Denied Privilege of Seeing Husband Buried, She Arranges Details.

The widespread sympathy for Mrs. Christopher Beutinger, mother of five children, who brought a long series of domestic quarrels to an end last Tuesday by shooting and killing her husband at their home in Caldwell, N. J., was evidenced today when her attorney, Frank McBurnett of Newark, announced that wealthy residents of Yonkers, New York and New Jersey, many of them total strangers to his client, had offered to provide bail money for her to the extent of \$1,000,000 if necessary.

The Supreme Court of New Jersey or the United States Court will be asked to-morrow to admit Mrs. Beutinger to bail, her attorney announcing his intention of making the application to either of those tribunals.

Meanwhile, from her cell in the Essex County Jail, Newark, where she passed a restless night, Mrs. Beutinger directed arrangements this morning for the funeral of her husband, to be held this afternoon from her home, and for the attendance of her five children at the service.

Mrs. Beutinger was bitterly disappointed when told that she would not be permitted to attend the funeral. Early this morning, at her request, her lawyer asked Acting Prosecutor Mott to permit her to be present at the obsequies under a guard of deputy sheriffs, but after a lengthy conference the request was denied on the ground that there was no precedent for such action in the criminal history of the State.

"Although I cannot go myself," sobbed Mrs. Beutinger, "I want to see that my children pay the proper respect to the memory of their father."

Capt. Calvin A. Lentholt, connected with the headquarters of the Department of the East at Governor's Island, a personal friend of the dead man, called at the jail last night and offered to take charge of the funeral. Mrs. Beutinger thanked him, but said that she preferred to look after the arrangements herself.

Mr. McDermott announced that John F. Brennan, a Yonkers lawyer who is familiar with Mrs. Beutinger's affairs, will be associated with him in the preparation of the case. Mrs. Beutinger's lawyers will claim that she acted in self defense and was temporarily unbalanced at the time.

Mrs. Beutinger says she has no regret over having killed her husband because she believes she was justified. She says she believes her husband was insane at times as a result of the climate in the Philippines, where he served with the army.

The estimates of Beutinger's wealth as being nearly \$200,000 were declared today to be greatly exaggerated. Acquaintances of Beutinger in this city said he was worth less than \$20,000.
