'clock Miss Tanzer, who had been weeping silently for ever an hour, became wildly hysterical. She screamed aloud,

writhed about in her chair and threw the court into confusion. Judge Wolverton called a short recess, but it soon became evident she would not be quieted readily, so he adjourned the session until 2 o'clock. Miss Tanzer was carried into the Judge's room and quieted there.

# FOUR RAILWAY UNIONS REJECT ROADS' OFFER

Representatives of the four railway brotherhoods rejected this afternoon the compromise plan of the railroad managers, submitted in negotiations over the employees' demand for an eight-hour day and time and a half for overtime.

President Garretson of the conductors' organization announced that the demands of the men were not modifiable, and that no compromise would be satisfactory. The men said that they saw no reason for continuance of the conferences, and adjournment was taken.

# FILM STAR CHOKES WIFE

Julian F. Dillon Also Announces He Will Sue Her for Divorce.

Julian F. Dillon, one of the "Famous Players" of the films and son of John Dillon, millionaire retired merchant, announced in the West Side Court today that he would begin divorce action against his wife, Ruth M., the daughter of Dr. William S. Harrington of No. 214 Riverside Drive. Dillon is twenty-eight and his wife is twenty-four. They have not been living together for several months.

Mrs. Dillon charged that her husband visited her at her parents' residence on May 26 and after choking her threatened to kill her.

Dillon pleaded guilty and Magistrate Levy released him under suspending sentence. It was explained by Dillon that he decided to plead guilty rather than make disclosures he is making for his contemplated divorce action.
