GERMAN PRESS BACKS HOLLWEG U-BOAT POLICY

Strongly Oppose the Move Started by Extremists to Have Chancellor Displaced.

BERLIN, July 17.—(United Press)—Leading German newspapers are now rallying in the support of Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, who has been under attack by the advocates of unrestricted submarine.

They deny that the Chancellor's peace proposals have weakened the position of Germany and threaten their confidence in the defeat of the allied offensive.

All the critics believe that the British will be unable to recover from their early failure to make great headway, though it is realized that the fighting is not over.

NEW YORK MAILS HELD UP BY BRITISH ORDER
