# MORE FIRMS GRANT FULL PAY TO MEN CALLED TO COLORS

**Jobs Are Held Open, Too, and in Some Cases Insurance Is Added.**

The prompt response to the call to arms by all the National Guard regiments of New York has been matched by the splendid spirit of patriotism shown by nearly all the business men in the city whose employees have been called to the colors. Corporations, manufacturers, banks, big business houses and little firms have alike assured their employees they will receive their pay while away from work and defend their country. The response of business has been instant and well nigh universal.

Not only will the men's families receive their pay while they are at the front, but their jobs will be kept waiting for them until they return. The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company has awarded full pay to all employees who were members of the National Guard before June 19. At the end of three months a new arrangement will be made. The two hundred employees in the National Guard will keep their rank in line for promotion, and their life insurance will be kept up.

Crane & Co., makers of valves and fittings, with branches in all parts of the country, announce they will keep all their National Guard employees on full pay during service, and that all who enter now in the National Guard will receive full pay, too.

The United Cigar Stores Company has granted full pay to all employees in the Guard on June 18, who are called out to military duty.

The express companies are very largely affected, many of the chauffeurs and drivers having been called to the colors. New men are being hired, but the absent soldiers will not lose their jobs.

The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company is represented in the Guard by sixty-eight employees. Four others are in the Naval Militia.

Lieut. Col. J. J. Byrne of the Ninth Coast Artillery is one of forty members of the Consolidated Stock Exchange who are enlisted, including H. L. Chapman and H. M. Beitz, both aviators.

The Columbia Trust Company will give full pay to its twenty guardsmen. Two of the employees are aviators.

Fifty members and employees of the National Guard, will grant these men full pay during their absence, and their positions open for them and not permit their seniority rights in the matter of promotion to be affected.

The United Bookbinding Office and H. F. Keith employees will also receive full pay while serving with their regiments, and their positions will be held open for them.

The American Sugar Refining Company employees who respond to the call to arms will be assured of employment on their return and their positions throughout their absence will be held open for them or to their relatives.

The Bell Telephone System employees who are now serving their country will receive full pay for the first three months of service and for the following nine months full pay minus the amount given by the Government.

Franklin Simon & Co. have granted full pay.

Household Electric, following the example of the American Sugar Refining Company, will give to each of their employees who serve in the United States full pay and \$50 to the heirs in case of death of the soldier, and the firm's position will be held open while they serve in the Guard. The order is in effect until Jan. 1, 1917, when it will be subject to further action of the firm's position will be held open while they serve in the Guard.

Abraham & Straus and Frederick Lerner & Co., Brooklyn, have granted full pay. The former store will lose 200 employees by the call to the colors.

Oppenheimer, Collins & Co., New York and Brooklyn, allow full pay.

A. I. Namin & Sons, Brooklyn, have granted full pay, with \$50 in insurance in case of death.

Gimbel Bros., in whose establishment are forty-two members of the National Guard, will grant these men full pay during their absence, and their positions open for them and not permit their seniority rights in the matter of promotion to be affected.

Assistant District Attorney Dooling to-day received copies of indictments found against Alexander Kidney Rosenthal, a lawyer, of No. 238 Broadway, and Margaret Hill, of No. 238 West Fifty-fourth Street, in Essex County, N. Y., charged on arraignment with the kidnaping of Miss Claypool, a young girl, recently disappeared from her parents' home in the Great Northern Hotel and was finally located at the Hotel Trent Hotel in Newark, N. J.

Warrants for the arrest of both Rosenthal and Mrs. Hill were given to Detective Coniff and Gallagher. Detective Coniff this afternoon reported that Mrs. Hill had disappeared from her New York home.
