The May Manton Fashions



THIS is an ideal country costume. It can be worn during the morning hours and it will be found correct and available for any pleasure or occupation that may be suggested for tennis, golf, for boating or for walking or for whatever the day may bring forth. The middie shows one of the latest variations of that favorite garment, for the fullness is held by smocking and pockets are supplied. It can be made longer if liked. The skirt will be cut in two or in three pieces, that is, with or without the seam at the back, according to the width of the material. Here the pockets are cut into the middie, the middie is cut into the skirt, the skirt is made of blue crepe linen and the blouse is made of white linen smocked with blue, but this is a construction that can be utilized for many different materials. For the skirt, genuine khaki and khaki colored gaiters are favorite materials. Awning striped gaiters and gaiters are much used, too, and there is a pretty new striped material on the market known by a fancy name that is perfectly adapted to such use. For the blouse, linen, galles and such materials are used, and also the thinner ones, for we make middies of handkerchief linen this season and of crepe de chine. MANGLED BY CAR, WOMAN DIRECTS WORK OF RESCUE

Pinned Under Wheels, Leg Nearly Severed, She Amazes Crowd by "Serve."

Caught under a Broadway car, Mrs. Catherine P. Fleming, forty-five years old, quietly directed her own rescue, and is at Polyzos Hospital. Her right leg must be amputated.

Thousands of persons gathered around as Mrs. Fleming told a week-long crowd what to do. Her leg had been almost severed and she was pinned under the rear truck of the car. She was kept from bleeding to death by a tourniquet made of the thigh of Policeman Braveman's nightstick, the officer crawling under the car and adjusting his improvised instrument.

"Now don't go too fast," Mrs. Fleming advised. "My taking your time you can get me out quicker."

The woman was run over at Broadway and Forty-eighth Street by a southbound car from which she had just alighted. As she started for the sidewalk an automobile came toward her. She dodged into a pile of asphalt near the tracks, slipped and slid partly under the car. The front wheel of the rear truck passed over her leg, then she was dragged several feet. Within a few minutes police reserves had to be called out to handle the crowd that massed about.

An ambulance and a wrecking crew were summoned. When the car was raised the crowd gave a mighty cheer. Mrs. Fleming was entered on the hospital books as an employee of the Hotel Belmont, where she said, when under the car, that her daughter, Edith, could be found.

KILLED BY AUTO AS HE STEPS FROM CAR

Edward M. Wilford, forty years old, for the last fifteen years in the employ of The World, was killed by an automobile last night as he stepped from a trolley car at Fifth Avenue and Ninety-ninth Street, Brooklyn. He was thrown 10 feet against the curb and suffered a fractured skull.

STATEN ISLANDERS LOSE FIGHT ON GARBAGE PLANT

Permit to Erect Building Ordered Granted by Justice Cropsey.

Staten Island citizens who have been fighting to prevent the erection of a garbage disposal plant on Lacks Island, lost another round in the contest to-day when Justice Cropsey of the Supreme Court, Brooklyn, denied Mrs. Janet F. Doyle an injunction to restrain the city from going on with the work. This was the seventh attempt of the Staten Islanders to gain their point.

Protesters were sent to the plant location to protect workmen. Justice Cropsey decided that the city had a perfect right to use the police in this way, and that Mrs. Doyle had no title to Lacks Island, the title resting in the contractors for the work.

Justice Cropsey also denied the application of the Lacks Island Realty Co. for an injunction restraining William J. McDermott, Superintendent of Buildings in Richmond, from granting a building permit to the Metropolitan Hygienic Co. He granted the company's petition for a writ of mandamus compelling Mr. McDermott to grant them a permit to erect a garbage plant.


Strangled to Death Under Capote's Auto.


