**AMBULANCE CORPS  
OFF TO CAMP WITH  
HOSPITAL OUTFIT**  
150 Men and 100 Horses Are  
Started This Morning on  
River Boats.  
15-MILE HIKE AHEAD.  
Long March to Camp After  
Landing at New Ham-  
burg.

All the equipment of the First Field  
Hospital Corps and the Third Am-  
bulance Company of the New York  
National Guard, including 100 horses,  
twenty-three ambulances, several  
service wagons and much baggage,  
was taken aboard the steamer Storm  
King this morning and started up the  
Hudson at 8:30 o'clock to New Ham-  
burg, the river point nearest to Camp  
Whitman.  
The hospital corps proper, compris-  
ing seventy-four officers and men, un-  
der Major J. Franklin Dunseth, and  
the ambulance corps, with eighty-  
four officers and men, under Cap-  
tain Leander H. Shaver, followed at 10  
o'clock on the Robert Fulton of the  
Albany Day Line.  
Capt. George A. White of the Rob-  
ert Fulton will make a special land-  
ing at New Hamburg, which is a  
small town a few miles south of  
Poughkeepsie, and the guardsmen  
will disembark there for the sixteen-  
mile tramp inland to the camp. They  
are prepared with rubber ponchos in  
case wet roads force them to bivouac  
between the river and Camp Whit-  
man to-night. A complete cooking  
department also prepares them for  
the same emergency.  
Though it was only 5:30 o'clock when  
the boys left their armory in Sixty-  
sixth Street this morning, several  
scores of relatives and friends were on  
hand to watch them depart. The two  
commands marched down Central  
Park West and Eighth Avenue to  
Forty-second Street and thence west  
to the river, getting many a cheer and  
a hearty farewell from early risers  
along the line.  
The excitement caused by the re-  
ports from Mexico, the obstreperous  
behavior of some of the green horses  
and the work of overhauling the sur-  
geon's kits, collapsible operating ta-  
bles and other surgical paraphernalia  
kept the men awake most of the night,  
and it is probable that no matter  
where they camp to-night they will  
not be bothered with insomnia.

**MUST ASK FRANCE  
FOR U. S. AVIATORS**  
American Airmen Now With Allies  
Cannot Return of Their  
Own Accord.  
PARIS, June 22.—The American  
aviators in the service of France are  
not able to comment on or reply to  
the inquiry from the Aero Club of  
America whether they will return to  
take service in the American army in  
the event of war with Mexico. They  
are prevented from replying by the  
fact that they have enlisted in the  
French army for the duration of the  
war and are subject to army discip-  
line.  
The only manner in which this sub-  
ject could be taken up would be by  
negotiations between the Govern-  
ments of France and the United  
States. The case of the Gasparidians  
released from the service of France to  
fight in Italy is not parallel, inasmuch  
as those soldiers returned to their own  
country to fight with the Entente al-  
lies.

**RECRUITING BRISK  
AT ALL ARMORIES;  
REGIMENTS READY**  
71st, 14th and 47th Expect  
New Order to Leave for  
Camp To-Morrow.

The men of the Seventy-first Regi-  
ment in Manhattan and of the Four-  
teenth and Forty-seventh in Brook-  
lyn recovered from their disappoint-  
ment in not leaving for Camp Whit-  
man to-day on assurances they prob-  
ably would receive new orders to  
leave to-morrow. The original order  
was countermanded because the water  
supply system at the camp was not  
completed.  
Four carloads of tanks and pipes  
intended to amplify the water dis-  
tributing system at the camp are  
missing in transit. Tracers have been  
sent out to look for the cars along  
the lines of the New York Central  
and the Central New England. This  
is the reason why the completion of  
the water supply is delayed.  
So rapid has been the enlistment  
during the last three days that the  
supply of uniforms and equipment  
furnished by the State and Federal  
Governments has been exhausted and  
many of the newly recruited militiamen  
will have to be sent to Camp  
Whitman in their civilian clothes.  
They will be uniformed and accoutred  
after their arrival there.  
Col. Sternberger to-day despatched  
Col. I. De Bevoise of the First Cavalry,  
Brooklyn, Quartermaster Capt. Thomas  
H. Stanton and Veterinary Surgeons  
Macdonald and Kitner over to the Jer-

sey City stock yards to pass on 500  
mules and 1,000 horses which arrived  
there this morning.  
Capt. Joseph Farrel, attached to  
Col. Sternberger's staff, to-day an-  
nounced that he wanted male stenog-  
raphers to enlist as privates and help  
with the work at headquarters here  
and at Camp Whitman. Those who  
enlist in this way will go with the  
troops in case they move to the border.  
Recruiting kept pace to-day in all  
the local armories with the increased  
enthusiasm due to late news from  
the border, which seemed to assure  
all the guardsmen the active service  
they are eager for.  
Members of the First Cavalry are  
 Jubilant over a report their place has  
already been assigned on the border.  
Troops K and L, which expect to be  
ordered to Camp Whitman to-day,  
are to go to El Paso, it is said.  
While no official information has  
come as to the time of departure for  
the first of New York's soldiers for  
the border, there is reason to believe  
it will not be long delayed. The New  
York Central reported to-day it could  
place an adequate number of tourist  
sleeping cars at the disposal of the  
military authorities on a few hours'  
notice, and that baggage could be  
carried in box cars as fast freight.  
In the mean time hundreds of  
guardsmen will sleep on their arms  
in the Greater City. Those allowed  
to spend the night at home until
