BRITISH REGAIN MORE GROUND IN NEW DRIVE AT LONGUEVAL

LONDON, July 19.—Heavy fighting continues on the Somme front. The War Office announced to-day that the British had gained more ground in Deville wood and Longueval...

The German counter attack was their strongest since the allied offensive began July 1. It is estimated that during this time the allied forces have hurled at the German defenses...

It appears there is a constant shifting of German troops between the western and eastern fronts. German officers are being recalled from Bulgaria and Turkey to serve on these fronts.

TURKS DEFEATED IN CAUCASUS; BATTLES RAGE, SAYS PETROGRAD

PETROGRAD, July 20 (via London).—The War Office announced to-day that Kugl, an important point in the Caucasus, was occupied by the Russians on Tuesday.

Attempts by Turkish forces to advance against the Russians in the region of the River Stokhod in Volhynia, have been repulsed. The War Office announced to-day. The official statement says:

"On July 15, seventeen enemy aeroplanes made a raid on the station of Zamin, northeast of Baranovitch. Twenty-seven bombs were thrown upon the hospital and barracks. LA FOLLETTE SEES WILSON LEAD HUGHES ON POSSIBLE ISSUE

President Right in Opposing Use of U. S. Flag to Collect Debts in Mexico.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Referring to what he called "the new-born policy of guaranteeing American investments by the American flag," Senator Robert M. La Follette, Progressive Republican of Wisconsin, in the Senate this afternoon said:

"If that question is made the issue of the campaign, the people of the United States will vindicate the President most emphatically."

La Follette was insisting on his amendment to the Naval Bill that none of the battleships be used for the collection of debts owed American bondholders or concessionaires in foreign countries when Senator Lewis, Democrat, asked if he stood with President Wilson against intervention in Mexico.

"I sincerely hope," replied Senator La Follette, "that the standard bearer of the Republican party in the coming campaign will not feel himself constrained to take the position that it is the duty of the Government to put the flag of the United States behind investors in Mexico."

"President Wilson declared in his Detroit speech that he would not stand for that principle and that he would not become the collecting agent of investors in Mexico."

"The American people, if the issue is made between the Republican candidate and Mr. Wilson on that proposition, will stand overwhelmingly by the President."

PANIC ON N. Y. STEAMER WHEN SHE RAMS BARGE

All of Crew Believed Saved After Collision With Comus Off Jersey Coast.

The steamship Comus of the Southern Pacific Line arrived seven hours late from New Orleans to-day as the result of a collision this morning with a coal barge off Beazirt, N. J. The barge was the last of a tow of three and sunk instantly, the seven members of the crew jumping into the water. William Johnson, captain of the barge, and four of his crew were picked up. The other two members are also thought to have been rescued.

The sixty-eight passengers of the Comus were at breakfast, and the force of the collision set the dishes to dancing and developed a mild panic that was quickly quelled by the stewards. The Comus was proceeding so slowly at the time that she sustained practically no damage.
