LORD SANDWICH DEAD.

British Subliman Was Prominent as Advocate of Mental Healing.
LONDON, June 25.—Edward George Henry Montagu, eighth Earl of Sandwich, died at his home at Hatchingbrook today after a short illness.
Lord Sandwich was seventy-seven years old. He was formerly colonel of the Grenadier Guards and also served in the diplomatic service on special missions to Constantinople, Berlin, Petrograd and Moscow. In recent years Lord Sandwich was prominent as an advocate of mental healing and claimed to have personally remarkable powers in this respect.

CASEMENT GOES ON TRIAL; JURY IS CHOSEN IN HOUR

Sir Roger Faces Charge of Treason Calmly and Hears Men He Approached Testify.

LONDON, June 26.—In a firm voice Sir Roger Casement today pleaded not guilty to the charge of high treason at the opening of his trial before Lord Chief Justice Reading and two associate justices. A jury was obtained from a special panel of 150 talesmen in less than an hour.
Viscount Reading, the Lord Chief Justice, and Justices Avory and Horridge, in bright scarlet robes and powdered wigs, took their seats, and Sir Roger Casement was brought in by a policeman to answer to the charge of high treason. The prisoner was pale. His black hair and beard were neatly trimmed, and he wore a black cutaway and a black tie, with a white band in his waistcoat collar.

Sir Roger bowed to the Justices and the Chief Justice returned the salutation with equal formality. The prisoner stood leaning on the iron railing, with folded arms, while the clerk read the long indictment.
The indictment followed in legal points that returned against Col. Arthur Lynch, who fought against the British in the Boer War. When asked if he was guilty, Sir Roger bowed and murmured something which was inaudible. His chief counsel, Alexander Sullivan of Dublin, arose quickly and argued that the indictment set forth was "no offense known to the law" and that none of the acts specified was alleged to have taken place in any territory over which the King had any jurisdiction. After consultation the Court ruled that any exceptions to the indictment in a case of such importance could be taken after the hearing without prejudice to the prisoner.

Sir Roger then pleaded not guilty and a jury was quickly chosen.
John Tilley, chief clerk at the Foreign Office, was the first witness. He identified a statement of Sir Roger's political record as taken from the files of the Foreign Office. John Cole, a pension examiner, testified regarding the dates of Casement's vouchers.
Private John Cronin of Cork, who was captured by the Germans and imprisoned at Limburg, testified about Sir Roger's efforts to organize an Irish Brigade among the Irish prisoners to be landed in Ireland to fight for Irish independence. On cross-examination of Cronin, Solicitor Sullivan gave the first inkling of what the defense may be. He attempted to draw the admission from Cronin that Casement was enrolling a brigade to fight against the Cister volunteers, landing in Ireland after the war.

Cronin admitted he did not hear Casement say specifically that the Irish brigade was to fight England.
Sir John O'Brien, another Irish soldier captured by the Germans, corroborated Cronin's story.
Corporal John Robinson and Private William Egan gave similar testimony. On cross-examination Robinson said Sir Roger made it plain that the brigade was to fight in Ireland and nowhere else. On redirect examination he added that Casement also made it plain the purpose of the brigade was to free Ireland from England.
Other witnesses testified in a similar vein and then the Crown began offering evidence to show Casement's connection with the Dublin rebellion, calling Michael Nussie, a Carrigrohane laborer, who was the last witness before adjournment until to-morrow. Nussie simply testified about seeing lights at sea off the Tralee coast on the evening of a German submarine's landing from a German submarine.

STILL HUNTING FOR THE GAYNOR PAPERS

Michel Does Not Want to Impede Delivery but Objects to Thompson Committee Representative.

Mayor Michel was to have been called by the Thompson legislative investigating committee, but he was laying the cornerstone of a reformatory for boys at New Hampton, Orange County, N. Y. An attaché of the Mayor's office brought over some letters of Mayor Gaynor from the file to the City Hall.
"These papers are not what are wanted," said Senator Thompson. "I have read a statement by the Mayor that he does not decline to let this committee's representative search the files, but objects personally to the man assigned to do the work. I don't want to send any one over there who is objectionable. At the same time this is a public question and I will send Klein, the man objected to, over to-morrow with the sergeant-at-arms to look for certain papers which he says he knows how to find. I will ask the Mayor to let him go through the file. If the Mayor refuses, I shall ask him to come here and explain why. If there is anything wrong with this man I'll discharge him."

