## ALDERMEN VOTE A BOND ISSUE FOR WIDOWS' PENSIONS

Impending War Hastens Action in Providing Adequate Clerical Help.

The Board of Aldermen yesterday afternoon unanimously passed a resolution for revenue bonds to procure enough help for the Child Welfare Board to investigate the present widows' cases, numbering over 8,000.

Action was hastened in view of the growing importance of the Board of Child Welfare together with possible war complications. The application of over 3,000 cases of widows have been before the Child Welfare Board for a considerable time, and owing to lack of investigators and clerks final disposition of but a small number of the cases could be made.

With the possibilities of imminent war the cases of these widows would become more accentuated, since a large percentage of the assistance that has gone to them would go to widows of soldiers enlisted in the army.

The Board of Aldermen saw the need for immediate action, with the above results. It is hoped that the added clerical force will make it possible to clear up all the cases before the end of the year, so that any new petitions can be handled by January 1 and the routine work of the Child Welfare Board thus definitely established.

The new employees, taken from the civil service list, include eight investigators at \$1,080 a year, one stenographer at \$720, one typist at \$600, one clerk at \$540 and another clerk at \$500. The matter will be passed upon by the Board of Estimate next week. As this body has already adopted the above schedule of employees, the matter will go through without any further delay.

It is also estimated that the \$300,000 revenue bonds recently passed by the Board of Aldermen and Board of Estimate will be sufficient to cover all the allowances that can be investigated before the first of the year. The budget asked for next year by the Board of Child Welfare is \$1,266,000. President De Witt made the following statement to-day:

"The importance of the work of the Board of Child Welfare cannot be overestimated, particularly when the country is so apparently about to be involved in a conflict which demands the services of our citizen soldiery and takes away from their employment such a great number of those who have families dependent upon them for support.

"The applications already filed with the board for assistance have made it imperative to have an additional force established to facilitate the necessary investigations required by law. Relief may be granted, and should any catastrophe to our militia force result from the approaching entanglement, it will be a matter of justice that immediate action should be taken to provide for those left behind in a dependent situation. Many of these dependents include the widows' cases now before the board.

"The Board of Estimate and the Board of Aldermen realize this fact, and have hastened action on the small additional force estimated necessary by the Board of Child Welfare."

Through the efforts of President Dowling no delay has been allowed to occur in making this very necessary provision, as he has facilitated the passage of the necessary grades in both boards, and has taken steps to see that the proper funds are provided to pay the very small salaries required.

Smith. She is an enthusiastic baseball fan and has attended nearly every game played here by the Pirates since his first season. Wagner, as an amateur, played baseball with his intended bride's father.