BRIDE HURT IN TAXI CRASH.

Honeymoon Is Interrupted When Auto Hits "L" Pillar.
John Bane of No. 208 East Thirty-fourth Street and his bride, Elizabeth, were on their way to the Pennsylvania Terminal early to-day to start their honeymoon when at Broadway and Thirty-third Street their taxi cab struck an "L" pillar. The bride was thrown against the front window of the cab and her face was badly cut by the breaking glass. She was hurried to Bellevue Hospital and was treated by Dr. Dunn.
The couple were married in St. Francis Xavier Church yesterday. They held a dinner and a reception at the Hotel Clarendon until about 1.30 o'clock this morning and then started for their wedding journey.

Steamer Ping Nuey Is Ashore.
CAPE TOWN, South Africa, June 26.—The British steamer Ping Nuey, which left Liverpool June 1 for Yokohama, is ashore thirty-five miles northwest of Cape Town and seriously damaged. She is a freighter, but may have a few passengers aboard.

HOPES HER DOGGIE IS SAFE AS SHE AND HE FALL

With her pet waddy dog, Jess, in her arms, Myrtle Chapman, six years old, fell today from a third floor fire escape at her home, No. 124 Fulton Street, Brooklyn, upon the roof of a one-story extension and bounced across an alley to another extension. She was taken to Long Island College Hospital suffering from concussion of the brain and internal injuries.
"I hope my doggie wasn't hurt," was all her mother heard her say as she sunk into unconsciousness.
The dog was unhurt.

THIS is one of the smartest costumes that could be presented. It represents three patterns, but each one is a separate proposition, and each one in itself is very simple and easy to make. Combined, they make up as smart and graceful an effect as could be found.
Here, the undergarment is made of lace flouncing, the blouse is made of all-over lace to match, and the bodice and tunic are made of white taffeta banded with velvet ribbon. You could copy the gown in various other materials, but none could be more fashionable. The skirt is just a straight piece of lace gathered at its upper edge and sewed over strip of belting. The blouse is a plain one, but with neat, attractive, and attractive sleeves. Here it has been cut a little above the line of the bodice, and finished with a neat, quite plain, closed at the left shoulder, and underarm, and the tunic consists of a long, straight piece of material, 44 inches wide, for the overbodice with tunic 4 1/2 yards, 36 or 44, with three yards of ribbon for each row on the bottom of the tunic and 6 yards for the upper edge of the bodice. TWO PLUNGE TO DEATH FROM HOSPITAL WINDOWS

The Patients, a Man and Woman, Were Made Delirious by Pneumonia.

Two pneumonia patients, one at Roosevelt Hospital and the other at Volunteer Hospital, ended their lives yesterday by leaping from windows.
The first victim, Mrs. Anna O'Shea, twenty-eight, of No. 44 West Sixty-fourth Street, leaped from a third story window at Roosevelt Hospital to the pavement of a rear courtyard in a moment of delirium.
The attending nurse left the private room where Mrs. O'Shea was and on her return found the patient gone. Mrs. O'Shea was dead when carried back into the hospital. She was the wife of Stephen O'Shea, cafe proprietor, James Griffith, a sailor, forty-two years old, who lived at No. 359 West Nineteenth Street, leaped from a window of Volunteer Hospital into Water Street. The sailor, brought to the hospital, died yesterday. He had been reached from the East River developed pneumonia. A nurse grappled with the delirious man as he climbed to the window, but she was unable to restrain him. He died from shock a half hour later.

ELECTION RIOT IN PANAMA CONFINED TO THAT CITY

United States Troops Called Out—Prevent It From Spreading Over Isthmus.

PANAMA, June 26.—The promptness of Gov. Harding, American Minister Price and Gen. Edwards in bringing United States cavalry and infantry to the Hotel Tivoli at Ancon late yesterday prevented an election riot, started in Panama City, from spreading throughout Panama. Twenty-five Panamanians were wounded. Cases spread away from Panama and Colon during the day.
The opponents of President Porras asserted that the riot was started by the Panamanian police refusing to allow several hundred citizens to march to the headquarters of the government. That they had not been allowed to vote.
